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Board Talk Regis McDona

I am pleased to report that the 137th Corps of Cadets is fully engaged in all aspects of Wentworth's 360-degree educational philosophy which values development of leadership, spiritual, and physical skills at the same time academic growth.

The Board Officers and Trustees hold frequent conference calls with Colonel Lierman and the President's Cabinet. The discussions center on such matters as enrollment/retention, finances, and the Capital Campaign. There are significant challenges in each of these areas that must be addressed in order for Wentworth to be successful as a 21st century educational institution. This year cadet re-

tention is the highest in many years due to the targeted efforts of the Early Intervention Team and Student Advisory Program. The annual financial audit was completed on time, on budget and received an unqualified opinion. Wentworth's financial capacity is key to its ability to extend its reach and impact in keeping with its founding purpose as the place for emerging leaders to position themselves for success. As you know, the Board approved an independent marketplace fundraising analysis, followed by rigorous training in major gifts for selected staff and volunteers. At the Fall Annual Board of Trustees Meeting held on Oct. 28-29, a presentation was given by Capital Campaign Steering Committee Co-Chairs Doug Gourlay and Bob Heath regarding the Campaign Plan. A thorough and thoughtful discussion followed. On Dec. 15, the Board will discuss the final approval of the Campaign Plan. The Board of Trustees committed to 100 percent support of the Campaign through leadership, personal giving, prospect cultivation, gift solicitation, etc.

At the Fall Annual Meeting the Board of Trustees, the current officers were re-elected for another year - Chair: Regis G. McDonald, Vice-Chair: John Francis, Secretary: Doug Gourlay and Treasurer: Luke Coffey.

It was the strong consensus of the Governance & Nominating Committee that it would serve the needs of the Board as well as Wentworth for the present officers to remain in place to continue to provide sound leadership in anticipation of the launch of the Capital Campaign, Higher Learning Commission review in February 2016, and the expansion of the number of countries students come from in response to changing international study abroad trends. A special thank-you is in order to Luke Coffey for his invaluable help with Wentworth's Development Department staff in connecting with alumni living in various parts of the world. The Chairs and Committee members of the Executive, Academic Affairs, Development & Capital Campaign Steering, Finance & Audit and Governance & Nominating were re-appointed by the BOT Chair for one year. I want to publicly thank the Trustees for their unwavering support of Wentworth. All the good things that are taking place at Wentworth would not be possible without their commitment of time, talent and financial support as well as that of Col. Lierman and that of the skilled, dedicated and caring members of the President's Cabinet, faculty, staff. It goes without saying Wentworth's alumni have stepped up big time to add their strong voice and support to make sure Wentworth is all it can be! Thank you to Scott Hefner, President of the Wentworth Alumni Association; Secretary Mary E. Stempel; Treasurer Al McCormick and President-Elect, Bill Labhart. The 2016 Homecoming was a tremendous success because of the Wentworth family going the extra, extra mile!

ALUMNI RED DRAGONS BLAST YELLOW JACKETS IN 8TH WMA-KEMPER ALUMNI TRAP SHOOT (Bill Heltzel)



Sedalia, Mo. – Homecoming 2016 dawned cool as alumni shooters from across the country and across the decades gathered for the Eighth Wentworth-Kemper Alumni Trap Shoot. Sedalia Rod and Gun Club warmly welcomed the Alumni Red Dragons and Yellow Jackets for their first match at its fine facility.

This year's shoot was dedicated to the memory of WMA Alumnus Steve Oliver, '66. Steve was an early proponent of the Alumni Trap Shoot, and his contribution to the team's early success is often remembered among his friends.

The scoring format totals a like number of scores from either team up to a limit of five. If either team has more than five shooters, the top five scores are added to get the team total. Scoring the match in this way, the tournament honors the athletic philosophies of both institutions. Everybody can play regardless of ability, while the teams are able to remain competitive. This year's event featured an even five per side.

After being unable to arrange a shoot the past couple of years due to scheduling, the squads were anxious to return to competition. The

shooters prepared with fresh doughnuts and hot coffee, and just a little "friendly encouragement" from the opposing club.

With near-perfect weather and wind conditions, each contestant shot at 50 targets. By the end of the lead-off squad's first round, Kemper led by a single target. Their second round extended the Yellow Jackets' lead by another target, giving them a two-bird advantage as the second squad took the line.

The lead enjoyed by the Kemper squad quickly evaporated with the total of three shooters. Shooters Jared Broderick ,'04 ,and Tony Jarvis, '82, combined for the first squad Wentworth tally. In the second squad, Al Nordeen and Jeff Latz, from the 50-year Class of 1966, broke enough clays to seal the match with targets to spare.

The match-high score posted by Bill Heltzel '77 was unnecessary to assure a Wentworth victory, but is a testament to the work put in by this year's Alumni Red Dragon Trap Team.

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Lew Hunter, Wentworth Class of 1951, documentary gets hometown premiere

In Superior, Nebraska, at a cinematic event at Superior's Victorian Festival on May 29, 2016, Tinseltown magic could be felt at the Crest Theatre where the documentary "Once in a Lew Moon" had its local premiere. It is the story of Guide Rock-Superior native Lew Hunter – the television network and Hollywood studio executive producer and screenwriter; legendary UCLA screenwriting professor; author of the bestselling book, "Screenwriting 434"; host and teacher of the Superior Screenwriting Colony in Superior; and creator of Writers Block, a social event for professional writers in Burbank, California.

Hunter also helped found the American Screenwriters' Association and has been inducted into its Hall of Fame.

"Once in a Lew Moon" tells the story of Hunter's early life deep-rooted in Nebraska, his transition from a Nebraska farm boy to Hollywood fame and his journey back home to his beloved Midwest. The documentary portrays his love of the writing craft and writers and the reciprocal love they feel for him.

The 75-minute documentary was produced and directed by another son of Tribeland, Nebraska, director/producer Lonnie Senstock of Lincoln. Both Hunter and Senstock, along with their families and friends, were on hand for the premiere, adding spark to the event.

The two men grew up in communities just 30 miles apart, with Senstock's roots in the Deweese-Fairfield area. And today, due to an early loss of his parents, Senstock has adopted Hunter and his wife, Pamela, as his surrogate parents.

The documentary is a testimonial from former students, writers, directors, producers and actors themselves of their writing experiences with Lew Hunter, who is loved and known for his high-spirited great passion for life, his love for his fellow man, and his extraordinary talent.

He was praised for being a perceptive person who knows how the craft works, for being inspiring, for always being positive, for helping others believe in their own potential, for always being available to help anyone in need, and for giving hope through all his emails by signing off with his famous slogan "Write on!"

Hunter was born June 18, 1935. Being an only child and living in rural Nebraska, he became captivated by radio, television and the movies and soon began to dream about the industry.

One night he was Fred Astaire and danced with a pitchfork playing the role of Ginger Rogers.

"I credit my parents for making me who I am today," Hunter said. "My mother, involved in many organizations, steered me in the right direction, and my father always stressed to do what makes you happy."

Hunter attended Wentworth Military Academy in Lexington, Mo., then Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln. Still following the dream in his heart, he then went to the University of California at Los Angeles, studying the film industry and receiving his second master's degree.

In 1956 he got his break in the film industry – the first of many jobs he would hold with the NBC television network. Through the years, he worked diligently, climbing the ladder – working at four television networks at once for some time.

He wrote his first screenplay "If Tomorrow Comes" in 1971. "Fallen Angel" and "Desperate Lives" followed, along with his best-selling book published in 1992 "Screenwriting 434."

Today, Hunter is emeritus from UCLA, but still is writing. His latest book caries the title "Lew Hunter's Naked Screenwriting: 25 Academy Award-winning Screenwriters Bare their Art, Craft, Soul & Secrets."

Hunter's advice to youth today "Be determined to succeed and never give up, follow your heart and don't give in to the word 'no,' for it's just a word on the way to yes."

Congratulations, Colonel! Well deserved.



Thanks to a \$5-million legacy leadership gift from a talented student-artist, Hastings College in Hastings, Neb., has opened the Jackson Dinsdale Art Center (JDAC), a spacious, state-of-the-art facility worthy of outstanding students and alumni. Jackson, a 2010 Wentworth Military Academy graduate, passed away unexpectedly on May 3, 2014. The extraordinary gift, announced by Jackson's parents, Kim and Tom Dinsdale (Wentworth class of 1969) of Grand Island, Neb., launched an exciting future for the arts at Hastings College while fulfilling the dreams of a visionary young man who advocated for improved art facilities before his death. The 25,000-square -foot Art Center is an architecturally innovative showplace for the arts and a superb teaching and learning environment for students. The JDAC offers spacious studios and classrooms to benefit art majors and all students who take art classes as part of Hastings College's liberal arts curriculum. It also features a 2,600-square-foot glass blowing area, which is the best equipped and largest glass studio in the country.

After graduation from Wentworth in May 2010, he enrolled at Hastings College as a studio art major with plans to become a police officer. His time at Wentworth instilled in him a desire to serve his community. That same year, he became the youngest person ever to establish a donor-advised fund at the Grand Island Com-

munity Foundation. Jackson's fund has supported the Nebraska National Guard Veteran's Office's emergency relief fund and the Grand Island Police Department's service dog program. In addition to his philanthropic gifts, Jackson enjoyed volunteering his time at the Central Nebraska Humane Society. He is survived by his parents, Kim and Tom; his

brother, Michael Dinsdale (WMA class of 2009); his grandmothers, aunts, uncles and cousins.

Jackson's mother, Kim, said "This facility means that Jackson is not forgotten. Your biggest fear as a parent is losing a child and then after that, there's the fear that people will not remember him. This is Jackson's wish and it was his dream to have a bigger and better art center at Hastings and it was from his bequest that this was able to happen. He is the one doing it. I'm just facilitating it."

Thank you to the Alumni Department for your incredible gift of framed sketches of campus. It is probably the most meaningful thing you could have given us, and we truly appreciate them!



In the 2015-16 academic year, Wentworth admitted "Wesley", a freshman student who as an eighthgrade student was not cooperating with teachers or parents academically. He failed to understand the value of educators and instead turned his attention to other activities, wasting his time and talent.

His mother recognized the problem and felt Wentworth might be the solution to convince him to pay attention to priorities. The mother borrowed heavily and willingly invested in a one-year career for her son. Little did she know about the magic of Wentworth system. "Wesley" became a band member and at the end of the school year was rewarded for his performance by being recognized as Best New Boy Bandsman. In addition, his academic performance turned on a dime and he began to trust educators, realizing they cared about his performance. His grades improved and he fell in love with Wentworth and what they had to offer.

Turn the clock to the 2016-17 academic year. "Wesley" asked his mother to again send him to Wentworth. It wasn't possible as the financial resources had been spent for the freshman year. Inquiries were made to Wentworth to determine if financial assistance was available. Wentworth turned to the Alumni Association to seek any possible solution. The Association in turn voted to tackle the project and began raising funds.

Two phases were immediately planned: The first was a written appeal for assistance to all former band members and the second was to dedicate the proceeds from the annual Ed Ellis Golf Tournament held in October 2016. The officers of the alumni association are pleased to report that the results were over-

whelming thanks to former band members and former cadet support of the tournament. The family cannot believe that your association raised the funds to make the scholarship happen.

The letter of appeal produced more than a 4 percent response (of the mail list) and the amount of \$7,400+ was raised in August. The October golf tournament set a new sponsorship record and raised \$11,575. At the Saturday night banquet, Scott Hefner announced that the proceeds from these two events would be turned over to Wentworth the following week.
