It is the purpose of Wentworth Military Academy to provide the best conditions possible for the all 'round development of worthy boys and young men.

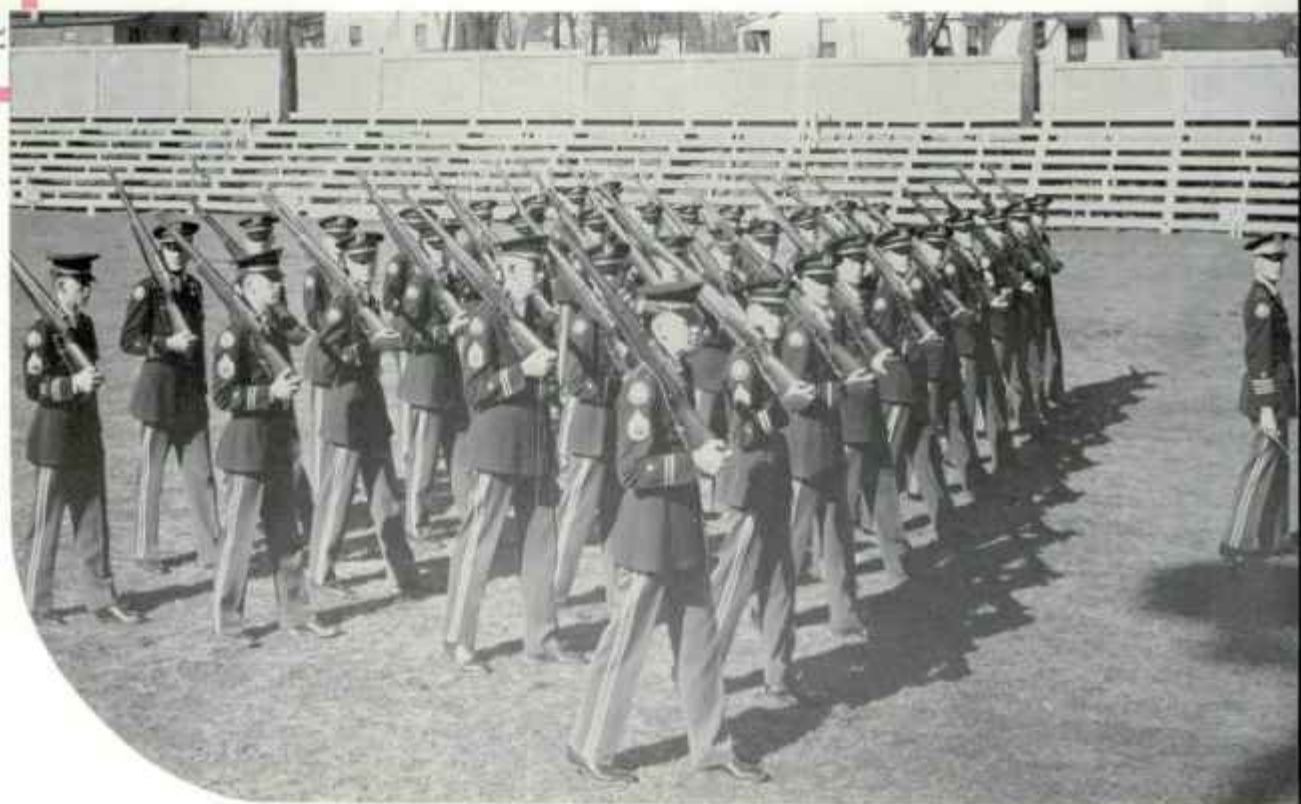
To attain this high purpose, the Academy places greatest emphasis upon these four points:

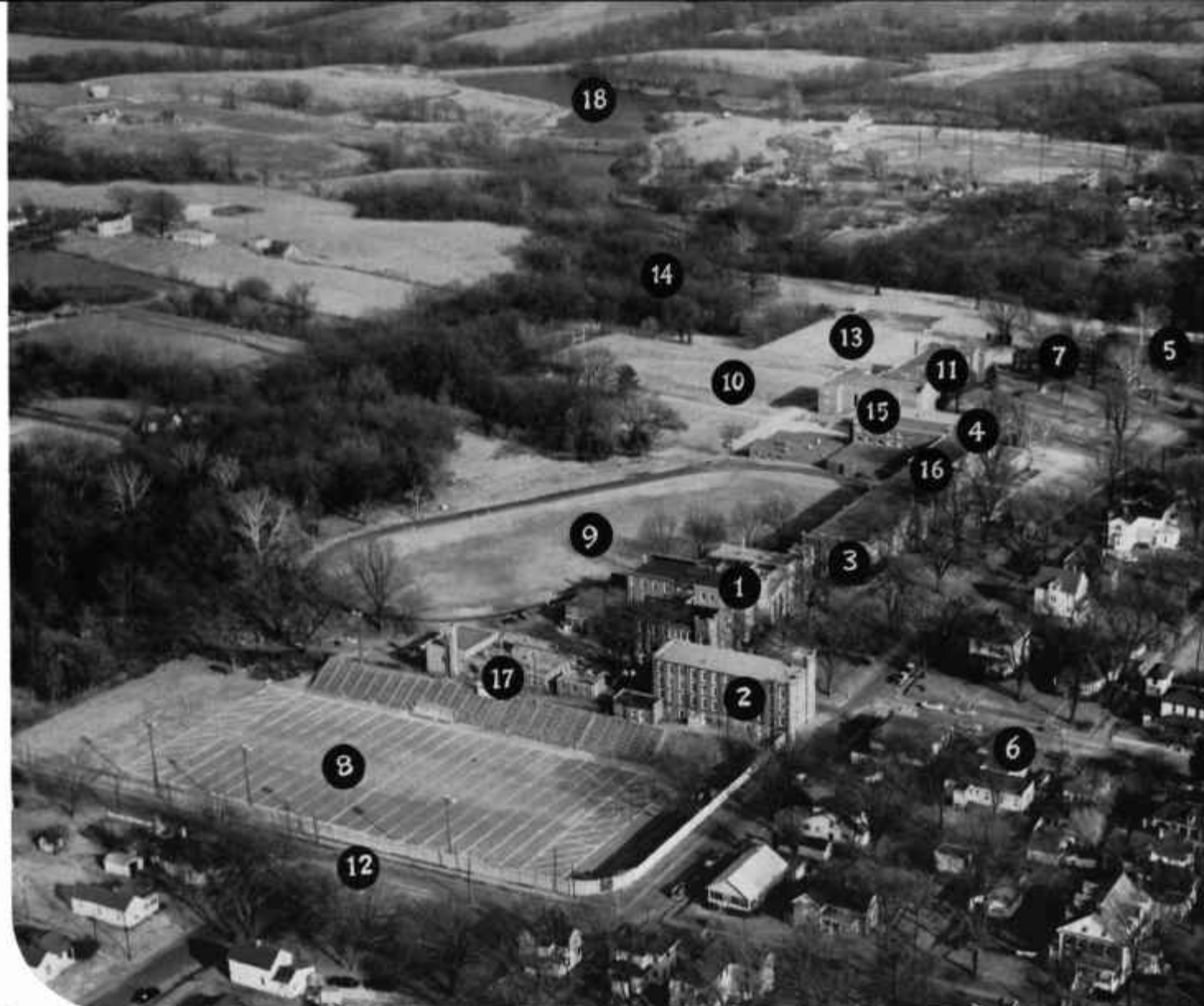

SINCE EIGHTEEN EIGHTY

One of the chief reasons why Wentworth has been able to achieve its lofty purpose lies in the fact that the Academy has been under one continuous administration since its founding. For nearly three-score years, Colonel Sanford Sellers was president of Wentworth. He enjoyed one of the most enviable records in the history of American education.

The Academy was founded by Stephen G. Wentworth, scion of a distinguished English family and a prominent Lexington banker, in 1880, as a memorial to his deceased son, William Wentworth. Mr. Wentworth immediately vested control of the institution in the hands of a board of trustees composed of a duly elected representative of each of the Evangelical churches of Lexington, and a president. Colonel Sellers was called to the new school in its first year and remained as its active head until 1938. Mr. Wentworth served as president of the Board from 1880 until his death in 1897.

It was the firm conviction of the founder, his board of trustees and President Sellers that a military boarding school provides the most effective possible means for giving young men the thorough mental, moral and physical training necessary to develop in them the highest traits of manhood. Thus, Wentworth became the first military school in the Missouri River Valley.

From the beginning the late President Sellers surrounded himself with the ablest faculty available—strong men of proved qualities and Christian character. Under his wise and forward-looking direction, Wentworth has grown steadily. Each year has shown marked improvement over the preceding year. Today Wentworth stands as one of the truly great educational institutions of our country—second to none in the opportunities it offers boys and young men for thorough preparation for professional studies, business and for life.

AN HISTORIC BACKGROUND

Throughout over half a century the Wentworth purpose has remained unchanged. The ideals which led to the Academy's founding and which have carried it steadily forward, shine just as brightly today as ever: the desire to give each youth every opportunity to develop fully his own individual personality; the aim that every cadet shall acquire a keen sense of duty and responsibility, both to himself and toward others; that he shall have the mental and moral power to make accurate judgment between right and wrong and the physical power to stand by his convictions.

These high standards have dominated Wentworth for generations. But to maintain them and assure their full and continuous application, it has been found necessary to limit the enrollment. Wentworth today is a relatively small school—many times larger than in 1880, to be sure, yet small enough that every individual student is given the private attention so essential to his all-round development.

The surrounding country affords a wealth of historically important Civil War sites and the town of Lexington itself retains much of the tradition of the old south. Here enthusiasm for the reminders of our country's glorious past is combined with the enthusiasm for modern adventure to promote the rapid development of the boy's mental, moral and physical resources.

The Wentworth Military Academy of today is vastly different from the Wentworth of 1880. From year to year it has enlarged its facilities, increased its enrollment and changed its physical appearance until there is little to remind one of the early days. Numerous modern and attractive buildings have been erected as they were needed. Old buildings have been torn away when they were no longer useful. Spacious military and athletic fields have been added. One of the finest gymnasiums in the country has been built. Every new method in teaching that has been found definitely superior to older methods has been adopted. Yet, some of the fundamental principles that guided the first company are adhered to just as strictly today.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT

MILITARY training at Wentworth has always been a strong feature, but it is never permitted to interfere with the scholastic work of the Academy. It can be shown, moreover, that military discipline has a decidedly advantageous effect upon classroom work.

In recognition of the superior military work done at Wentworth, in 1889 the Academy became a post of the Missouri National Guard. Graduates of the Academy who resided in Missouri, became eligible for commissions in this organization.

Wentworth has been under the direct supervision of the War Department of the United States Government since 1895, when the first active army officer was detailed to the Academy. Now 3 officers, 4 non-commissioned officers and one civilian assistant are in charge of military instruction. In addition, the War Department furnishes around \$50,000 worth of equipment to be used for instruction purposes. Wentworth is one of the original Honor Schools of the United States, the highest rating given by the War Department. The Academy has been a unit of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps from the time that organization was established.

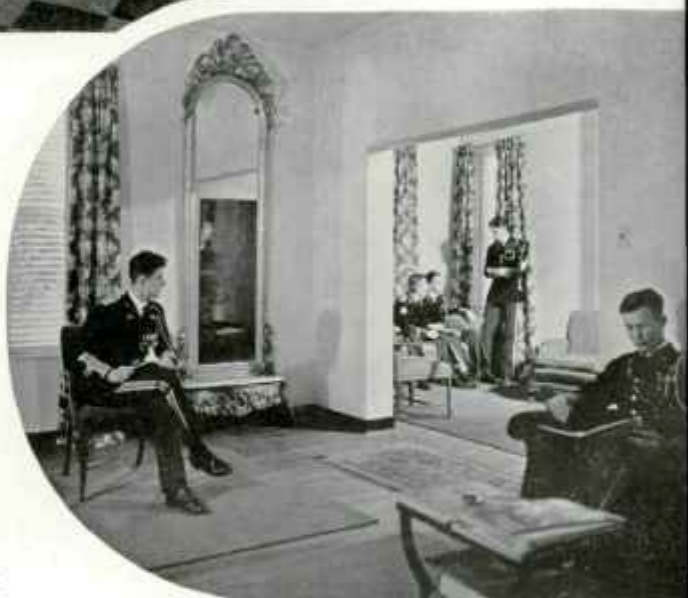

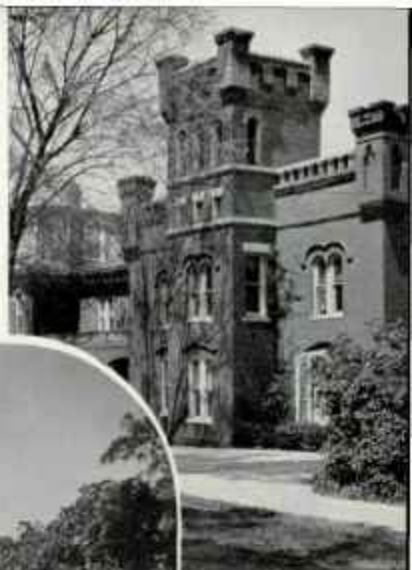

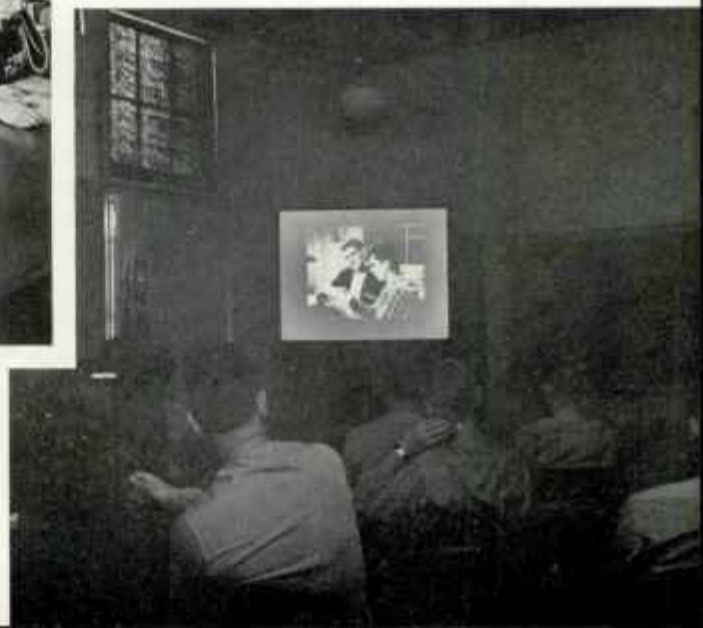
SCHOLASTIC

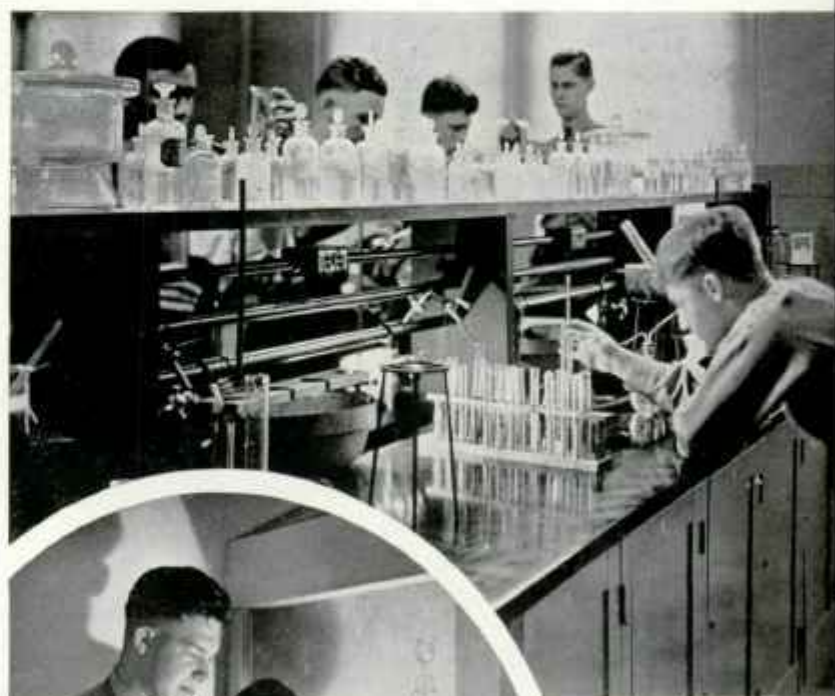
DEPARTMENT



The scholastic department is divided into two separate and distinct units: the high school, which offers four years of preparatory work, and the junior college, which offers two years of liberal arts and science. Each has its own

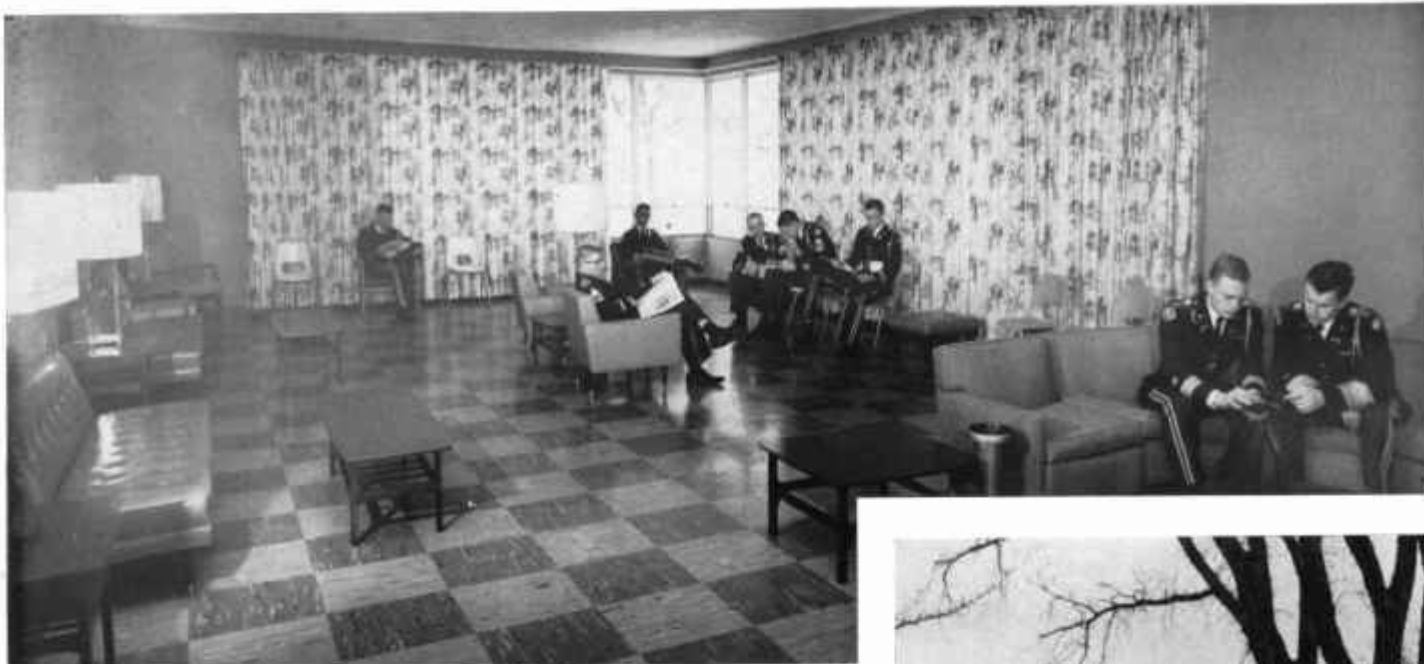
organization separate from the other. Both divisions are fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; an organization composed of the leading colleges and preparatory schools in twenty states. This recognition means that graduates of either department are eligible to enter any institution in the United States that receives students by certification.

It is our aim to see that each cadet masters every lesson thoroughly. To accomplish this, every student is taught correct study methods and thoroughly schooled in correct uses of libraries and laboratories. Classes are small, which permits individual attention. Most of the faculty members live in the buildings with students. They are readily accessible for special help. From time to time a personal study is made of each cadet to determine his points of weakness and help him overcome them.

\$750,000 BUILDING

AVIATION FLIGHT TRAINING GROUP

AVIATION

Wentworth participated in the Federal Aeronautics Administration Civilian Pilot Training Program from its inception in 1939 through the change to C. A. A. War Training Service until June, 1943, when all but 80 out of 712 colleges and universities throughout the country were eliminated due to curtailment of this type of training. However, the academy administration, believing aviation training to be very important now and in the future to the youth of the nation, secured permission from F. A. A. officials to continue flight training on a civilian basis and at the expense of the trainee.

Wentworth operates in conjunction with the Earl Haines Flying Service at the Lexington Airport as a certified flying school fully approved by the F.A.A. The flight training program, including ground school, far surpasses the minimum requirements set forth by the Federal Aeronautics Administration qualifying cadets for Private and Commercial Pilot Certificates. It consists of instruction in both dual and solo flight time.

The records of the graduates of the Wentworth Flight Training are outstanding. During the war the graduates of this training program fought on every front where Americans were in combat.

AT WENTWORTH

NO TWO days at Wentworth are quite the same, for a widely varied program of scholastic, military, athletic and other activities is used to keep the interest of the cadets at high pitch and their appetites for learning well whetted. Furthermore, no two students have quite the same duties to perform throughout any given day. There is, however, a definite routine that all cadets follow each day. It is used to instill perfect regularity and promptness in attendance upon all duties prescribed for one and all cadets alike.

While it requires some adjustments for new students to become accustomed to this routine, any slight hint of monotony is soon lost in the kaleidoscopic whirl of the school year.

To give parents and others a better insight, the following pages have been used to set forth, pictorially, the day's activities from Reveille to Taps, of a typical Wentworth boy whom we will designate as Cadet Harlan.

The pictures in this section were taken several years ago. However, since they illustrate life at Wentworth of today, they are still timely. They are retained because so many of the cadets shown served in the Armed Forces of their country and so well illustrate the value of military training as received while at Wentworth.

Since the importance of military preparedness is becoming increasingly evident by the changing world situation, the training illustrated in this picture section has a special significance.

There have been some uniform changes as may be seen by referring to the section on Wentworth uniforms.

HERE is Harlan, a typical Wentworth cadet—a fine young American—manly, scholarly and upright. His respect for duty and responsibility has won for him the rank of sergeant. He may have come from a large city or a very small town—that makes no difference to the democratic spirit that prevails at Wentworth. He may be from a wealthy family or a family in meager circumstances—most of his classmates would never know, nor even be curious, unless he chose to tell them. But he typifies all the fine qualities of a deserving and ambitious youth as he goes through the tried and age-proved Wentworth process of becoming a real man, a real asset to himself, his family and friends, and society as a whole.

Harlan, like all the others, participates in many activities besides those shown. But let's follow him through a typical day.

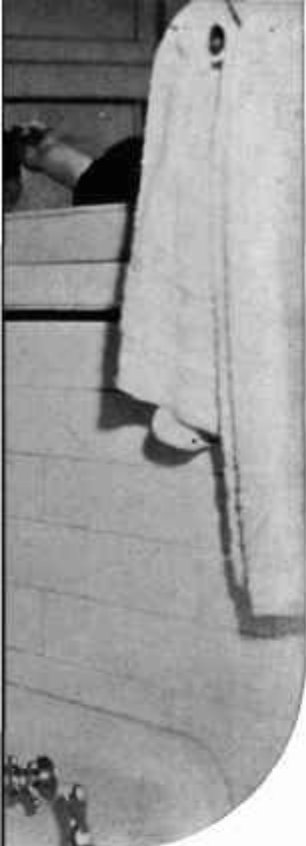


"I CAN'T GET 'EM UP," blows the bugler, but he does, and at 6:35 o'clock another day is under way. Cadet Harlan goes first to the sanitary lavatory on his floor. A good washup is part of the routine, for a cadet is expected to keep himself clean at all times. At 6:50 he goes to a well-prepared breakfast.

After breakfast, rooms must be cleaned. One of the basic aims of our system is to form personal habits of order. Each morning Harlan makes his own bed, puts his clothes in order and helps his roommate clean the room.

Strict inspection of quarters is a daily routine. Formal inspection of Harlan's person, room and equipment occurs on Sunday morning. At this time unusual care must be taken in cleaning the room. Our friend sees that hidden corners are carefully dusted, chairs polished, and everything put in order. Then he takes care of his person. There's brass to shine, leather to polish, hair to brush, and whiskers to be removed. A certain time is allotted for this preparation and all work must be done within that time. This young fellow knows that any deficiency in this work receives what is known in Academy language as a "skin"—which counts against one's company in color competition.

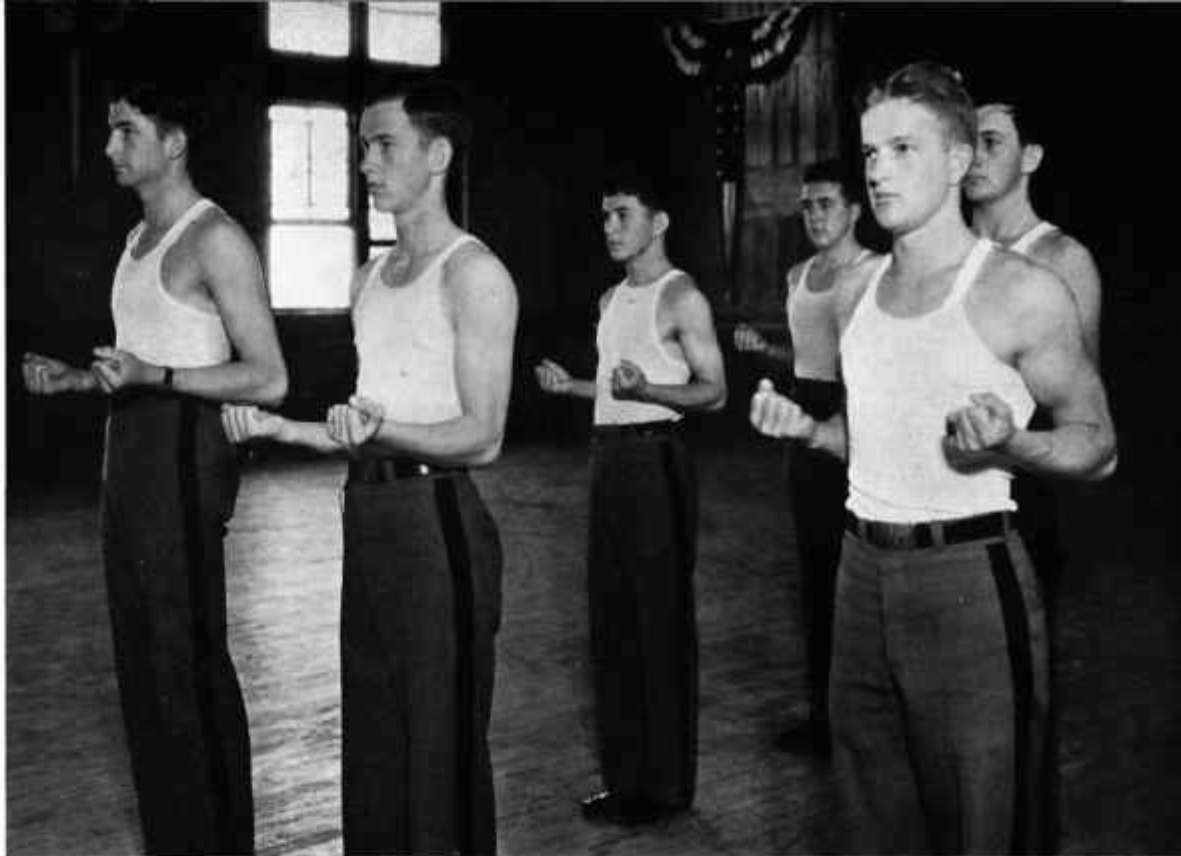
AT 8 O'CLOCK in the morning, classes convene. Harlan makes his way to a small class on his schedule where personal attention is his at any time it is needed. Our cadet is carefully instructed in the handling of delicate scientific equipment. He is not forced to grope blindly for information. That which is true of the science laboratories is equally true in all other classrooms.

Time passes rapidly in the classroom or laboratory because the work is interesting. The scholastic day is divided into two equal parts, with four classes in the morning and two in the afternoon.



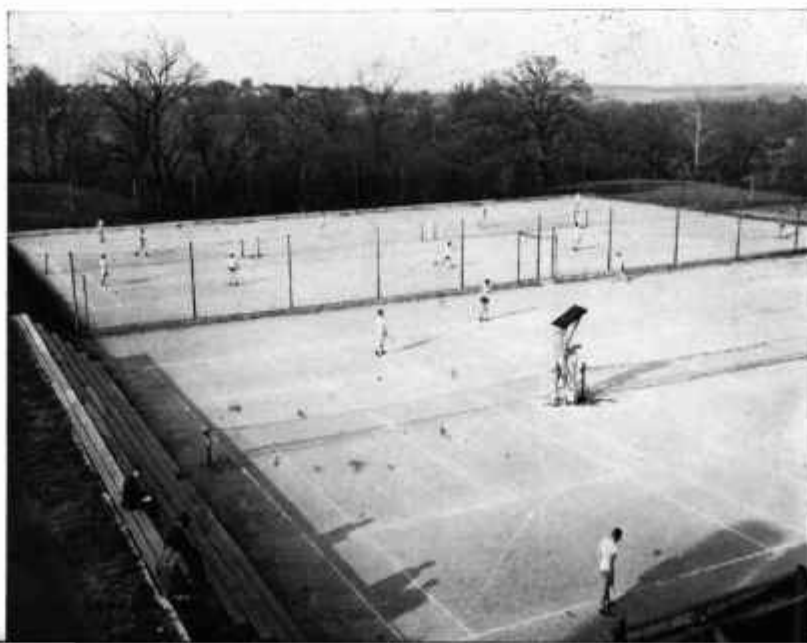
*Our Cadet goes through a course of calisthenics to promote grace and health.

CALISTHENICS play an important role in the physical education of Cadet Harlan. No effort is made to indulge in this or any other exercise in the early morning hours when the body is at its lowest ebb. All such exercises are taken by our cadet after a hearty breakfast and morning classes. The exercises are intended to promote graceful movement as well as better health. The calisthenics used by the United States Army are followed. They are led by senior cadet officers.

So long as the weather permits, the calisthenics are held in the open, but they are taken in the large gymnasium, where an entire battalion may take part at the same time, when rain or cold is in the air.

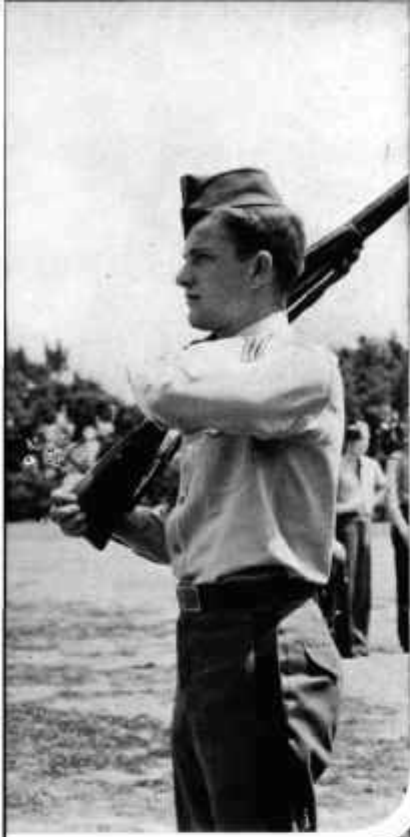

DRILL is a very formal affair. It is on the drill field that Harlan learns much of courtesy, discipline and alertness. He, with his entire battalion, is thoroughly schooled in good citizenship, taught the proper respect for superiors and trained in leadership.

Learning to drill a squad is the first training in leadership. Throughout the year squad drill and competition is a part of the regular military routine. The squad is the smallest military unit and consists of nine to twelve men, two of whom are sergeants. All instruction is conducted by cadets under the personal supervision of members of the military faculty.

Although military work takes but one hour each day, the training is intensive and much more thorough than that found in larger units. Personal attention is given the individual cadet on the military field as well as in the classroom, and each cadet has an equal chance to advance to important positions in Wentworth's military realm. In the army, the navy and the marine corps Wentworth is glorified by its alumni who have received their commissions and are distinguishing themselves in official capacities of these respective branches of service.



Like many other cadets, Harlan finds the extended order drill more interesting. This drill consists of combat methods. He is taught to make use of cover, to advance and to fire. No actual firing is done during this drill, however, for all the ammunition used is dummy material. Initiative and leadership are required in this work. Situations arising in the problems furnished by the War Department call for quick thinking and immediate action.

Here our typical cadet finds extended order drill interesting and instructive.

FOLLOWING the morning classes comes lunch time and our cadet is ready to eat. Academy menus are always varied and pleasing. Meals are carefully planned to suit the needs of all cadets. They are healthful and nutritious and just what active, hard-working boys require. Meal times are at 7:00 in the morning, 12:10 and 6:10. This schedule is varied only on Sunday, when dinner becomes a more elaborate meal served at 12:30.

After dinner there is a recreation period during which Harlan and other cadets may do pretty much as they choose. The recreation room is a popular place at this time.

CADET HARLAN attends interesting, informative and inspirational meetings in the chapel, immediately before lunch on Wednesdays and Saturdays. These meetings are conducted by the Academy Chaplain, but are not strictly religious. Travel talks, health lectures, scientific demonstrations and short sermons, presented by outstanding speakers, are frequently on the program. The service is opened with a hymn, prayer and responsive readings, and closed with the singing of "Wentworth," the Academy song.

"Pep" meetings, preceding important athletic contests, are held in the gymnasium. These are always occasions of great fun. Students and faculty make rousing speeches. The cadet band furnishes gay, martial music and everyone anticipates the big game on the morrow. Athletic contests are important recreational events. Every cadet attends them.

PERSONAL attention is not confined to the classroom nor to the evening study periods. Harlan and many other cadets seek assistance in the spacious Academy library. The faculty officer in charge is always ready and willing to help any student, no matter what his problem. Whatever the subject, the faculty officer is qualified to give the guidance needed.

Wentworth's library is one of the most important places on the campus. It contains more than 10,000 books on nearly every subject one could imagine. Reference books include the famous Oxford English Dictionary and many sets of encyclopedias.

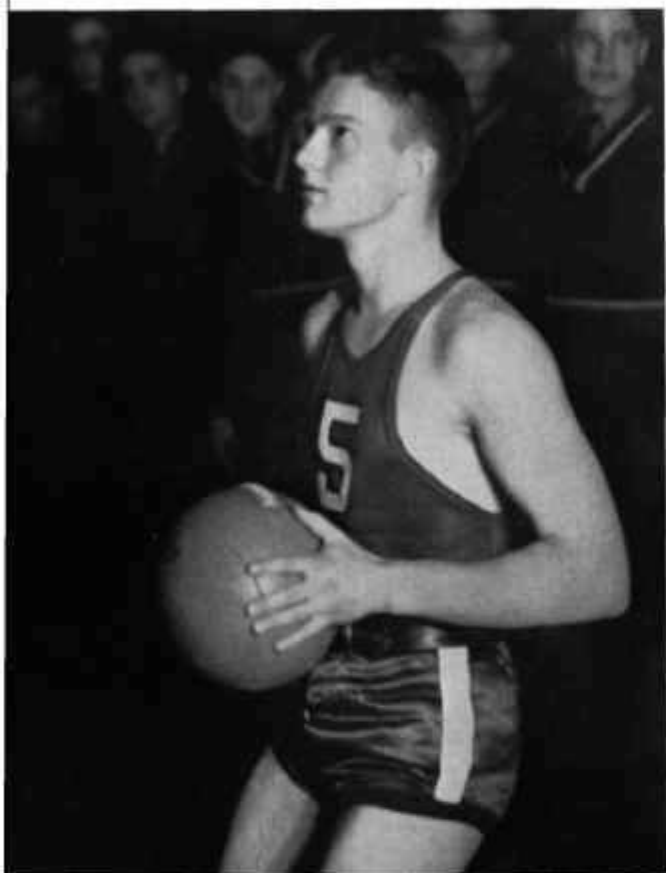
TRAINING for leadership is important on the football field as well as everywhere else at Wentworth. More than fifty cadets answer the varsity call each year and large squads turn out for company teams. All players receive intensive training, both in the art of the game and in clean sportsmanship.

Football ranks as the number one sport and the Red Dragon elevens are consistent winners. The fine spirit of players and corps is credited with being a strong determining factor in every contest.

In the winter months basketball comes into the spotlight. Again there are the varsity and company teams and a place for every cadet who desires to play. Home games are played in the spacious gymnasium where there are two courts and ample space for spectators.

Wentworth is a member of the Junior College Interstate conference, an athletic association numbering seven schools as members. The Wentworth High School teams are not members of a conference at this time. Almost every major and minor sports are on the Wentworth program—all played under competent coaches—and every cadet is required to participate.





*The gymnasium is 220 x 55 feet. It contains two regular basket ball courts, a large stage, a swimming pool 20 x 60 feet, locker rooms, showers and gymnastic equipment.

THE sparkling, crystal-clear water of the swimming pool is inviting to cadets the year 'round. The pool is of regulation size (20x60) and is the scene of frequent water sports and aquatic meets. It is the purpose to teach every cadet to swim well. The water is warmed to a healthful temperature and kept pure by efficient filtration and chemical treatment.

After thirty-five minutes of recreation following the supper hour, evening study is begun at 7 o'clock. Each cadet retires to his own room for a two-hour period of quiet. There is no stuffy, noisy hall in which cadets are confined. Instead, individual initiative is encouraged. Faculty officers are in constant attendance throughout the period, giving advice where it is needed and encouragement at all times.





TAPS, at which time all lights must be turned out and all cadets remain quiet, is sounded at 10 o'clock. The soft notes of the bugle call to close the activities of an eventful day and the peace of slumber envelops healthy young bodies until another dawn.

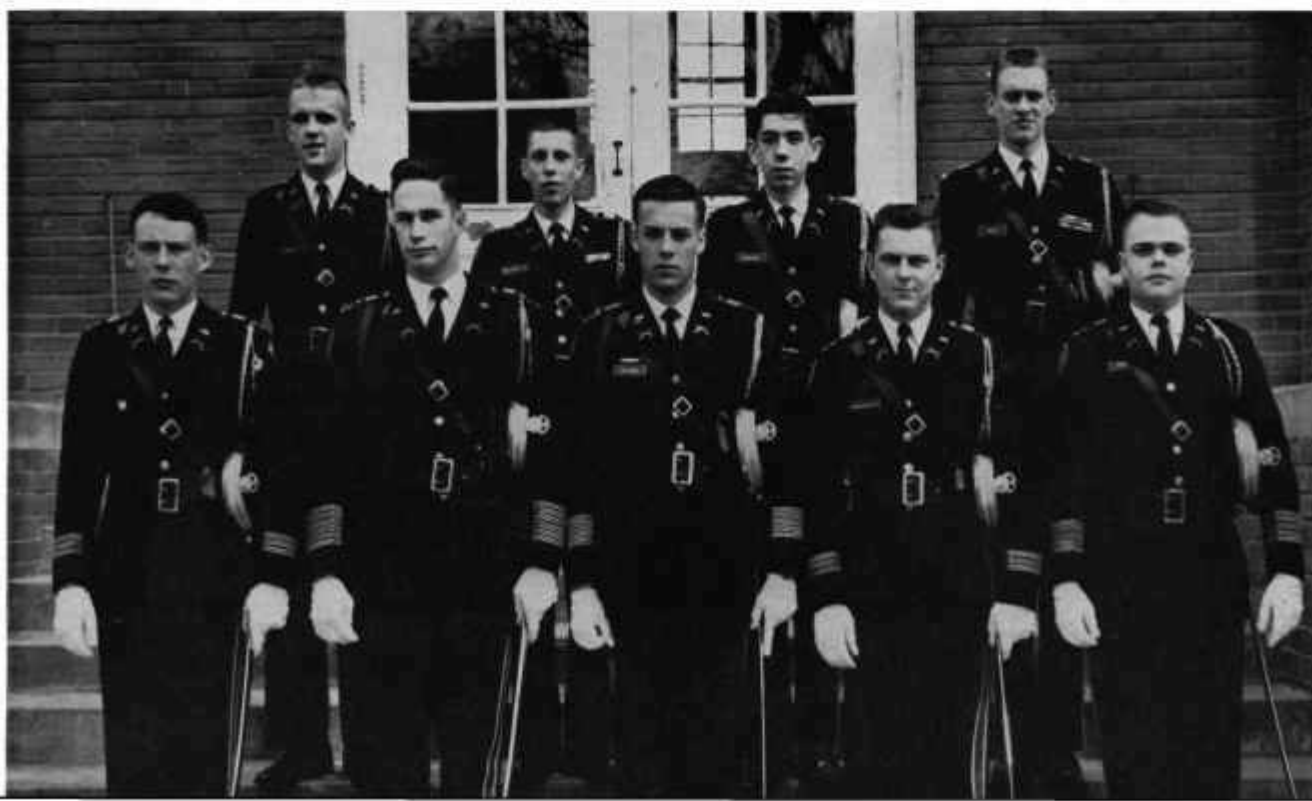

SPECIAL EVENTS MARKED THE 75th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOUNDING OF WENTWORTH During 1954-1955

Several special events were held, pictured below (or above). The first of these was to recognize Founders Day and honor the memory of Stephen G. Wentworth, the founder, and Col. Sanford Sellers, the first superintendent, who served as head of the Academy for 58 years. The speaker and honored guest was ex-President Harry S. Truman, who addressed the Cadet Corps and the guests in attendance and later placed wreaths on the graves of the two men who were honored. Mr. Truman was made an Honorary Colonel of the Wentworth Cadet Corps during the visit he and his wife made to the Academy.

The second event, although an annual one, our Wentworth show in Kansas City had the distinctive 75th Anniversary color.

The third special occasion was one which received nationwide publicity, a re-enactment of the Battle of Lexington which

occurred in September of 1861. Joining with the Cadet Corps in actually portraying the Battle were units from the regular Army, the National Guard, and ROTC units of Kansas City. The leading citizens of the City of Lexington, and in fact the whole community, joined in preparation for this very unusual event. As much realism as possible was achieved, even including the co-operation of the elements because it rained continuously during the day, May 12, 1955, on which this event was held, as it had during the actual Battle, according to authentic records. Attending the event were many high ranking Army officers and other distinguished citizens, which made it one of the most remarkable days in the entire history of Wentworth Military Academy and of the City of Lexington.

THE NEW CHAPEL

An outstanding addition to the facilities of Wentworth is the new chapel used for the first time during Commencement 1955. This building was dedicated November 6, 1955. An electric organ was installed later and was used for the first time

MEMORIES OF 1961-62

September 3—I reached the campus around one o'clock today. I enrolled and was in my room ready to start a new year by three o'clock.

September 4—About 100 old boys came in today. Most of the new boys look top-notch, but a lot of grinding drill won't hurt them. They'll get plenty!

September 5—Started classes today. Have a very good lineup, viz: Colonel Sellers, Captain Wilson, Captain Morgan, Captain Cotton and various military instructors.

September 6—Drew lock boxes today, attended classes and went to a two-hour drill period. It's easier than I thought to get back in groove here after a pleasurable summer.

September 7—We had a late B.R.C. this morning. Man, those things really help! I can see now I'm going to have trouble with my Latin class.

September 8—Latin is getting rougher and rougher. My room is in perfect condition, so I think; the room inspector doesn't.

September 9—My first Saturday here at school. Chapel's the same except we have a new chaplain. After chapel I cleaned my room and took an hour nap.

September 10—Well, I've been here a week now and it hasn't changed a bit other than physically. Several barracks have been done over and they're building an addition to the Scholastic building. I guess the Lutheran church is growing. Last year it had about 15 cadet members and this year it has around 35. The Methodist denomination is the largest on the campus with 150 members.

September 11—One of those "hard to get up Monday mornings". Went bowling and howled an alarming 72. Yes sir, I have seen better days.

September 12—took a permit tonight and went to the movie with Slater and Meyn. I was glad to get to bed because I was bushed!

September 13—Woke up very refreshed. But the day was uneventful, so I shall not waste your time with my petty troubles.

September 14—We had another late B.R.C. We had a good breakfast of sweet rolls, and hot cereal. The rest of the day was hectic and routine.

September 15—I had a long talk with Captain Logan today on whether or not I should be allowed to sit in on MST-2. He finally consented and let me sit in.

September 16—Another week end is coming up and I'm all for it. Like all Saturdays we had chapel and free time after it. I stayed in and cleaned the room while my helpful roommate went to the show.

September 17—My dad was up this week end and took my roommate and me out to eat. Dad and I went to church together. He left right after church because he needed to get home soon. Parade turned out to be hot and dusty.

September 18—Just another Monday except that my roommate came in with a bad limp he had acquired in a junior high football game. We lost, 36-6. Andy Slater, my roommate, scored our six.

September 19—Latin is starting to get easier now. I think it's hard in the beginning for many students. A friend of mine has for the past three days been working on an air engine that he thinks he invented. How I pity him when he finds out the idea is 30 years old.

September 20—We had our first pep rally today. It was a lot of fun and quite inspiring. From the talk Colonel Wikoff made, you would think him to be another Bob Hope.

September 21—Another late B.R.C. and chocolate doughnuts for breakfast. Our Junior high team played Excelsior Springs and lost by a disgusting 33-6.

September 22—My roommate and the cadet across the hall all took permits and went to the show.

September 23—I got up at 4:00 a.m. this morning. It really feels great to get up with the chickens until about 4:00 p.m., when you start feeling like a 15-year-old work-horse! I've a feeling I'm going to sleep well tonight.

September 24—Slept till 9:00 a.m. It rained almost all day so we had an indoors parade. 'A' Company came in first while 'D' Company came in third place.

September 25—I went to an Honor Guard session for the first time this year. Sgt. Poinsett gave us a talk on the "pros and cons" of the Honor Guard. Also attended a Trumpeter staff meeting.

September 26—Studied Latin two hours. Drank two malts; wrote a letter and shined my shoes. I think I'm getting a touch of flu.

September 27—I went to sick call and was admitted to the hospital. I don't like the hospital because it's so boring after you've caught up on your sleep. We have a new school nurse and she's very nice. She also is a retired captain. Well, at least I don't have to take my flu shots. Some people think I planned it that way.

September 28—Got out of the hospital and went back to work as good as new. Man, until you've come to Wentworth, you don't know what a day's rest can do for a person. The high school team played Richmond today and lost 19-7.

September 29—Our Juco squad played Joplin and lost 41-0. No comment!

September 30—My mother came up today and treated my roommate and me to 16-ounce steaks.

October 1—I went to a dinner that our church sponsored. It was a wonderful meal and I'm sure all the attending cadets enjoyed it. After I got back to the barracks I found I was on floor chief and that I was late, but the officer didn't stick me because I went down to the Dragon's Den for him.

October 2—My roommate went to a football game. After he got back, we had a talcum powder fight during the study period. Again we were lucky and didn't get caught.

October 3—I took a permit tonight and stayed in the barracks. I studied until 8:30 and then shined shoes till 9:40. I didn't get to bed until taps, even though I had planned to be asleep much earlier.

October 4—I sat in the sun all through drill today while the Honor Guard drilled. After that I went to town to pick up some re-soled shoes. When I got back I shined my brass as I do every Wednesday, Saturday, and Sunday. During C.Q.'s I worked on an editorial for The Trumpeter.

October 5—A dull day except my roommate was told to call the telegraph office after C.Q.'s. All through the study period he sat there wondering what they had to tell him. Later he found out he was an uncle.

October 6—Only missed four in my Latin assignment today, which means an E. The corps attended a football game against Lillis High School of Kansas City; we lost 19-6.

October 7—Nothing much happened today.

October 8—Just another Sunday with nothing to say.

October 9—We practiced Honor Guard for an hour. Somehow I got into debt, a dollar which I had to pay off. I also was on floor chief which is something I dislike.

October 10—I felt that I needed a pep talk, so I sought the chaplain who perked me up a bit.

October 11—Practiced Honor Guard as usual. I took a "soupy" and went down to the Dragon's Den to have a hamburger and french fries.

October 12—Had a refreshing late B.R.C. today and the usual breakfast sweet rolls which I especially like.

October 13—My roommate and I cleaned up the room very good, at least to the best of our ability, and we still got a room "skin" but it couldn't be helped. Of course, the room-checker had to give us a reprimand.

October 14—Chapel was very interesting as well as short. The new chaplain is a very good speaker and one who knows when to quit. In the afternoon I played two games of chess and won both games.

October 15—We got up at 7:00 this morning and cleaned the room. We even waxed the floor as well as swept, dusted, washed, and cleaned the windows, the floor, the desk, the walls and the closet. For our effort we were awarded no room skins. Parade was normal and routine as usual.

October 16—I forgot to take my cold pill today. Lt. Albert told me it better not happen again, and I, of course said it wouldn't. I have a lot of homework and very little time, so I had better stop day-dreaming and start to work.

October 17—I forgot to sign up for a permit, but did get a soupy. Wilkins and I went down to the Dragon's Den and bought a steak each. It set me back \$2.00, but I feel it was worth it. By Friday I shall be wishing I had saved my money instead of spending it on a steak.

October 18—My roommate skipped excess and had it doubled. He said he had to go to see the doctor to pick up some cardrops.

October 19—We had a late B.R.C. and the usual good breakfast. I ate seven rolls, and after eating that many I thought I'd never like them again.

October 20—The Dad's Day weekend has started off badly with our high school losing a game to Missouri Military Academy 19-0. From what I can see, it looks like there are going to be a lot of Dads up for the week end.

October 21—The cadets with dads up for the week end attended chapel and a Dad's Club meeting. We had a military period today in which the boys drilled their fathers, after this the Dads attended classes with their sons. In the evening we had a delicious meal in the gym. I'm sure that's the best meal I've had in two months including meals my parents bought me, or was I just hungry?

October 22—We went through almost a regular Sunday except the Band and Honor Guard put on their respective snap drills. In the evening I called home, since my parents didn't come up. After that I shined shoes, studied, and went to bed at 9:30.

October 23—A bad day and I've nothing to say.

October 24—Well, I made an incomplete in Latin, put in study hall on account of Algebra, and because I made an "I" in Citizenship. I had better forget the diary and start studying!

October 25—I did very well in all my subjects and on two tests. This afternoon Hanway came in and said he could get me out of the two-hour drill if I helped him carry some sandbags. Well, I ended up scrubbing the floors in the armory for over three hours. What a trusting soul I am or was!

October 26—Our Junior College team played Warrensburg today and lost, 33-6. It could have been worse with eight men crippled and one in the hospital, so I'm not griping.

October 27—The Junior Dragons defeated Carrollton High School, 20-19.

October 28—I've been expecting a fencing set for the past two weeks; it should be here within another week at the most. Captain Cotton's class didn't meet and I had the entire morning free to study and shine shoes, an old Wentworth custom.

October 29—The main event for me today was getting "chewed out" for spit-shining and having a non-reg comb in my possession. That's the first time in eight months that I've been chewed out. This evening I went to the show and had a malt afterwards.

October 30—It seems to me that I've had bad days for the past week or so. Everybody is on my back and I sure wish some good guy would let up. The rumor was getting around that we were to have a stop night, but unfortunately we didn't.

October 31—A rainy Tuesday morning with nothing to do but go to classes and march in the rain. A number of cadets, including myself, went to Kansas City to attend a Kansas City Philharmonic concert.

November 1—No break in the routine except a two and a half-hour drill today which has the curious effect of tiring me out. After drill I studied for a test in Citizenship which we might have tomorrow.

November 2—At noon an officer chewed me out for wearing spit shines out to inspection. Later, I found out the inspector had spit-shined his own shoes.

November 3—During C.Q.'s, Rose and Buster's light bulb burned out. They both sat there rather dumbfounded until the floor chief came in and moved Rose out into the hall to study and Buster to Mike Irish's room.

November 4—Well, we have finally got the fencing set in the mail. We've been expecting it for a month now. Everyone knew I was going to get one and when they saw me coming into the barracks with a long box, half the company was in our room begging to take on Slater and me. Finally, one of the company officers came in and broke up the ordeal because he wanted to try it himself!

November 5—"D" Company won parade today. They looked quite good (not that I'm an authority on the subject). We also lucked out and didn't get a room skin for Sunday formal inspection.

November 6—I woke ready to go to work. In the afternoon I went bowling and lucked out again with a 182. By taps I had achieved my morning desire and was ready to go back to bed.

November 7—It's kind of misty outside and reminds me of those English mystery shows one often sees on the late show on television. Later on in the day it cleared up though, turning out to be a sunny and bright day. That's Missouri weather for you, almost as bad as Oklahoma's climate!

November 8—The three weeks are just about up and I feel I didn't do too well. I certainly didn't break any records! So since I had no homework I devoted both C.Q.'s to reviewing in all my subjects.

November 9—It's a good thing I studied last night. Today we had tests in Latin and English, both in which I feel I did fairly well.

November 10—Today is Homecoming which began with a parade uptown that preceded the football game with Fort Scott. Sorry to say the visitors won, 45-7.

November 11—We had the annual Homecoming Dance tonight. Slater had promised Wilkins and I dates for the dance, but his date called up, saying she couldn't come up which meant we also lost ours.

November 12—I cleaned the room for Sunday formal inspection. We got room skin for having dirty windows.

November 13—Nothing happened today that is worth relating.

November 14—I forgot there is a concert tonight, so I signed up for a permit. When Sgt. Hokanson came up to my room before lunch and asked me if I wanted to leave early for Kansas City, I finally realized this was the night for the first of the series.

November 15—At drill today Sgt. Davis spoke on squad and platoon tactics. His talk lasted only an hour and fifteen minutes instead of the usual two hours.

November 16—For the first time this year, I got up at second call instead of the usual first call even though I'm an Old Boy. All this homework has had me working too hard and causing me to lose sleep, or is this all in my mind?

November 17—We had two classes and then left for Boonville where we participated in Kemper's Homecoming. We took part in a parade down Boonville's Main Street and then played them in their own Homecoming game. Happy to say, we won 39-6.

November 18—My squad leader, Sgt. Leonard reported me absent from D.R.C. yesterday. Today Colonel Brown called me out of ranks and asked me if I had been absent. I wasn't and told him so. He had me call out Sgt. Leonard to verify the report I gave. He did and I was dismissed.

November 19—It snowed for the first time this year. The snow wasn't very deep, an inch or so, and I don't expect it to last very long.

November 20—Yesterday's snow is almost all gone except for a few patches here and there. I didn't have any homework so I relaxed during the two C.Q.'s.

November 21—I forgot to sign up for a permit so I did without, even though I haven't had one in about two weeks because of my absentmindedness.

November 22—Nothing much happened except that Slater and I thoroughly cleaned the room even though this is a Wednesday instead of Saturday.

November 23—My roommate took me into Kansas City to celebrate Thanksgiving with his family. The meal was very good and I wish to express my thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Slater.

November 24—It was very windy during parade, causing a number of cadets to lose their caps. They, of course, were not allowed to pick them up during the parade but the caps were all recovered later.

November 25—The rumors have been going around that the officers are really going to tear "D" Company apart at tomorrow's inspection. So everybody stayed in the barracks this afternoon and worked on their rooms.

November 26—The men in "D" Company didn't get a skin today, so evidently the rumor proved to be false, or were all the rooms exceptionally clean?

November 27—A routine day except for the occasional clue to winter's coming, which one is sure to notice by standing in the cold fifteen minutes every morning and night.

November 28—Once again I forgot to sign up for a permit, but that's becoming as routine as classes.

November 29—Company "D" had a drill holiday today. I had the entire afternoon off to do as I pleased. I chose to play two games of chess.

November 30—I went bowling and made five gutters in a row which isn't very bad for me. Today we presented Lt. Leonard a saber his platoon had bought for him. He was quite surprised and didn't know what to say when some wise guy yelled, "Speech!"

December 1—It's just 20 more days till Christmas Furlough which everyone is looking forward to, including myself. Cadets have been counting the days since the beginning of October or November. Morley and I took a permit tonight and spent a restful evening in the high school recreation room.

December 2—Somehow I confused my periods, thinking it was my free fifth period instead of my sixth period English class. So, when the bell rang signaling the beginning of sixth period I paid no attention to it whatsoever. Not until my roommate failed to return from his Algebra class did I realize what had happened.

December 3—After a very good Sunday inspection in which the company only received four room "skins", I studied until 5:30 or so and then went to Colonel Brown's office to get a Soupy.

December 4—We had terrific gusts of wind blowing so hard that many cadets had their hats blown off at formation.

December 5—The entire Corps was reseat in the dining room. At my previous table sat Turner, Johnston, Wilkins, Edwards, Adee and with Lt. Lancaster as the table head. This time I'm sitting with McCall, Irish, Taylor, and Hensley. Maj. Heghin is the tablehead.

December 6—Slater and I cleaned the room putting over a can of wax on the floor only to have it scuffed up later during the day. If someone could invent a practical nonscuffing floor wax, they'd make a fortune!

December 7—Nothing worth mentioning occurred today.

December 8—I noticed a rash on my roommate's chest and jokingly yelled "measles"! Some wise guy heard me and quickly spread it through the barracks that Slater had the measles. Every time he would walk out in the hall everyone would jump into a room and close the door or else take out in a panicked run. Later it was found out it was only a joke to begin with, giving everyone a laugh including the officers.

December 9—It snowed almost four inches, the first big snow of the year. About half the school participated in a snowball fight and everyone had a lot of fun. I don't think the snow's going to melt fast, since it was about five degrees this morning and colder weather is still expected.

December 10—According to Taylor's thermometer, it's exactly a cool sixteen degrees outside. Tomorrow more snow and less heat is expected. These last ten days until we get out for the holidays, I expect to be on the cool side.

December 11—It snowed straight through the day without a letup. The slick snow plus the three degree weather make the meal formations a pain in the neck.

December 12—The days are now a little warmer while the nights continue to become colder. Last night it was minus four degrees outside, causing the snow that melted during the day to freeze over which made marching and walking quite hazardous.

December 13—We turned our rifles into the Military Department for safekeeping over the furlough. All men who did not pass a brief rifle inspection were sent to the back of the line and given a can of rifle oil and a pad, to re-clean their rifles again. I of course "rocked out" and didn't pass inspection because of a minute amount of oil on my stock.

December 14—We had our annual football banquet in the dining room. We were served steak, rolls, French-fries and strawberry shortcake. Merle Harmon, a prominent broadcaster for the Kansas City Athletics, gave an excellent talk on sportsmanship.

December 15—We played Marshall High School in a basketball game and lost 49-48. It was one of the closest games anyone's seen around here in a long time.

December 16—Patton and I went horseback riding, even though there is still a lot of snow left on the ground. As a matter of fact, it was so cold out at the stables that we cut our riding time from an hour to fifteen minutes, after which we ran back to school.

December 17—The band staged a Christmas concert today for the general public. This marks the first time this has ever been attempted at Wentworth, and may become a tradition, who knows?

December 18—I heard over the radio that this area is in for the worst winter since 1936. The ever present snow and never present warmth strongly confirm this prediction.

December 19—The day was spent in preparation for the furlough which begins tomorrow.

December 20—I left uneventfully at 11:30 this morning and will resume my writings on January 3.

January 3—I got back about two o'clock this afternoon and decided the room needed a good cleaning, so my roommate and I put three coats of wax on the floor. I talked to some of the boys in the barracks. Most of them said they had a lot of fun; but even though their vacation was most enjoyable, they were glad to get back.

January 4—The Cadet Corps and faculty were very much saddened upon hearing the report of the death of Tactical Officer Stephen Randle Johnson, Jr., of Hutchinson, Kansas, who was instantly killed in a car wreck through no fault of his own on the night of December 27, 1961. Lt. Johnson was well liked by corps members because of his humor and friendliness to subordinates. Two members of the faculty and several cadets attended his funeral in Hutchinson on December 31.

January 5—It snowed almost three inches. The snow feels very dry and almost gives the impression of it being fine white sand. There is also a lot of wind which makes a person feel like he's in the middle of a snow storm. We're supposed to be in for a lot more snow.

January 6—It's still snowing but the snow feels a little more moist now instead of like sand. The wind is also gone. Right now we have about eight inches of snow on the ground, with more predicted. The high school basketball team played a game today and beat Richmond 54-53.

January 7—It snowed almost all through the night and hasn't let up yet. We have about 11 inches of snow on the ground, which is the most I have ever seen.

January 8—I went to a Trumpeter staff meeting today and was assigned to write an article on the forthcoming Wentworth Show. After that I went bowling and "lucked out" with a 153 and then dropped down to a 116. Semester tests are going to be coming up soon, so I had better start studying a little more instead of spending so much time on extracurricular activities.

January 9—Sorry to say I was in study hall this week and so was denied the privilege of a study night permit. I keep telling myself I don't mind it, because I have got to study for more semester tests.

January 10—We picked up rifles from the armory, drudge.

January 11—I woke up this morning at 7:10 and thought my roommate and I had slept through breakfast. I woke him up only to be angrily told we had a late BRC. I didn't feel too good today and so went over to the hospital. Captain Schleicher put me on athletic duties and gave me some pills.

January 12—I feel 100 percent better today.

January 13—It is still snowing, but it looks like it is going to stop soon because it's dying down rapidly. My roommate and I waxed the floor with some paste wax I brought back from Christmas furlough. It works quite well except it takes so much time and elbow grease.

January 14—The snow didn't stop and we are in for another three inches. A number of semester cadets came in, and they all look sort of mystified and scared. I guess I can see why, but I'm sure they'll catch on quickly like everybody else.

January 15—Not much happened except several more cadets have come in.

January 16—The semester grades came out. My grades this year are a little lower than what they were last year, but I intend to work a little harder and pull them up considerably.

January 17—During drill period we had a formal room inspection, just as we do every Sunday, except we didn't wear the blue formal uniform but wore the greens instead. After drill I talked to Captain Bell about the trip the band plans to take to Marshall. Still a lot of snow on the ground, about 12 inches to be exact.

January 18—Once again it started to snow. We already have about eleven or twelve inches with an expected four more coming. This should make the grand total 15 inches, which is an unbelievable sum for me.

January 19—At last! We finally had a stop day. I don't think we have had one in twelve weeks or so. I went to the show with Irish and Rupprecht and didn't check in till 10:45. We had a late show permit though, so we didn't get into trouble.

January 20—Not much to say except I caught up on a little sleep because of the late BRC we had today.

January 21—We didn't get a roomskin for formal Sunday inspection, so now our record going seven Sundays without a skin. My roommate almost swore we would get one today since today's the seventh Sunday. He claims seven is an unlucky number, but I think it is a lucky number.

January 22—Captain Morgan was very disappointed with the test grades from last Friday. He said there was no need for a class with our ability to come up with such low grades. So, we are now outlining the chapters which is a very long, tedious, boring job. He hopes if we do this, the test grades will come up considerably.

January 23—Today is MST-2. We finished the subject of field telephone communications and now are proceeding onto radio communications which I feel will be a little more interesting.

January 24—Happy to say we had a drill holiday. I had the entire afternoon free to clean my room. We waxed the floor with two coats of liquid wax and one coat of paste wax.

January 25—We once again had a late BRC and I caught up on a little more sleep which I lost throughout the week due to my roommates talking after taps. I have a long homework assignment in Latin and algebra so I had better go back to the books.

January 26—Mike Irish and I went to the show.

January 27—Captain Cotton's class didn't meet, so I had the entire morning free. Incidentally it's just a week till the Military Ball.

January 28—During inspection Slater and I were caught sitting down instead of standing up at attention. Sgr. Wilson told us to push our chairs in and get up on our feet, so we did! It was our turn to get out of parade today, and since we didn't go, C Company won it.

January 29—Nothing of consequence.

January 30—We went to the philharmonic concert in Kansas City. It was the best one yet, except Captain Schleicher had one of the rear tail lights stolen from her Cadillac while it was parked in a garage. This, of course, made her very angry and we stopped into a police station to file a complaint. At the police state we met a man who had had both of his tail lights stolen the same night.

January 31—We went to drill where Colonel Haynie and Lt. Johnson gave us a good long talk on the attitude the corps should take towards school at Wentworth. It was very thought-provoking and it caused many cadets to take a serious look at themselves, which is a good thing.

February 1—We had a late BRC, but I didn't get too much additional sleep because I was on floor chief. It seems to me that I always get the job on the most undesirable days. But that's what everybody says. So I guess no injustice has been done to me. Just three more days until the Military Ball; everybody is looking forward to it.

February 2—Just one more day till the Military Ball and Slater has come up with a case of the flu. He says he has bad luck too. He doesn't want to go to the hospital, since he might be put in and then miss the dance. I think he might feel better by tomorrow, since he is feeling a little better than he did early in the morning.

February 3—Slater is feeling much better. If you didn't know the Military Ball was today, you'd never think anything special was going to happen. No one seems to give any outward indications that they are excited, but I think all of them are. The Ball turned out to be real fine. I had a wonderful date. I'm looking forward to next year now.

February 4—Wilkins woke me up this morning at 7:45, giving me about four hours of sleep since I didn't get to bed until 3:30 last night. He wanted me to take post for him for three dollars. Money's money, so I took it.

February 5—I got three letters in the mail today. That means I won't get any more for about a month. Aside from this nothing else happened out of the ordinary.

February 6—I remembered to take a permit just before I started to leave for class. The permit sheet was just being taken down and I thought for sure that I wouldn't get one. We have an understanding first sergeant, Sergeant Boyd Wilson, and he let me sign up.

February 7—For the first time this year I am in excess, seven demerits. A lot of us were in for the first time, our understanding first sergeant included. We all marched down to excess since there were so many.

February 8—Last night, contrary to my knowledge, we were told to turn in green blouses this morning at breakfast. The floor chief didn't announce it till about thirty seconds before outside rang. I tore my blouse out of the closet and practically ripped the brass off it. The bell rang just as I left my room: I wasn't late though.

February 9—I went uptown with Mike Irish to help him pick out a pair of cordovan shoes. The shoe store didn't have his size, so he decided to buy them in Kansas City the next time he goes there.

February 10—I didn't have any home work to do, and since I didn't feel industrious, I just read a book.

February 11—Tonight we had a general rag chew in the room. Long, Irish, Rose, Buster, and Slater all took part. It was decided that Slater and I needed to live up on the fourth floor. Ramey and Feitelson were willing to trade rooms with us, so it was decided that we would move this coming Wednesday.

February 12—The most important event of the day was when Colonel Sellers announced that Latin wouldn't meet the next three days.

February 13—Today Hoskins, Hokansen, Warner, Cruz and I went into Kansas City with Captain Schleicher to hear a philharmonic concert. We went to the Italian Gardens to eat and I think everybody had a good meal.

February 14—The main part of the day was spent in moving from the second floor to the fourth. Moving is always a big mess, but this time we did it in a systematic manner.

February 15—I bowled a 109 and a 125. Surprisingly, I was really serious about my score, but I came out with a relatively good one for me.

February 16—In English we began the study of the novel, "Great Expectations". We played Mercy High School in basketball and really tromped them.

February 18—I spent most of the day studying and shining shoes, the good old Wentworth pastime. Colonel Fisher gave us one room skin during inspection, dusty radio.

February 19—Today the bowling season ended and I didn't know about it until I reached the bowling alley. It had been announced at lunch, but I missed that. I sure seem to miss a lot of those announcements.

February 20—The main talk of the day is that it started snowing. The ground's been clear of the snow for about two weeks and it now starts snowing again. This Missouri weather!

February 21—Most of yesterday's show is gone. The weatherman said we were due for some five inches, but we just got about one and a half. I think everybody's glad it's gone. Incidentally, it's just two more days until the Wentworth Show and good weather is forecast.

February 22—We had our last basketball game of the season with Kemper. We won, but only by four points.

February 23—Today was the Wentworth Show, and contrary to the weatherman's report it started snowing. It snowed all the time from before breakfast until late that night, in other words, the whole day. The highways were real slippery and all the buses had to go real slow, causing us to be behind schedule. On top of that our bus somehow got stuck on the side of the road and we didn't get to the show until it had been on some fifteen minutes.

February 24—Everybody's tired from our little excursion last night.

February 25—The fog was so thick today; you couldn't see from the door of "D" company to the gym. It didn't clear up much during the day either.

February 26—I got stuck twice for having my window open while the radiators are on. That should put me in excess with ten demerits, the second time this year.

February 27—We went to a concert in Kansas City. I was sitting next to Jeff McCall when he went to sleep. I tried to wake him up, but couldn't. He did wake up though when it was over and started clapping very enthusiastically as if he had heard all of it. It was really funny.

February 28—This has been a busy month, the busiest this year. Everyone is looking forward to spring furlough coming up in just nine days. I'll be glad to get home.

March 1—I was on floor chief duty. Dad sent me some money which I very desperately needed.

March 2—I took a permit and went to bed during second CQ, even though I should have studied. Slater was on floor chief. He was just on two days ago.

March 3—Today being Saturday, we waxed the floor since we haven't done so for quite a while. Still our main problem is keeping people from scuffing the floor when they come in. We've finally come to the conclusion that it is impossible and we've quit trying.

March 4—Thanks to yesterday's cleaning, we didn't get any room skins. Since the band is in the Mardi Gras down in New Orleans, we didn't have a parade but instead the Honor Guard performed.

March 5—Last night Slater felt sick and said if he didn't feel better by tomorrow he was going to the hospital. This morning he woke up still feeling bad. Being a man of his word, he went to the hospital. This afternoon a cadet from post came up to the room and said Slater wanted his radio to use in the hospital. So, here I am without a radio.

March 6—During activity period we signed up for spring sports. Last year I signed up for company softball and had a lot of fun. This year I also signed up for softball.

March 7—For assembly we had a speaker from India. He's been there several times and told the corps about his trips and experiences. During Drill period we turned in rifles as they are to be kept in the armory during spring furlough. By the way it's just two days till we go home.

March 8—Slater got back from the hospital today, and forgot the radio. I had to type up an article on yesterday's assembly today for the newspaper. Latin class didn't meet today, and I don't think it's going to meet tomorrow.

March 9—Latin class didn't meet again. Oh yes, I just remembered spring furlough begins today. I had forgotten all about it. Next joke!

March 10—I got back about 5:30 this afternoon after spending the week end at Slater's house in Kansas City. We had a lot of fun and his mother's a very good cook. Sorry to say not everyone was glad to get back, but the time will fly now until school's out.

March 11—We started classes once again. I went to a Trumpeter staff meeting and was assigned to write on the National Patriotic Essay contest and the Westworth Summer Camp.

March 12—I found out that Colonel Sellers is in Florida attending a national military schools meeting. He's supposed to be back Friday or so. I interviewed Major Hepler and Colonel Stagner for my newspaper articles.

March 13—During drill period we sadly picked up our rifles from the armory. I overheard someone say, "I wish we were turning these things in, instead of picking them up."

March 14—We went out to practice softball for the first time this year. We have a lot of good players, some of them are: Albert, Lancaster, Morris, Leonard, Nordeen, Kupersmith, Jackson, Lefler, Long, and Walters. I have a feeling I'm not going to be the most valuable player on the team.

March 15—I took a permit and used the time to study. I turned in two newspaper articles.

March 16—I went to Kansas City to have my retainers checked. I got back around 3:30.

March 17—We had our first 1962 outdoor parade. This was the first time in about four months, a good sign that spring's coming. I studied all afternoon.

March 18—Castle and Wilmer worked with their model airplanes during athletic periods.

March 19—We went to Kansas City to attend the concert for the last time this year. I'm going to miss those things. I plan to attend them next year.

March 20—During drill we had a two-hour inspection on the quadrangle in preparation for Government Inspection.

March 21—At noon a stop day was announced. This made everyone happy. I was completely broke, so I went down to the "Rec" room and watched TV instead of going to the show.

March 22—Since we had a stop day yesterday we had a late BRC today. I think I'm finally caught up on my sleep. We practiced softball as we have during the past week.

March 23—During chapel period we had a National Honor Society initiation. Wilkins, Weaver, Meyn, Irish, Leonard, Taylor all made it in my company. We turned in our green blouses, so don't have any to wear tonight for supper. I think the laundry is preparing for G.I. otherwise we wouldn't have had to turn in our soiled clothing on a Saturday.

April 1—For an April Fool joke, I hid Slater's collar stay. He realized that it was missing about a minute or so before third call. He looked for about a minute then panicked, running around the room looking for it, and then running out to the hall and begging people to give him one of their extra ones. He couldn't find one, and so went outside without one. I gave it to him when I got outside. He said he would even be the score.

April 2—There's just one more week until G.I. This semester sure has gone fast, with the Military Ball, Wentworth Show, spring furlough, and the bivouac coming up later.

April 3—Haines forgot to do his Latin, something he usually doesn't do. I made an E— on mine, something I don't do very often.

April 4—The first half of the drill period was spent shining brass, shoes, etc. During the second half we drilled in preparation for G.I. We drilled about 30 minutes on inspection arms alone, but still "G.I. thumbs" were common. Finally Captain Albert said "All I can say is, I hope you guys look better for the inspectors."

April 5—The word has been going around that we're in for a physical fitness test, sponsored by the military department. Everyone says it's pretty rough; it probably is if the military department has anything to do with it.

April 6—I took a permit and went to the show with Wilkins. We saw "S-15 Pilot." It was worth paying 75c though to get away from school for a while. When I returned I found someone had borrowed my English book, and Slater had forgotten who had it. He told me not to get shook, because someone in the barracks has it. Great help!

April 7—We cleaned our room the entire day, for G.I. this coming Monday. Chapel was cancelled on account of this. We used two cans of liquid wax on the floor, plus half a can of paste wax. Captain Logan complimented us on the floor. Tomorrow we have a preliminary inspection by the military department.

April 8—Our company passed the preliminary inspection with flying colors. This afternoon I went out with Nigro and played a little softball.

April 9—I fainted during the G.I. personal inspection. It's kind of a weird feeling just before you go out. Incidentally, that ammonia they use to wake you up doesn't smell too good! I think I changed my uniform about four times today; after a while it becomes very monotonous.

April 10—Today is our annual picture day, in which all the pictures for the yearbook are taken. I participated in three, the company picture, the Wentworth Honor Society picture, and last of all, but not least, the Trumpeter picture.

April 11—The whole corps had a drill holiday today, because I guess the school decided to give us a rest. I went down to the military department and interviewed Captain Logan on the AUSA's trip to Fort Leavenworth. I overheard him say "Company D goes through the obstacle course next Wednesday." I guess the rumors were true.

April 12—We didn't have a late BRC today because of our biennial junior college inspection. We're going to have one tomorrow though. I've decided to take my furlough on the Easter week-end. I was looking through one of Captain Morgan's almanacs when I found a mistake. It gave Abraham Lincoln's death in 1885, instead of 1865. Captain Morgan suggested that if I called the error to the attention of the almanac firm they might send me an almanac. I wrote to the company during CQ's.

April 13—I'm really glad the six weeks grading period is almost over. My grades dropped quite a lot during the first three weeks, and I've been attempting to bring them up for the six weeks.

April 14—Chapel was rather different. Doctor Campbell told us about the symbols of the church, the cross, the colors, the robe, and other accessories used in a church. Walters and I went out and played a little ball.

April 15—We got a room skin for dirty windows. That was my fault. Slater's uncles, aunts, and cousins came up and checked out the school.

April 16—This morning I couldn't find my algebra assignment. So I went to class without it. I got an F for it. I shot for marksmanship and think I did fairly well.

April 17—We had a softball game with "C" company and won, 50-0!!! I didn't help the team much; I was put out on home twice in a row. After that I didn't play any more.

April 18—We ran the obstacle course. Crowell ran the mile in six minutes flat, with a sore leg! After I got back I thought I'd never get enough water to quench my thirst, but I went down to the Dragon's Den and bought a 20c Coke and a 30c one, which did the job.

April 19—I watched Castle fly his model airplane. I asked him if he would teach me to fly someday and he said he would. After I talked to him he cracked up his plane, so I didn't get my try at it.

April 20—Neither Colonel Sellers nor Captain Wilson met their classes. I heard Colonel Sellers is in the hospital. I left today on my Honor Society furlough.

April 23—I got a reply from the almanac company. They didn't send me an almanac like I hoped they would, but instead they sent a letter saying how sorry they were, and that they were glad I had corrected them.

April 24—Massy told Captain Cotton he didn't want class officer anymore, so Captain Cotton gave it to Russell. I thought since Russell was a good friend of mine I could read a non-reg book during class, but he wouldn't let me. What rank does to some people!

April 25—During drill we picked up our ammo belts, canteens, shelter halves, pegs, etc. for the bivouac coming up this week-end. We spent nearly two hours sitting in the hot sun watching how to set up a tent and pack our packs.

April 26—Nothing much happened, other than the always welcome late BRC.

April 27—We were supposed to have gone to Kansas City to watch a baseball game. But the weather looked so uncertain that our trip was cancelled and many cadets were disappointed. That night I had a permit, I got it by going down to Colonel Brown's office, and I along with Leonard, G., Morris, Lancaster, Doran, Shearer, and Crowell went on a recon patrol of the bivouac area.

April 28—We left on the bivouac about 2:15 p.m., whereas we were supposed to have left the line of departure at exactly 2:00.

April 29—Last night was miserable. It was cold, wet, and noisy. I had to get up at 1:00 a.m. to be on guard detail. After we got back to the campus, we went through a parade. In the evening I went to the show "Breakfast at Tiffany's." It was a good show, and well worth the money.

April 30—Company D attended the scholastic department banquet at the Wentworth Country Club. The steak was really good. Colonel Brown announced we might win the disciplinary competition, which brought a round of applause. I have another steak dinner coming for the Trumpeter. If we win that disciplinary banquet, I'll have had three steaks this year.

May 1—May is finally here, at last! It's just 27 days till we get out. This year has gone by so fast it seems like it's just the beginning of November, instead of May. We had a softball game and won by a forfeit. I think we might have a chance for that steak dinner which is offered to the best team at the end of the year.

May 2—Today it was announced that the command "rest" would no longer allow us to talk in ranks, but it would be the same as "at ease." This brought a round of groans from the company. The word has been going around that Colonel Fisher is going to make a spot check for spit shines.

May 3—We started to outline in English. We are required to outline about three stories in our literature book. I'm still outlining for Citizenship, and this added bit of work isn't too greatly appreciated.

May 4—The Interstate Conference spring sports events were held here. Ft. Scott won the track meet.

May 5—Russel went on a Honor Guard trip today to Columbia. On the bus he took his leg brace off, and when he got out coming back he thought he had left it back in Columbia. He got kind of shook up, until he remembered he had left it in the bus.

May 6—I finally got around to typing out my diary for last month. Lately, I've been so busy I just can't get caught up. Sunday parade was held the same as always.

May 7—Three weeks from now I'll be home. I went to a newspaper meeting, and was assigned to write a story on the National Honor Society and the Summer Camp counselors. Wilkens and I took a soupy; he treated me.

May 8—Today on the Citizenship test I came up with a 95%. I think I should have received a 100%, but I just couldn't convince Captain Morgan of that.

May 9—For drill we practiced the whole two hours for the new-boy parade coming up soon. Morley has the company, and Buster and Kupersmith have the two platoons. They looked real good out at drill, but Morley said it was all beginner's luck.

May 10—As usual, we had a late BRC. I realized today about four o'clock that I had better start to work on my newspaper articles, since they must be turned in tomorrow. We had a softball game, but Greer was understanding of the circumstances and let me skip. Oh yes, tomorrow we have a Latin vocabulary test.

May 11—Slater and about 30 other students went on a science field trip this morning. Miller, W. found a snake and brought it into Captain Wilson's room to be measured. It turned out to be three feet, two inches long. Evidently, Police and Bears are scared of snakes since they were cringing in the corner as soon as they saw it.

May 12—The Reverend Kuring of the Grace Lutheran Church spoke at Chapel. After chapel I met my mother who had come up for the Mother's Day program tomorrow. Slater, my mother and I all went driving, since there wasn't too much else to do. We had supper in Excelsior Springs.

May 13—For Mother's Day the school had a picnic-type lunch. I was surprised at the number of mothers here at school this week-end, since it's so close to the end of the year.

May 14—Larkin lost his name tag, and instead of taking 5 D's borrowed one of Zinko's, which had the last "o" marked out. While we were in English class, Captain Cotton kept calling him "Zink", which was really funny. We had the annual Trumpeter steak dinner at Maib's tonight. It was one of the best meals that I've had.

May 15—If you're Colonel Brown, stop reading right now. I was in study hall this week, second time this year, and I'm not supposed to be able to get soupy, but Wilkens came down and wanted me to take one with him. I told him I was in study hall, but he told me I could at least try. I did and got one, a remarkable feat, since Colonel Brown usually catches you.

May 16—We turned in rifles for the last time today. I lucked out and didn't have to re-clean mine, two remarkable feats in two days!

May 17—We had another steak out at the country club for winning the military honors. Of course, that was good, so good that I bought Feitelson's steak for 50c. Afterwards, Captain Logan gave an excellent talk on his experiences in the Army.

May 18—We tried to bribe our waiter to spill something on our tablehead (sorry, can't mention any names).

May 19—I was on floor chief duty for the last time this year. I wanted to take fourth floor, but Bill Long gave me third, to my disgust.

May 20—Went to church. The pastor told us how sorry everyone was to see us leave for the summer. For some reason I don't share their sentiments. Hensley fainted during parade today. Incidentally, this parade was the new-boy parade. I think all the new boys did an excellent job, even though all were a little scared.

May 21—Something very, very unusual happened today. Captain Morgan off-handedly mentioned that he knew where someone could buy a real skeleton. After class I talked to him about it. I went down to see the owner and we agreed upon him selling it to me for \$10.00. I called my father and told him I needed ten dollars desperately. He asked me what for, and I told him that I couldn't tell him and that he would just have to trust me. He said he would wire it to me. Wait till he finds out that I bought a skeleton with it!

May 22—I went down to Western Union and picked up the ten dollars. Then I picked up the skeleton. It gives you kind of a weird feeling to buy a skeleton.

May 24—Last late BRC of the year. I had four rolls for breakfast and three bananas. I haven't slept well since I bought Gilbert, my skeleton. I had a friendly talk with Captain Logan on a more serious subject. Captain Albert came in to see Gilbert. He liked it.

May 25—The commencement week-end started tonight with a band concert. I enjoyed it since it gave me some time to relax. I had better start packing soon.

May 26—My father arrived about 11 o'clock this morning. The awards ceremony was held this afternoon. Along with this was the eighth grade graduation. I finished my packing in the evening. Less than 24 hours till school's out.

May 27—We went through the final exercises, commencement, parade, the traditional flag ceremony, and then we were finished. This year's certainly went fast. I'm hoping to see most of you back again, when school re-opens in September. Until then I wish all of you a safe summer and the best of luck.
