It is the purpose of Wentworth Military Academy to provide the best conditions possible for the all 'round development of worthy boys and young men.

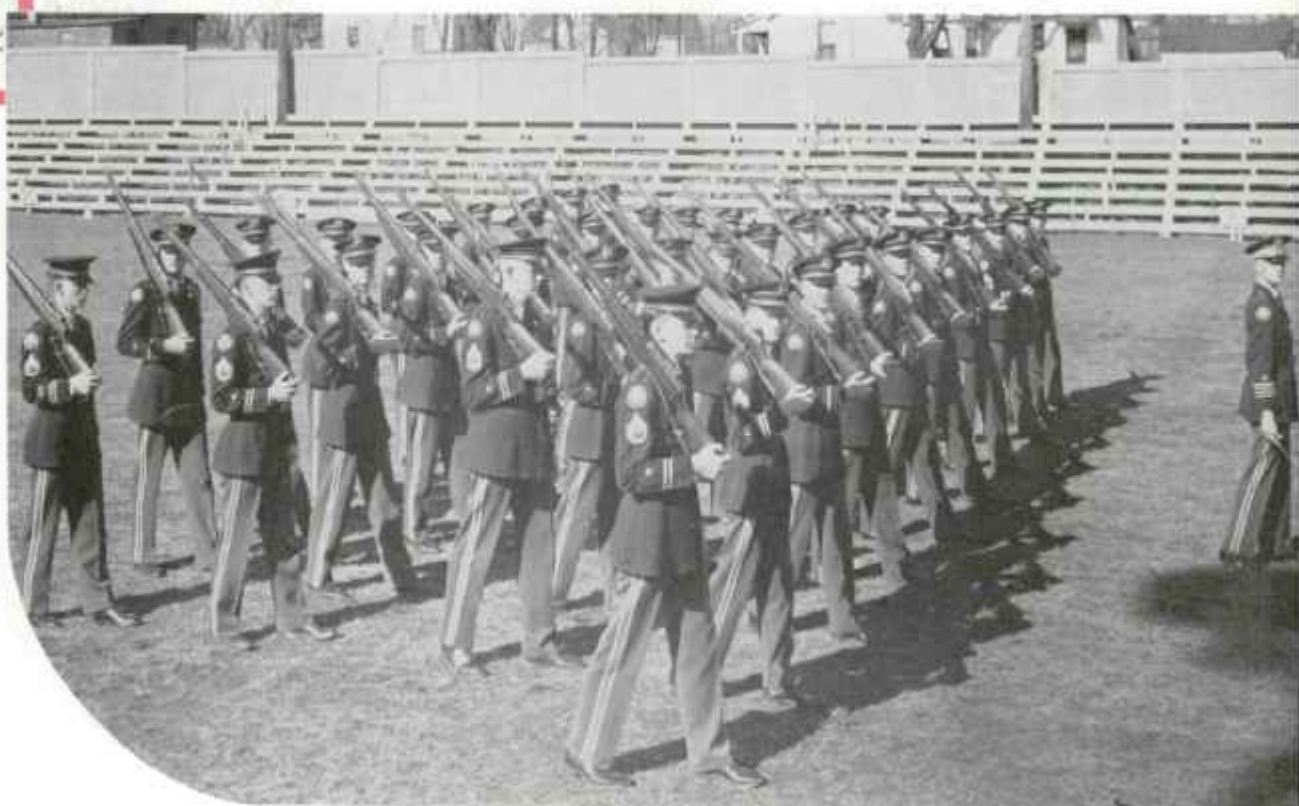
To attain this high purpose, the Academy places greatest emphasis upon these four points:

SINCE EIGHTEEN EIGHTY

One of the chief reasons why Wentworth has been able to achieve its lofty purpose lies in the fact that the Academy has been under one continuous administration since its founding. For nearly three-score years, Colonel Sanford Sellers was president of Wentworth. He enjoyed one of the most enviable records in the history of American education.

The Academy was founded by Stephen G. Wentworth, scion of a distinguished English family and a prominent Lexington banker, in 1880, as a memorial to his deceased son, William Wentworth. Mr. Wentworth immediately vested control of the institution in the hands of a board of trustees composed of a duly elected representative of each of the Evangelical churches of Lexington, and a president. Colonel Sellers was called to the new school in its first year and remained as its active head until 1938. Mr. Wentworth served as president of the Board from 1880 until his death in 1897.

It was the firm conviction of the founder, his board of trustees and President Sellers that a military boarding school provides the most effective possible means for giving young men the thorough mental, moral and physical training necessary to develop in them the highest traits of manhood. Thus, Wentworth became the first military school in the Missouri River Valley.



AN HISTORIC BACKGROUND

Throughout over half a century the Wentworth purpose has remained unchanged. The ideals which led to the Academy's founding and which have carried it steadily forward, shine just as brightly today as ever: the desire to give each youth every opportunity to develop fully his own individual personality; the aim that every cadet shall acquire a keen sense of duty and responsibility, both to himself and toward others; that he shall have the mental and moral power to make accurate judgment between right and wrong and the physical power to stand by his convictions.

These high standards have dominated Wentworth for generations. But to maintain them and assure their full and continuous application, it has been found necessary to limit the enrollment. Wentworth today is a relatively small school—many times larger than in 1880, to be sure, yet small enough that every individual student is given the private attention so essential to his all-round development.

The surrounding country affords a wealth of historically important Civil War sites and the town of Lexington itself retains much of the tradition of the old south. Here enthusiasm for the reminders of our country's glorious past is combined with the enthusiasm for modern adventure to promote the rapid development of the boy's mental, moral and physical resources.

The Wentworth Military Academy of today is vastly different from the Wentworth of 1880. From year to year it has enlarged its facilities, increased its enrollment and changed its physical appearance until there is little to remind one of the early days. Numerous modern and attractive buildings have been erected as they were needed. Old buildings have been torn away when they were no longer useful. Spacious military and athletic fields have been added. One of the finest gymnasiums in the country has been built. Every new method in teaching that has been found definitely superior to older methods has been adopted. Yet, some of the fundamental principles that guided the first company are adhered to just as strictly today.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT

MILITARY training at Wentworth has always been a strong feature, but it is never permitted to interfere with the scholastic work of the Academy. It can be shown, moreover, that military discipline has a decidedly advantageous effect upon classroom work.

In recognition of the superior military work done at Wentworth, in 1889 the Academy became a post of the Missouri National Guard. Graduates of the Academy who resided in Missouri, became eligible for commissions in this organization.

Wentworth has been under the direct supervision of the War Department of the United States Government since 1895, when the first active army officer was detailed to the Academy. Now 3 officers, 4 non-commissioned officers and one civilian assistant are in charge of military instruction. In addition, the War Department furnishes around \$50,000 worth of equipment to be used for instruction purposes. Wentworth is one of the original Honor Schools of the United States, the highest rating given by the War Department. The Academy has been a unit of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps from the time that organization was established.

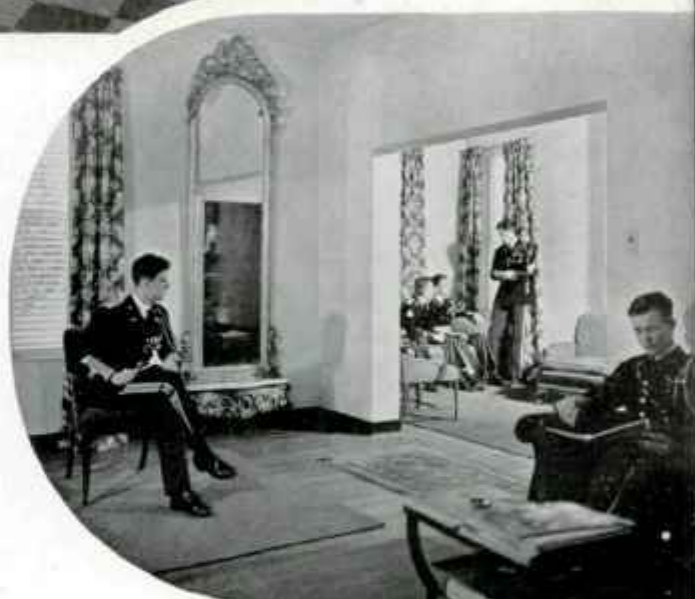

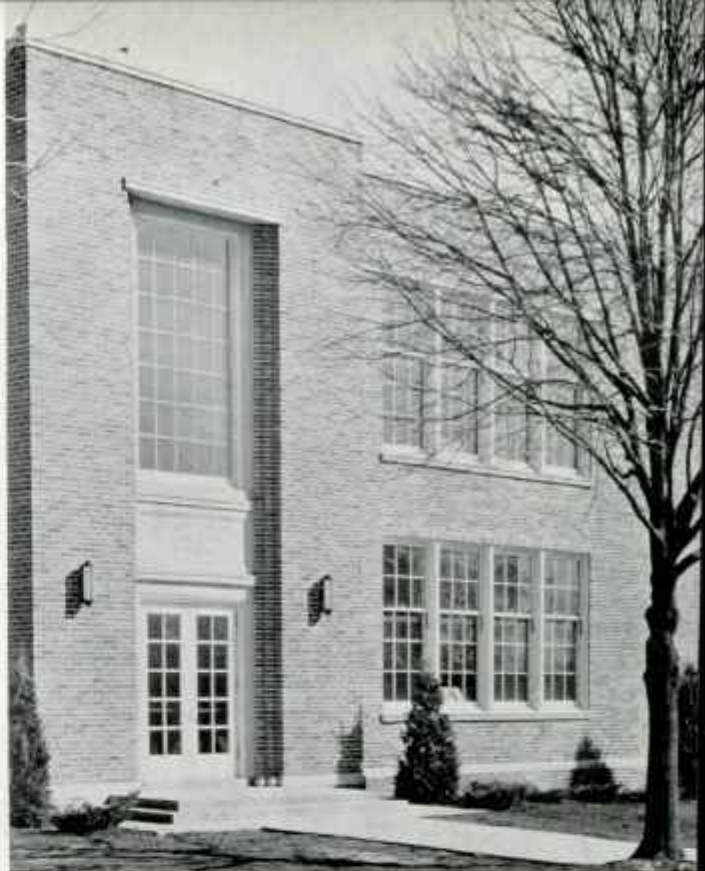

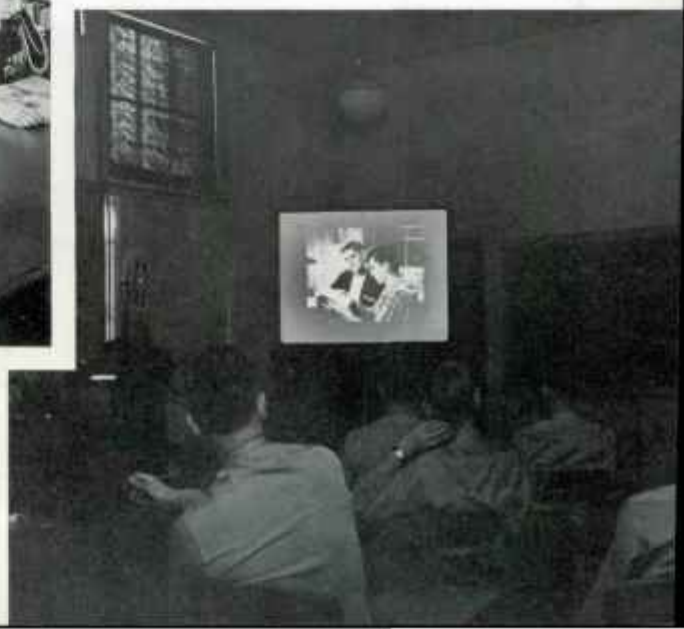
SCHOLASTIC

Wentworth's up-to-date Sellers - Wikoff Scholastic Building is the nucleus of the scholastic department. This magnificent structure contains one of the most splendid libraries possessed by any institution of this kind. Four completely equipped laboratories provide excellent facilities for the practical study of the sciences. In addition to classrooms for all classes, it houses the Dean's and Commandant's offices. It is with justifiable pride that Wentworth points to this new achievement in its effort to provide surroundings which are conducive to academic advancement.

DEPARTMENT



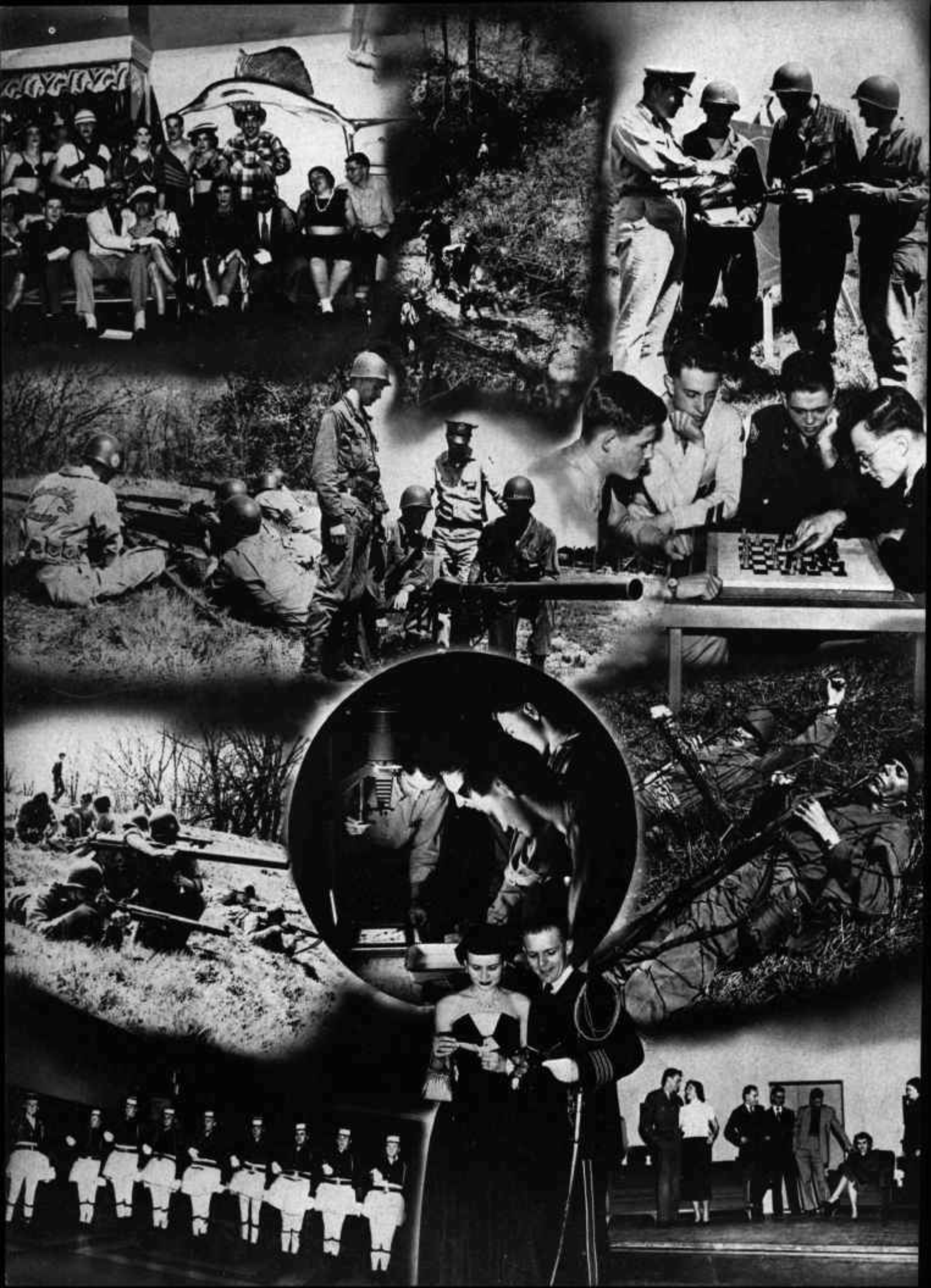
The scholastic department is divided into two separate and distinct units: the high school, which offers four years of preparatory work, and the junior college, which offers two years of liberal arts and science. Each has its own organization separate from the other. Both divisions are fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, an organization composed of the leading colleges and preparatory schools in twenty states. This recognition means that graduates of either department are eligible to enter any institution in the United States that receives students by certification.

It is our aim to see that each cadet masters every lesson thoroughly. To accomplish this, every student is taught correct study methods and thoroughly schooled in correct uses of libraries and laboratories. Classes are small, which permits individual attention. Most of the faculty members live in the buildings with students. They are readily accessible for special help. From time to time a personal study is made of each cadet to determine his points of weakness and help him overcome them.

AVIATION FLIGHT TRAINING GROUP

AVIATION

Wentworth participated in the Civil Aeronautics Administration Civilian Pilot Training Program from its inception in 1939 through the change to C. A. A. War Training Service until June, 1943, when all but 80 out of 712 colleges and universities throughout the country were eliminated due to curtailment of this type of training. However, the academy administration, believing aviation training to be very important now and in the future to the youth of the nation, secured permission from C. A. A. officials to continue flight training on a civilian basis and at the expense of the trainees.

Wentworth operates in conjunction with the Earl Haines Flying Service at the Lexington Airport as a certified flying school fully approved by the C.A.A. The flight training program, including ground school, far surpasses the minimum requirements set forth by the civil aeronautics administration qualifying cadet for Private and Commercial Pilot Certificates. It consists of instruction in both dual and solo flight time.

The records of the graduates of the Wentworth Flight Training are outstanding. During the war the graduates of this training program fought on every front where Americans were in combat.

A DAY



AT WENTWORTH

NO TWO days at Wentworth are quite the same, for a widely varied program of scholastic, military, athletic and other activities is used to keep the interest of the cadets at high pitch and their appetites for learning well whetted. Furthermore, no two students have quite the same duties to perform throughout any given day. There is, however, a definite routine that all cadets follow each day. It is used to instill perfect regularity and promptness in attendance upon all duties prescribed for one and all cadets alike.

While it requires some adjustments for new students to become accustomed to this routine, any slight hint of monotony is soon lost in the kaleidoscopic whirl of the school year.

To give parents and others a better insight, the following pages have been used to set forth, pictorially, the day's activities from Reveille to Taps, of a typical Wentworth boy whom we will designate as Cadet Harlan.

The pictures in this section were taken several years ago. However, since they illustrate life at Wentworth of today, they are still timely. They are retained because so many of the cadets shown served in the Armed Forces of their country and so well illustrate the value of military training as received while at Wentworth.

Since the importance of military preparedness is becoming increasingly evident by the changing world situation, the training illustrated in this picture section has a special significance.

There have been some uniform changes as may be seen by referring to the section on Wentworth uniforms.

HERE is Harlan, a typical Wentworth cadet—a fine young American—manly, scholarly and upright. His respect for duty and responsibility has won for him the rank of sergeant. He may have come from a large city or a very small town—that makes no difference to the democratic spirit that prevails at Wentworth. He may be from a wealthy family or a family in meager circumstances—most of his classmates would never know, nor even be curious, unless he chose to tell them. But he typifies all the fine qualities of a deserving and ambitious youth as he goes through the tried and age-proved Wentworth process of becoming a real man, a real asset to himself, his family and friends, and society as a whole.

Harlan, like all the others, participates in many activities besides those shown. But let's follow him through a typical day.

Harlan "Butch" Heffelfinger, who graduated in the class of 1937 and posed as the model cadet in the view book, served as a Major in the last war.

His brother, Hugo, another Wentworth alumnus, also a Major, and served with distinction with the Rangers.

"I CAN'T GET 'EM UP," blows the bugler, but he does, and at 6:35 o'clock another day is under way. Cadet Harlan goes first to the sanitary lavatory on his floor. A good washup is part of the routine, for a cadet is expected to keep himself clean at all times. At 6:50 he goes to a well-prepared breakfast.

After breakfast, rooms must be cleaned. One of the basic aims of our system is to form personal habits of order. Each morning Harlan makes his own bed, puts his clothes in order and helps his roommate clean the room.



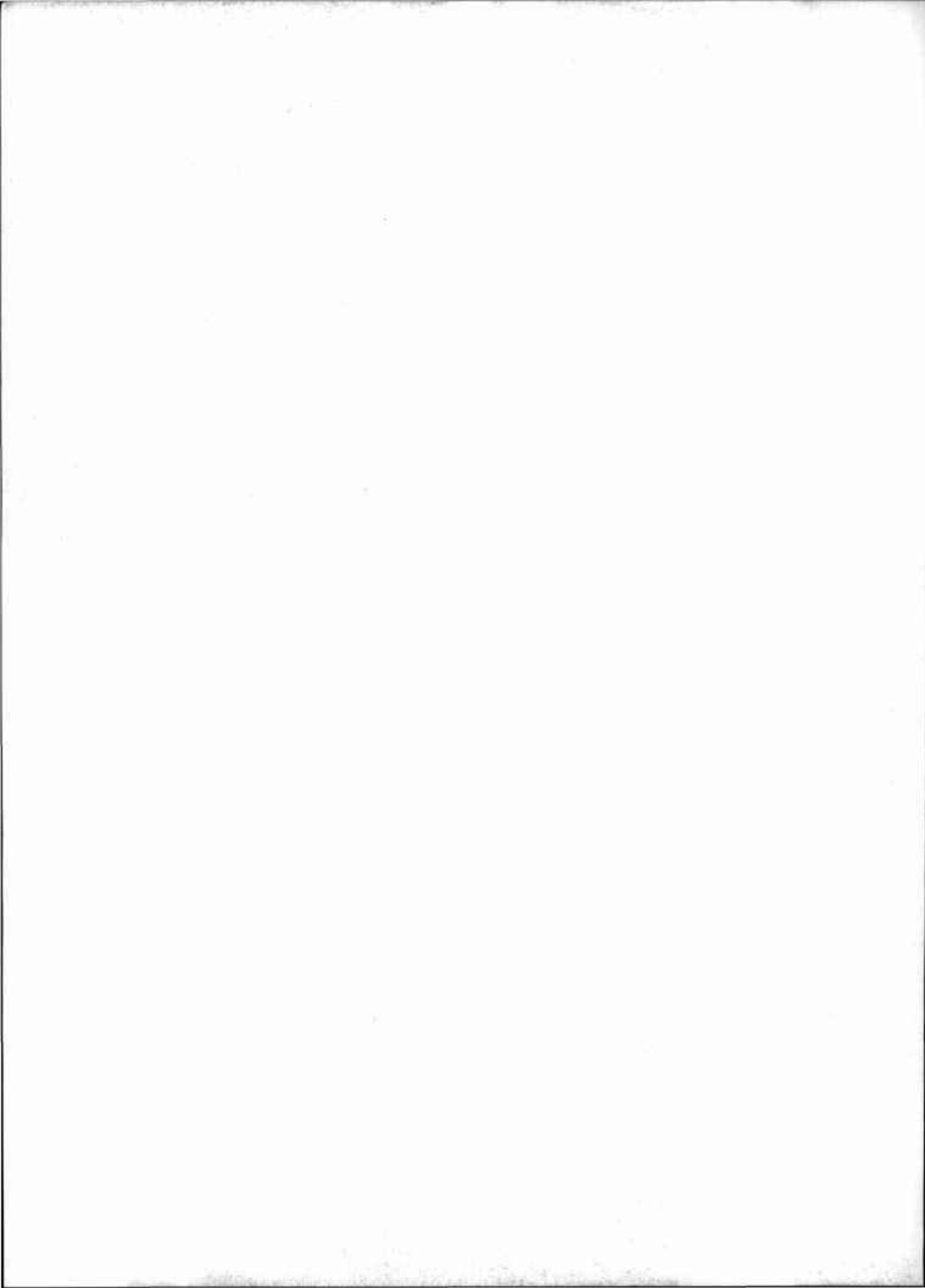

Strict inspection of quarters is a daily routine. Formal inspection of Harlan's person, room and equipment occurs on Sunday morning. At this time unusual care must be taken in cleaning the room. Our friend sees that hidden corners are carefully dusted, chairs polished, and everything put in order. Then he takes care of his person. There's brass to shine, leather to polish, hair to brush, and whiskers to be removed. A certain time is allotted for this preparation and all work must be done within that time. This young fellow knows that any deficiency in this work receives what is known in Academy language as a "skin"—which counts against one's company in color competition.

CALISTHENICS play an important role in the physical education of Cadet Harlan. No effort is made to indulge in this or any other exercise in the early morning hours when the body is at its lowest ebb. All such exercises are taken by our cadet after a hearty breakfast and morning classes. The exercises are intended to promote graceful movement as well as better health. The calisthenics used by the United States Army are followed. They are led by senior cadet officers.

So long as the weather permits, the calisthenics are held in the open, but they are taken in the large gymnasium, where an entire battalion may take part at the same time, when rain or cold is in the air.

DRILL is a very formal affair. It is on the drill field that Harlan learns much of courtesy, discipline and alertness. He, with his entire battalion, is thoroughly schooled in good citizenship, taught the proper respect for superiors and trained in leadership.

Learning to drill a squad is the first training in leadership. Throughout the year squad drill and competition is a part of the regular military routine. The squad is the smallest military unit and consists of nine to twelve men, two of whom are sergeants. All instruction is conducted by cadets under the personal supervision of members of the military faculty.

Although military work takes but one hour each day, the training is intensive and much more thorough than that found in larger units. Personal attention is given the individual cadet on the military field as well as in the classroom, and each cadet has an equal chance to advance to important positions in Wentworth's military realm. In the army, the navy and the marine corps Wentworth is glorified by its alumni who have received their commissions and are distinguishing themselves in official capacities of these respective branches of service.



Like many other cadets, Harlan finds the extended order drill more interesting. This drill consists of combat methods. He is taught to make use of cover, to advance and to fire. No actual firing is done during this drill, however, for all the ammunition used is dummy material. Initiative and leadership are required in this work. Situations arising in the problems furnished by the War Department call for quick thinking and immediate action.

Here our typical cadet finds extended order drill interesting and instructive.

The Cadet Officer using the field glasses was Captain Woodrow Wylie, U. S. Army, who participated in the fight on Bataan.

The cadet about to insert the cartridge in his rifle is Lieut. Colonel Milton Moran, U. S. Marine Air Corps. He participated in considerable action in the South Pacific.

FOLLOWING the morning classes comes lunch time and our cadet is ready to eat. Academy menus are always varied and pleasing. Meals are carefully planned to suit the needs of all cadets. They are healthful and nutritious and just what active, hard-working boys require. Meal times are at 7:00 in the morning, 12:10 and 6:10. This schedule is varied only on Sunday, when dinner becomes a more elaborate meal served at 12:30.

After dinner there is a recreation period during which Harlan and other cadets may do pretty much as they choose. The recreation room is a popular place at this time.

CADET HARLAN attends interesting, informative and inspirational meetings in the chapel, immediately before lunch on Wednesdays and Saturdays. These meetings are conducted by the Academy Chaplain, but are not strictly religious. Travel talks, health lectures, scientific demonstrations and short-sermons, presented by outstanding speakers, are frequently on the program. The service is opened with a hymn, prayer and responsive readings, and closed with the singing of "Wentworth," the Academy song.

"Pep" meetings, preceding important athletic contests, are held in the gymnasium. These are always occasions of great fun. Students and faculty make rousing speeches. The cadet band furnishes gay, martial music and everyone anticipates the big game on the morrow. Athletic contests are important recreational events. Every cadet attends them.

PERSONAL attention is not confined to the classroom nor to the evening study periods. Harlan and many other cadets seek assistance in the spacious Academy library. The faculty officer in charge is always ready and willing to help any student, no matter what his problem. Whatever the subject, the faculty officer is qualified to give the guidance needed.

Wentworth's library is one of the most important places on the campus. It contains more than 10,000 books on nearly every subject one could imagine. Reference books include the famous Oxford English Dictionary and many sets of encyclopedia.

TRAINING for leadership is important on the football field as well as everywhere else at Wentworth. More than fifty cadets answer the varsity call each year and large squads turn out for company teams. All players receive intensive training, both in the art of the game and in clean sportsmanship.

Football ranks as the number one sport and the Red Dragon elevens are consistent winners. The fine spirit of players and corps is credited with being a strong determining factor in every contest.

In the winter months basketball comes into the spotlight. Again there are the varsity and company teams and a place for every cadet who desires to play. Home games are played in the spacious gymnasium where there are two courts and ample space for spectators.

Wentworth is a member of the Junior College Interstate conference, an athletic association numbering seven schools as members. The Wentworth High School teams are members of the Pony Express Conference of Western Missouri. Almost every major and minor sports are on the Wentworth program—all played under competent coaches—and every cadet is required to participate.

THE sparkling, crystal-clear water of the swimming pool is inviting to cadets the year 'round. The pool is of regulation size (20x60) and is the scene of frequent water sports and aquatic meets. It is the purpose to teach every cadet to swim well. The water is warmed to a healthful temperature and kept pure by efficient filtration and chemical treatment.

Just before the evening study period is the favorite tune-in time for Cadet Harlan and other radio devotees. Permission to have a radio in the room is regarded a privilege, the abuse of which causes the student to lose this favor.

After thirty-five minutes of recreation following the supper hour, evening study is begun at 7 o'clock. Each cadet retires to his own room for a two-hour period of quiet. There is no stuffy, noisy hall in which cadets are confined. Instead, individual initiative is encouraged. Faculty officers are in constant attendance throughout the period, giving advice where it is needed and encouragement at all times.

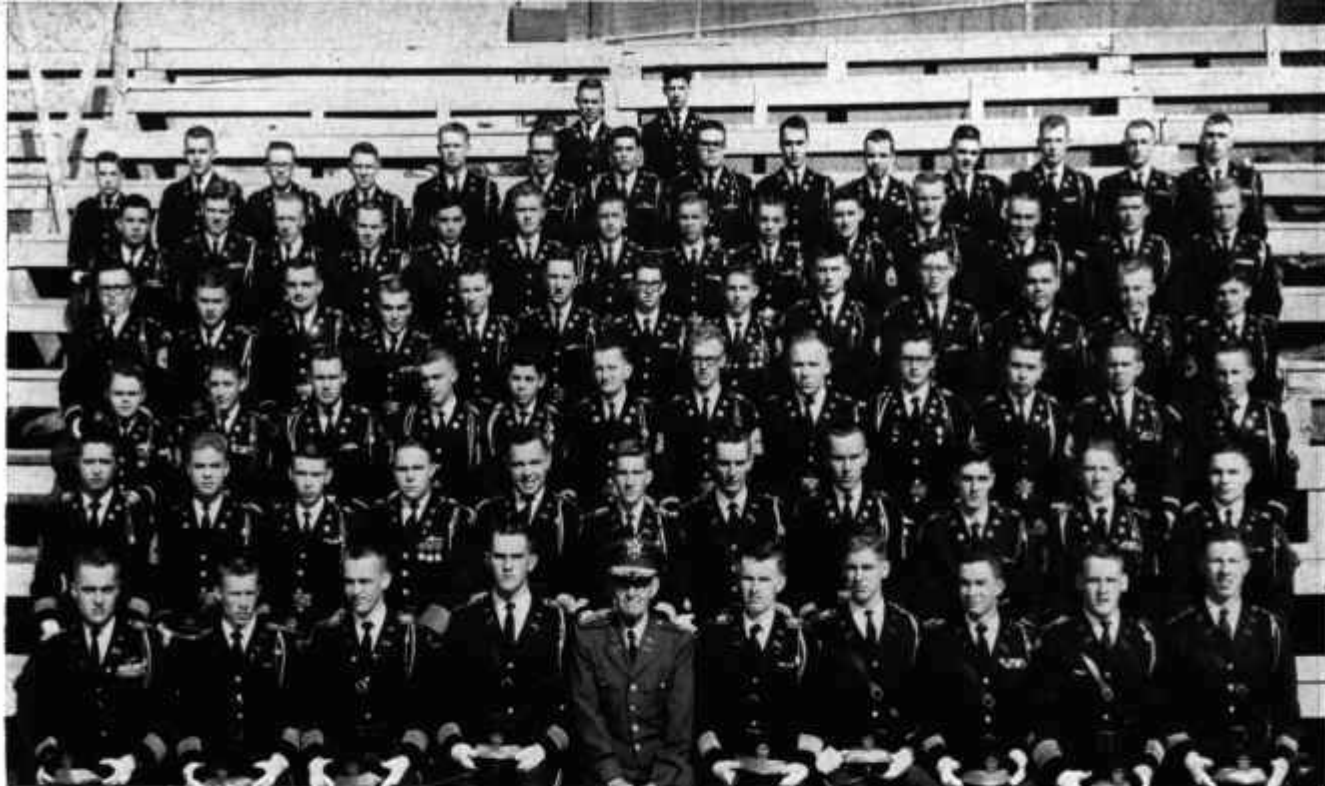

SPECIAL EVENTS MARKED THE 75th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOUNDING OF WENTWORTH During 1954-1955

Several special events were held, pictured below (or above). The first of these was to recognize Founders Day and honor the memory of Stephen G. Wentworth, the founder, and Col. Sanford Sellers, the first superintendent, who served as head of the Academy for 58 years. The speaker and honored guest was ex-President Harry S. Truman, who addressed the Cadet Corps and the guests in attendance and later placed wreaths on the graves of the two men who were honored. Mr. Truman was made an Honorary Colonel of the Wentworth Cadet Corps during the visit he and his wife made to the Academy.

The second event, although an annual one, our Wentworth show in Kansas City had the distinctive 75th Anniversary color.

The third special occasion was one which received nationwide publicity, a re-enactment of the Battle of Lexington which

occurred in September of 1861. Joining with the Cadet Corps in actually portraying the Battle were units from the regular Army, the National Guard, and ROTC units of Kansas City. The leading citizens of the City of Lexington, and in fact the whole community, joined in preparation for this very unusual event. As much realism as possible was achieved, even including the co-operation of the elements because it rained continuously during the day, May 12, 1955, on which this event was held, as it had during the actual Battle, according to authentic records. Attending the event were many high ranking Army officers and other distinguished citizens, which made it one of the most remarkable days in the entire history of Wentworth Military Academy and of the City of Lexington.

MEMORIES OF 1958-59

September 10—Wentworth began its 79th academic year, having been filled up since July. I arrived by bus and began work immediately on my room. I am living with my old roommate, Mort Shaw.

September 11—This has been a full day getting the room in order. Some of my luggage has not arrived yet. Mort has trouble with a fungus on his foot.

September 12—Classes began today. I think French is going to be a bit difficult. Took a permit and went to the show.

September 17—Drill today consisted of practicing the manual of arms and facing movements. Was surprised to see how fast new boys caught on. It seems to me it took me a lot longer last year.

September 18—Very chilly and cloudy this morning. Got up at 4:30 and studied for Bible literature test.

September 19—Spent the evening in the recreation room, playing ping pong with Bob Spence. Studied history and public speaking later on down in the barracks.

September 20—Just one of those days that everything goes wrong. Late two classes, failed to pick up laundry and get hair cut. Got about 26 demerits.

September 21—Went to early church this morning after eating a hearty breakfast at the Dragon's Den. "A" Company won parade today. Went to the Dairy Queen and bought a gallon of ice cream for my roommate and me.

September 22—Was sick today. Very sore throat.

September 23—Sore throat has kind of cleared. Felt much better today.

September 24—Not much happened today. Had three free periods today. Mort has been having a terrible time with a fungus on his foot.

September 25—Had doughnuts for breakfast this morning and hot coffee. Didn't feel too well again this morning.

September 26—Received three letters in the mail today and got \$1.00 from grandma.

September 27—Got quite cool today. I think I may have killed my hayfever.

September 28—Studied most of the day during free periods. French is getting rougher. Read a few pages of English literature.

September 29—Had supper at the Dragon's Den. Ate two hamburgers, a malt and French fries. Studied two hours on English literature tonight.

September 30—Quite hot today. I can't understand why it is so cold one day and hot the next. Weather seems very peculiar in Missouri.

October 1—Zoology test today. Quite hard, but I'm sure I passed.

October 2—Had a birthday cake at our table.

October 3—An ordinary day.

October 4—Practiced organ two hours this afternoon. Spent evening permit at movies with Paul Hollingshead.

October 5—Had breakfast with Chuck and the Spence twins at Dragon's Den. Afterwards we went to the Episcopal church together.

October 6—Turned in laundry and green slacks as is usual on Monday morning.

October 7—Was tired today. Spent my two free periods sleeping.

October 8—Made excess this week, unfortunately. Spent afternoon studying in room 107.

October 9—Late BRC as usual. Character sketch due in English, my favorite class. Wrote about my house cat.

October 10—Enjoyed band practice. Tried out new music.

October 11—Played organ in chapel today. Practiced afterwards, then played cards with Spences until supper.

October 12—Played organ in church. Went to chess club; won all three games.

October 13—An important Trumpeter meeting today; much more business than usual.

October 14—Nothing special today.

October 15—Rained heavily, which I welcomed.

October 16—Played chess with Captain Gwin. He won 2 of 3 games.

October 17—Played two more games of chess with Captain Gwin; I won both.

October 18—Have no classes on Saturday mornings, so I caught up with my correspondence.

October 19—Enjoyed the ham we had for dinner. No room skins today. An unusually large crowd at parade. Spent a quiet evening in barracks listening to symphonies on Hi Fi.

October 20—Very warm today. Had much studying to do; CQ's were busier than usual.

October 21—Participated in quite a heated debate in military today with Captain Smollen. I think that I won in every respect, although Captain wouldn't admit his defeat. Was congratulated by several classmates.

October 22—Had movies about platoon tactics in drill; were very good.

October 23—Late breakfast. Needed extra sleep.

October 24—A most regular Friday.

October 25—Spent afternoon visiting and playing chess with the boys across the hall. Had a very good time.

October 26—Went to early church. I enjoyed coffee hour afterwards in the parish hall. Then ate breakfast at Dragon's Den.

October 27—Father Lembcke's class didn't meet today. Read in library during free period.

October 28—An ordinary day.

October 29—Slightly colder.

October 30—Very chilly. Played Thompson in chess. He won.

October 31—Not at all like Halloween.

November 1—Mother came down today for the week end. Was sure good to eat at Maib's; had a big sirloin steak with all the trimmings. Had a permit, so I spent the evening playing scrabble and catching up on news from home.

November 2—Went to early church. Mother and I dined at Maib's; had prime ribs. Another delicious steak for supper. Was surprised to learn the company had a perfect Sunday inspection, no room skins.

November 3—French did not meet today, due to Colonel Buck's bad cold. Enjoyed the free period. Maybe he'll still be sick tomorrow.

November 4—Went to the first seasonal concert of the K. C. philharmonic. Handel's "Water Music Suite" was wonderful, and I loved Schalkowsky's fifth. Was 1 a.m. when we got back.

November 5—Practiced organ for two hours. Played my Bach favorites, and commenced work on Borowski's first sonata, a beautiful work.

November 6—A good breakfast today! Had creamed sausage on biscuits.

November 7—Teachers' meeting in K.C. Military department took over. Corps experienced a field day of road marches and bivouac. Enjoyed crisp weather and exercise, but pitching tents proved to be a nuisance. Was stop night this evening.

November 8—Battalion went to Columbia for Missouri-Colorado game. Arrived around 10, and I had a lot of fun exploring the town and eating lunch. Had excellent seats for the game. Colorado 33—Missouri 6.

November 9—Lost my blue hat during parade. Had picture taken for paper with other Trumpeter officers. Spent the evening listening to classical Hi Fi.

November 10—A most interesting French class. Discussed world affairs under learned leadership of Colonel Buck, our outstanding dean. Wonder what we'll talk about tomorrow?

November 11—Had excellent chili for lunch, which made a big hit at our table. Played cards with Howell and Harrison during evening permit.

November 12—1,000 word theme due for English, chose theological essay. My favorite class.

November 13—Late BRC. Extra sleep was welcome.

November 14—An ordinary day. I received four letters and a package at mail call.

November 15—Crum was on furlough, so I played the organ in chapel. Stamp club had its first meeting. I am president. Spoke about my own collection.

November 16—Played organ in church today. Pleasant coffee hour in parish hall following service.

November 17—Considerable free time, so I caught up with my correspondence.

November 18—Second symphony concert. Van Cliburn presented Tchaikovsky's piano concert; was excellent. Arrived in K. C. earlier than usual, so Andy Zaplana and I had supper at the K.C. Club. Elegant atmosphere as well as menu.

November 19—Had considerable free time after drill, so I discussed my essay outline with Captain Brown, my English instructor.

November 20—I had a permit and soupies. Ate supper at Mail's and went to movie. Very good picture.

November 21—Had much Trumpeter work to do—recorded lineage, wrote editorial, etc. Instructor in military told of his experience in Korea. An interesting hour.

November 22—Had a good, long organ practice. Spent rest of afternoon visiting with Captain Bell.

November 23—Went to K. C. with Hollingshead and Captain Gwin. We ate supper at the Golden Ox. I had soup, marinated herring, baked potato, garden salad, garlic bread, fillet mignon, coffee and cranberry sherbet. We saw "Windjammer," an excellent movie, and then returned.

November 24—Nothing special today.

November 25—Extremely frigid. The first cold day we've had.

November 26—I worked in the library getting material for a history paper. Went to bed early.

November 27—Felt very lucky to have third hour free, because this enabled me to go to church. Served as acolyte. Snow storm started in afternoon and continued through night. Thanksgiving dinner was marvelous, especially the delicious dressing.

November 28—Late BRC. Enjoyed band practice.

November 29—Was on post today. Spent the time as rec room supervisor.

November 30—Went to the movies this afternoon. What a dud! Spent evening visiting with friends in "A" Co.

December 1—Conducted first Trumpeter meeting today. Studied both C.Q.s on six weeks French test.

December 2—Got an M on French test. Signed up today for winter athletics. I am taking bowling and recreational swimming. Took a permit and spent the evening in the recreation room.

December 3—Cloudy all day and rather dull. Went bowling today but fared badly.

December 4—Dull and cloudy today. Had the whole afternoon free but didn't get anything accomplished. Attended squad meeting (third C.Q. Emphasized "sharpening up.")

December 5—Got up early this morning (4:15) to study for Bible literature test. Was quite tired by the third period. Went down to barracks after dinner and slept for two hours.

December 6—Spent an extraordinary evening in the barracks. As this was Saturday night we decided to have some fun. We got into a mess of trouble, getting many demerits. The room was in a terrible mess, but we got it cleaned up for Sunday inspection.

December 7—Went to church this morning with Mort and ate breakfast at Dragon's Den afterward. "B" Company won parade today. Barracks was then decorated with green and red papers which put a great deal of color in the building. Christmas music resounded throughout the barracks that evening.

December 8—Moved out of room today, upstairs into a "B" Company room. I hated to leave that room which I had lived in for almost a year, but it was out of my hands. We had a good steak dinner in the mess hall that evening.

December 9—Very cold today, wished I had worn my long underwear. Still is no snow on the ground, though radio announcements indicate there may be in the near future. Went swimming this afternoon and found the water to be quite warm but upon leaving the pool, I was chilled to the bone and ran all the way back down to the barracks.

December 10—Went bowling this afternoon after drill (122, 152). Bowling alley was beautifully decorated for Christmas. There are now only eight more days till furlough begins—anticipation is becoming heightened.

December 11—Sun was out for only a few hours today yet it was quite warm for this time of year. Turned in our overcoats to be cleaned for furlough today. I spent most of the day in excess and study hall. Altogether it was a most boring day.

December 12—In English literature today we listened to a recording of Elizabethan Love Songs. These were most interesting and enchanting. Everyone was much entertained. Later in the afternoon took my camera and went for a stroll out towards the Missouri river. Got some pretty good pictures.

December 13—Only five more days! First floor of "B" Barracks was decorated very nicely this afternoon while most of the corps was busy cleaning rifles to turn in before furlough. Christmas dance was held tonight in the gymnasium—almost everyone went. It was a beautiful affair. Many girls had come long distances to participate.

December 14—Our last Sunday at Wentworth this year. Headquarters Company won parade today. After parade went to "Mardi Gras" playing at the Mainstreet theater. "B" Company had its Christmas party in the recreation room, plenty to eat.

December 15—Very warm today around 45 degrees. Still no snow. Turned in our civilian clothes to be cleaned and pressed at the laundry.

December 16—Picked up luggage today. Went to the concert in Kansas City tonight. Excellent violinist starred. Got back around 12:15 a.m.

December 17—Turned in rifles today and began packing. Took all wall hangings down and stored them in the closet along with dresser drawers, helmet liners, shoes and everything not being taken home.

January 4—Back to school today after a wonderful Christmas furlough. Had left home yesterday for K. C. Attended Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral this morning; a beautiful service! Took bus for Lexington at 2:00 p.m. All cadets reported to SRC & CQs following.

January 5—Nothing special today. Went to Dragon's Den with Voutaz and Zeilinger.

January 6—Discussed superiority of male sex today in French, especially that all great achievements in art are by men. Went to Dragon's Den with John and Jim sixth hour. Had elec club practice during band. Went to concert after supper. Beethoven's fifth and Weber's "Jubilee Overture" on program; enjoyed it very much.

January 7—Got rifles back and cleaned them during drill.

January 8—I worked on a book report that is due tomorrow.

January 9—Father Lembcke asked me to prepare a buffet supper for cadets at our table at his house. Sounds like fun.

January 10—Had a conference with Captain Hodnette. Later talked a long time with Captain Gwin; planned formal dinner for our club.

January 11—Breakfast at Dragon's Den. I attended the Christian Church for a change. Good sermon. Headquarters first in parade. Quiet evening in barracks.

January 12—Talked about French cathedrals in French class. Wrote theological essay for English during CQs.

January 13—Symphony concert tonight. Liked Mendelssohn's "Scotch Symphony" and "Fingal's Cave Overture."

January 14—Movies and indoor parade practice during drill.

January 15—Late BRC. A rough day in military.

January 16—Had fourth, fifth and sixth hours free. Spent evening permit with Tom in his room, discussing our hometowns.

January 17—No classes in morning. I had the opportunity to catch up on my correspondence.

January 18—Bishop present at church; had confirmation today. Then spent two hours talking with Blakemore in his room. Ate dinner with the Gottners at Maib's.

January 19—Got some new books in mail. Interviewed Captain Bell for feature.

January 20—Snowed a lot last night. The cadets had fun snow-balling each other.

January 21—Nothing special today.

January 22—Late BRC. Quiet, dull day.

January 23—A semester test in political science. I think that I made a passing grade.

January 24—Semester tests are over. What a relief!

January 25—Passed Sunday inspection with flying colors.

January 26—New semester began. Have chemistry now, but the class didn't meet today.

January 27—Think I'll like chemistry; interesting class today. Went to the concert in K. C. Isaac Sterne was the guest artist. Played Brahms' D Maj. violin concerto.

January 28—English class met in library. Will write my research paper on Samuel Johnson's circle. Lectures on guard duty during drill.

January 29—Late BRC. Band rehearsed during all class periods, kept me busy with librarian duties. Reseated mess hall during activity period.

January 30—Attended educational tour meeting. Wonderful trip to Mexico planned; think I'll go. Spent permit sleeping.

January 31—Went to Military Ball with my girl. Enjoyed it a lot, especially beautiful decorations.

February 1—Sunday after the Military Ball—slept till about 9:40. Turned in rifles for ordnance inspection after parade at which "A" Company was awarded the military and disciplinary guidon and Headquarters the scholastic for the six weeks grading period. Went to K. C., with friends that night and ate at the Golden Ox. The steak tasted very good.

February 2—Cold and cloudy today. Ate lunch at Dragon's Den with Mort after Trumpeter meeting.

February 3—Stayed up late to study economics and Bible literature. Another rather dull day.

February 4—Had three periods free this morning during which time very little was accomplished. Got rifles back today, oiled them and put them back in the racks. Bowling today wasn't too bad—148, 141. Took a permit tonight and went to the show.

February 5—Late BRC this morning. Bright sunny day. A few games of ping pong this afternoon. Military was quite interesting today. Practiced sustained fire on the range. Had a stop day and permit tonight. Went to bed early.

February 6—Late BRC again this morning with only one class. Caught up on my Trumpeter work. Interviewed Jeffrey Green for a feature in the paper. Supper was really a riot. My friend, Gary Gottner accidentally got a pitcher of milk spilled on him—just couldn't stop laughing. Went to the show again tonight—"The Remarkable Mr. Pennypacker" was playing.

February 7—Saturday—pretty tiring day—spent entire afternoon in excess. Spent the evening at Capt. Morgan's watching television.

February 8—A Sunday morning—How I love them. Slept till 9:30 a.m., as my roommate had the room pretty much prepared for inspecting—floor waxed and everything. Still got four room skins. Went bowling that afternoon. After supper went bowling again with some friends. I registered an all-time high 218 bowling score.

February 9—Had French toast this morning which seemed to disagree with me. During the activity period, the Trumpeter staff

picture was taken. Had another permit tonight—which I spent at Colonel McCarthy's apartment listening to medieval tavern music, ballads, and folk music in which he has a fabulous interest. Just barely got back to barracks on time.

February 10—Very tiring day—nothing seemed to go right. Late to one class which cost me three demerits. Spent my permit in the barracks.

February 11—Things went a lot better today. I spent the second, third, fourth periods in barracks reading *Triumph and Tragedy*. Bowling went pretty well today 151, 120. Spent evening in the barracks studying French and economics.

February 12—Late BRC this morning. Had a good breakfast of doughnuts and milk. Police detail was a riot. Everyone was laughing as we were all ordered to pick up at least 10 pieces of paper.

February 13—Extraordinary day with first four periods free. Slept part of the afternoon. Went to the basketball game tonight.

February 14—Saturday—I arose at 4:30 a.m., and made a feeble attempt to study. Went back to bed at 4:45. I spent afternoon listening to records of Mozart.

February 15—Ate three rolls, a vanilla malt, order of toast, coffee and a salad for breakfast. We won parade today. I think Captain Howell was happy for a change.

February 16—First call was too early for me this morning. I groped around in the dark trying to find my laundry and green slacks. Things were very disorganized as they usually are Monday mornings. It was dark and foggy going up the hill for breakfast and the company presented a weird sight shuffling along through the eerie light with laundry bags and green slacks hanging from stooped shoulders at all angles. The rest of the day was pretty much routine.

February 17—This is one day I accomplished very much. Spent a good deal of time in the library working on my term paper for English literature.

February 18—Basketball game this afternoon. We lost by one point. Had a permit tonight. I spent the evening up in McCarthy's apartment listening to folk songs.

February 19—Late breakfast again this morning. The sun was up long before we were. Began shooting in MST 4 today. I didn't do too well. Began work on an editorial this evening but didn't get it completed.

February 20—Annual Wentworth Show in Kansas City is to be held tonight. I spent two hours this morning shining brass, shoes, belts and cleaning hat and blue uniform. We left Wentworth at 5:00 p.m. and headed for Kansas City. We had 16 buses to transport the corps. The show was very entertaining and a pleasant diversion. We arrived back at the Academy at 1:30 a.m.

February 21—Colonel Wikoff announced this noon in the mess hall that the show was a complete success with the largest crowd ever recorded. I went to the movie with my old roommate tonight. Stopped off at the Maid-rite on the way back and purchased two cokes.

February 22—Slept late again this Sunday morning allowing ample time for my roommate to clean the room up for inspection. I guess I should let him sleep late next Sunday. Went bowling tonight but didn't do too well, maybe I'm not cut out to be a bowler.

February 23—Same old routine today except I forgot to go to "Bec" swimming (received 12 demerits). Received heavy assignment at the Trumpeter meeting today; anyway it seemed heavy at the time. Went to bed late again.

February 24—Today was a little more interesting. Had a great time in the dining hall laughing. Most of my classes were interesting enough today. After the classes were over I went horseback riding out at the stables.

February 25—It was one of those beautiful Missouri days, almost like spring. Was in the mood for studying today so I accomplished a lot.

February 26—Late BRC this morning. I spent the first period in French, second period in American history and third period in the library. After dinner I slept through my history class, fifth period finished my nap in the barracks and at the beginning of the sixth period I trotted off to marksmanship (MST 4). Studied French and English literature during C.Q.

February 27—The boys leaving for the Educational Tour are making final preparations today. I am packed and ready to get started.

February 28—Less than two weeks till we go home on furlough. Went down town today to the bakery and bought some rolls. I got back just in time to get to attend my last class. Went to bed late after writing some letters.

March 1—Enjoyed Mexico City today on the educational tour. Went to several churches, including the cathedral, and later to the Palace of Natural Art.

March 2—More wonderful sightseeing in Mexico City. Attended bull fights, toured museums, and visited the best restaurants. I didn't enjoy the bullfights and was glad when we left.

March 3—Visited the pyramids of the sun and moon. We had considerable free time and I did much resting.

March 4—The group traveled to Taxco, silver mining town in mountains. We arrived in the quaint mining town in the middle of afternoon and we went to silver shops and other major attractions.

March 5—Continued on to Acapulco. The rest of the corps at school started spring furlough today. Ours begin on evening of the 8th.

March 13—Back to school after a wonderful foreign tour and furlough at home.

March 14—Very nice to see all my Wentworth friends again. Spent much time talking about the tour. Crum was gone, so I played the organ during chapel service.

March 15—Gave steak party for several friends at Maib's. Had a lot of fun, especially telling jokes and sharing gossip.

March 16—Back in the saddle of classes again. Father Lembcke's class was very interesting, as he told us how he makes pizza pie and bird nest soup.

March 17—St. Patrick's Day! Plenty of green evidence, even green mashed potatoes and ice cream.

March 18—I had a permit and went to the show with Paul Harrison.

March 19—A dull, dreary day. Studied and hit the sack at 9:30.

March 20—We talked about society life during the time of Louis XIV in French. Very interesting. Wrote an editorial on music for *The Trumpeter*.

March 21—Went to show with McDowell. Played cards with Stephens and Murphy during CQ. I was very tired and went to bed early.

March 22—Needed rest, so attended the late church service. Had supper at Maib's with Petersen and Whipple. Very lovely, sunny weather. Had outdoor parade, the first this spring.

March 23—Very busy day. Only one free period. Much business conducted at the Trumpeter meeting; lots of work to do. Went around in circles all day.

March 24—Three free periods in a row so I had plenty of time to shine for noon inspection; but wanted to sleep, and that's what I did.

March 25—Went to band practice as usual. We're still working on a piece we started weeks ago.

March 26—Late B.R.C. I completed my 500-word theme for Capt. Brown.

March 27—Spent my permit time at Capt. Barry's, listening to the opera, *The Magic Flute*. Had a good time.

March 28—Nothing important to do in afternoon, so I cleaned the room for Sunday inspection.

March 29—Lovely Easter weather. Ate breakfast with Dean, Bill, and Bob, then went to the 10:30 high mass. Outdoor parade again. Headquarters won. Supper at Maib's with a few comrades.

March 30—The Dairy Queen opened today. It will provide a welcome opportunity for cadets to indulge in between-meal eating.

March 31—Rained all day. Between classes I caught up on my correspondence and I spent the evening in the library to prepare for a history test in Captain Barry's class.

April 1—Many April Fools' day tricks played today—shaving cream, ice water and incredible concoctions were essential equipment.

April 2—Everyone is beginning to prepare for G.I. inspection. Many floors are already waxed. Several persons began work a week or so ago.

April 3—Harlie Calvin and I took a permit together. Went downtown to the show—then went to Maib's restaurant for a snack. Arriving back at the barracks, we began to arrange the room in preparation for cleaning the floor.

April 4—Only two more days till G.I. Work has already commenced in earnest as dresser drawers, desks, shoe-lines and everything movable was placed outside the door. The hallways in the barracks became a junkpile. My roommate and I scrubbed and waxed our floor till about 4 p.m., at which time we ambled down toward the dairy queen to stuff on ice cream. Later we moved our furnishings back inside the room.

April 5—I awoke at 9:45, showered, and then went back to bed. By noon though the room was as prepared for the "grande" inspection as our combined talents could supply. Several company meetings today, outlining the schedule for the morrow—questions asked and answered—the bed felt good after the last two days of popping.

April 6—Sometime around 10:30 a huge Major burst into our room and asked Roy, "Who cleaned this room? Were we prepared for this inspection? Will I find any dirt?" Satisfied with our answers, he left. This was G.I.

April 7—Had a "stop night" tonight. Nearly half the corps went to the special show. The rest went back to the barracks to study, listen to music or sleep. Morris, Lee and I went to the show. Bought cokes on the way back.

April 8—Collected my \$3.00 from the Q.M. during the second period and paid off some debts. Fourth period went to the library to work on an editorial. Capt. Barry's Economic History class was interesting today even though we strayed from the subject.

April 9—Drill holiday this afternoon, but it meant no relief to me as I had excess. Spent the entire afternoon reading assorted essays by Emerson and Newton. Pretty sad day.

April 10—Late B.R.C. again this morning. The rest of the day followed as "per usual."

April 11—Had a free period this morning so worked on the room, putting up wall hangings and pictures. Beef stew was served in the mess hall this noon. Iced tea has become regulation now. CQ's were unusually quiet tonight. Got a lot of studying done. Retired early.

April 12—Made three trips to the dairy queen—really seem to be getting a passion for those vanilla cokes. B Company won parade again today. Studied English literature for a portion of the evening.

April 13—Five classes today followed by Trumpeter meeting.

April 14—Went to the Truman Library this afternoon with about 50 other cadets taking some form of history. Shook hands with the past president and toured the library with him. Very enjoyable trip. Took lots of pictures.

April 15—Group pictures were taken during drill period.

April 16—Late breakfast this morning. Took a Bible literature test without preparing for it. I wasn't too surprised at the results.

April 17—Another one of those bad days when it was all I could do to smile. No rational comments can be made.

April 19—We went out to eat a steak dinner at Maib's. Later we played cards. It was a very enjoyable day.

April 20—Back to the old grind at 6:25 the next morning. Had a very interesting lecture in French on Rousseau. American History was also interesting, but by the time 6th period English literature came around I could hardly keep my eyes open. Took a nap right after Trumpeter meeting.

April 21—Attended WMA vs Kemper track meet this afternoon. We won. Weather is turning for the better again—getting to look more like spring.

April 22—Had all morning free and I occupied the time listening to McCarthy's Bawdy Ballads. Bowling wasn't too good today (115, 143). Wrote two letters during CQ's.

April 23—Called home today as it was mother's birthday. The dog has grown quite a bit—sister doing fairly well at the University of Nebraska. Folks said they were coming down on the 29th of May.

April 24—Rec Swimming was a riot this afternoon with Dale Slumicko. Went back to the barracks to sleep before supper formation.

May 9—Slept all afternoon. Spent evening with Whipple on permit.

May 10—Went to early mass with Roper, Swenson and Roland. Breakfast in parish hall and then to "Slop Shop." Another fifth place in parade for HDQ's Company. Ate supper at Maib's with Gary Swenson. Afterwards returned to barracks and listened to a philharmonic concert on radio.

May 11—A heavy rain, but we needed it.

May 12—Nothing unusual to report today.

May 13—Practiced organ a while today. Worked on Borawski sonatas.

May 14—Two hours of chemistry as usual.

May 15—Band has been working on Tchaikowsky's "1812 Overture" for some time now. We plan to play it during the commencement concert. Hope it will be ready in time.

May 16—Spent afternoon playing cards with Tom Bradford. Had lots of fun. Had evening permit—went to show with David Zeilinger.

May 17—Time certainly does fly! Seems like the month just started yesterday. Won't be long till school's out.

May 18—Played chess with Robert Murphy. Wrote 1000 word theme for English. Last big assignment for the year.

May 19—An ordinary day. Everyone seems to be cramming for the final examinations that start next week.

May 21—Late BRC. Many letters in the mail today.

May 22—Practiced concert music in band today, getting ready for our presentation that starts commencement activities.

May 23—The corps engaged in maneuvers on the battlefield. I was a stretcher bearer with the medical unit.

May 24—Steve, Harry, Bill, Bob and I went to K.C. with Capt. Gwin. We ate fillet mignons at the Golden Ox. Then we went to the show. A wonderful evening!

May 25—The last week of school begins today. Worked almost all night for the final exam in biology.

May 26—Did very well in the biology test, much to my surprise.

May 27—Closing days are drawing nearer. Will be glad to get home.

May 28—Tests and more tests, and another day of the same routine.

May 29—The band presented its commencement concert tonight in the stadium. Included on the program was Tchaikowsky's "1812 Overture." Sounded very good.

May 30—Annual field day was held today and was followed by a luncheon for parents at the Wentworth Country Club. After the awards ceremony, I had the rest of the day free.

May 31—Final dress parade was at two o'clock, and it was followed by the traditional flag ceremony. Graduation ceremonies were held at eight o'clock, with Carl E. Bolte delivering the principal address . . . later, homeward bound. I'll be back next September and I hope that most of you will return too when the new term opens.
