To attain this high purpose, the Academy places greatest emphasis upon these four points:





SINCE EIGHTEEN EIGHTY

One of the chief reasons why Wentworth has been able to achieve its lofty purpose lies in the fact that the Academy has been under one continuous administration since its founding. For nearly three-score years, Colonel Sandford Sellers was president of Wentworth, He enjoyed one of the most enviable records in the history of American education.

The Academy was founded by Stephen G. Wentworth, scion of a distinguished English family and a prominent Lexington banker, in 1880, as a memorial to his deceased son, William Wentworth, Mr. Wentworth immediately vested control of the institution in the hands of a board of trustees composed of a duly elected representative of each of the Evangelical churches of Lexington, and a president. Colonel Sellers was called to the new school in its first year and remained as its active head until 1938. Mr. Wentworth served as president of the Board from 1880 until his death in 1897.

It was the firm conviction of the founder, his board of trustees and President Sellers that a military boarding school provides the most effective possible means for giving young men the thorough mental, moral and physical training necessary to develop in them the highest traits of manhood. Thus, Wentworth became the first military school in the Missouri River Valley.

From the beginning the late President Sellers surrounded himself with the ablest faculty available—strong men of proved qualities and Christian character. Under his wise and forward-looking direction, Wentworth has grown steadily. Each year has shown marked improvement over the preceding year. Today Wentworth stands as one of the truly great educational institutions of our country—second to none in the apportunities it offers boys and young men for thorough preparation for professional studies, business and for life.

AN HISTORIC BACKGROUND

Throughout over half a century the Wentworth purpose has remained unchanged. The ideals which led to the Academy's founding and which have carried it steadily forward, shine just as brightly today as ever: the desire to give each youth every opportunity to develop fully his own individual personality: the aim that every cadet shall acquire a keen sense of duty and responsibility, both to himself and toward others; that he shall have the mental and moral power to make accurate judgment between right and wrong and the physical power to stand by his convictions.

These high standards have dominated Wentworth for generations. But to maintain them and assure their full and continuous application, it has been found necessary to limit the enrollment. Wentworth today is a relatively small school-many times larger than in 1880, to be sure, yet small enough that every individual student is given the private attention so essential to his all-'round development.

The surrounding country affords a wealth of historically important Civil War sites and the town of Lexington itself retains much of the tradition of the old south. Here enthusiasm for the reminders of our country's glorious past is combined with the enthusiasm for modern adventure to promote the rapid development of the boy's mental, moral and physical resources.



MILITARY DEPARTMENT

MILITARY training at Wentworth has been a strong feature since 1895 when the first active army officer was detailed to the Academy but has never been permitted to interfere with scholastic work.

Today the Reserve Officer Training Corps program [ROTC] at Wentworth is administered by Regular Army personnel, consisting of three commissioned officers and six non-commissioned officers, who are in charge of instruction.


Cadets are taught the theoretical aspects of the basic military subjects through formal classroom type instruction. Each Wednesday afternoon during the regular drill period the cadets apply those fundamentals learned. During the fall and spring of each school year the cadet corps participates in a field training program during the drill period. Initially, stress is placed on proficiency of the individual in such subjects as first aid, physical fitness and individual combat training. Later through instruction in combat formation, battle drill, patrolling and bivouac training. During the spring this training is culminated when the cadet corps participates in a field exercise which includes a tactical march and overnight bivouac.

Through participation in the ROTC six year Military Schools program, a cadet receives all necessary ROTC training to qualify for a Reserve Army Commission once he has attained a baccalaureate degree.

Wentworth is proud to be one of the original Honor Schools of the United States, the highest rating given by the Department of the Army.








ADMINISTRATION BUILDING








Wentworth's up-to-date Sellers - Wikoff Scholastic Building is the nucleus of the scholastic department. This magnificent structure contains one of the most splendid libraries possessed by any institution of this kind. Four completely equipped laboratories provide excellent facilities for the practical study of the sciences. In addition to classrooms for all classes, it houses the Dean's and Commandant's offices. It is with justifiable pride that Wentworth points to this new achievement in its effort to provide surroundings which are conducive to academic advancement.





DEPARTMENT



The scholastic department is divided into two separate and distinct units: the high school, which affers four years of preparatory work, and the junior college, which offers two years of liberal arts and science. Each has its own

organization separate from the other. Both divisions are fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, an organization composed of the leading colleges and preparatory schools in twenty states. This recognition means that graduates of either department are eligible to enter any institution in the United States that receives students by certification.

It is our aim to see that each cadet masters every lesson thoroughly. To accomplish this, every student is taught correct study methods and thoroughly schooled in correct uses of libraries and laboratories. Classes are small, which permits individual attention. Most of the faculty members live in the buildings with students. They are readily accessible for special help. From time to time a personal study is made of each cadet to determine his points of weakness and help him overcome them.



AVIATION

Wentworth participated in the Federal Aeronautics Administration Civilian Pilot Training Program from its inception in 1939 through the change to C. A. A. War Training Service until June, 1943, when all but 80 out of 712 colleges and universities throughout the country were eliminated due to curtailment of this type of training. However, the academy administration, believing eviation training to be very important now and in the future to the youth of the nation, secured permission from F. A. A. officials to continue flight training on a civilian basis and at the expense of the training.

Wentworth operates in conjunction with the Earl Plaines Plying Service at the Lexington Airport as a certified flying school fully approved by the F.A.A. The flight training program, including ground school, far surpasses the minimum requirements set forth by the Federal Aeronautics Administration qualifying carlets for Private and Commercial Pilot Certificates. It consists of instruction in both dual and solo flight time.

The records of the graduates of the Westworth Flight Training are outstanding. During the wer the graduates of this training program fought on every front where Americans were in combet.





A DAY

AT WENTWORTH

No TWO days at Wentworth are quite the same, for a widely varied program of scholastic, military, athletic and other activities is used to keep the interest of the cadets at high pitch and their appetites for learning well whetted. Furthermore, no two students have quite the same duties to perform throughout any given day. There is, however, a definite routine that all cadets follow each day. It is used to instill perfect regularity and promptness in attendance upon all duties prescribed for one and all cadets alike.


While it requires some adjustments for new students to become accustomed to this routine, any slight hint of monotony is soon lost in the kaleidoscopic whirl of the school year.

To give parents and others a better insight, the following pages have been used to set forth, pictorially, the day's activities from Reveille to Taps, of a typical Wentworth boy whom we will designate as Cadet Harlan.

The pictures in this section were taken several years ago. However, since they illustrate life at Wentworth of tuday, they are still timely. They are retained because so many of the cadets shown served in the Armed Facces of their country and so well illustrate the value of military training as recalled while at Wentworth.

Since the importance of military preparedness is becoming increasingly evident by the changing world situation, the training illustrated in this picture section has a special significance.

There have been some aniform changes as may be seen by referring to the section on Wentworth uniforms.

ERE is Harlan, a typical Wentworth cadet—a fine young American—manly, scholarly and upright. His respect for duty and responsibility has won for him the rank of sergeant. He may have come from a large city or a very small town—that makes no difference to the democratic spirit that prevails at Wentworth. He may be from a wealthy family or a family in meager circumstances—most of his classmates would never know, nor even be curious, unless he chose to tell them. But he typifies all the fine qualities of a deserving and ambitious youth as he goes through the tried and age-proved Wentworth process of becoming a real man, a real asset to himself, his family and friends, and society as a whole.

Harlan, like all the others, participates in many activities besides those shown. But let's follow him through a typical day.


His brothers, Hogo and Arthur, also attended Wentworth. Hugo, a Major, served with distinction with the Rangers. Arthur served with the Navy Air Corps as an Ensign and presently teaches school in Missouri.

CAN'T GET 'EM UP," blows the bugler, but he does, and at 6:35 o'clock another day is under way. Cadet Harlan goes first to the sanitary lavatory on his floor. A good washup is part of the routine, for a cadet is expected to keep him self clean at all times. At 6:50 he goes to a well-prepared breakfast.

After breakfast, rooms must be cleaned. One of the basic aims of our system is to form personal habits of order. Each morning Harian makes his own bed, puts his clothes in order and helps his roommate clean the room.

Strict inspection of quarters is a daily routine. Formal inspection of Harlan's person, room and equipment occurs on Sunday morning. At this time unusual care must be taken in cleaning the room. Our friend sees that hidden corners are carefully dusted, chairs polished, and everything put in order. Then he takes care of his person. There's brass to shine, leather to polish, hair to brush, and whiskers to be removed. A certain time is allotted for this preparation and all work must be done within that time. This young fellow knows that any deficiency in this work receives what is known in Academy language as a "skin"—which counts against one's company in color competition.


A T 8 O'CLOCK in the morning, classes convene. Harlan makes his way to a small class on his schedule where personal attention is his at any time it is needed. Our cadet is carefully instructed in the handling of delicate scientific equipment. He is not forced to grope blindly for information. That which is true of the science laboratories is equally true in all other classrooms.


Time passes rapidly in the classroom or laboratory because the work is interesting. The scholastic day is divided into two equal parts, with four classes in the morning and two in the afternoon.



DRILL is a very formal affair. It is on the drill field that Harlan learns much of courtesy, discipline and alertness. He, with his entire battalion, is thoroughly schooled in good citizenship, taught the proper respect for superiors and trained in leadership.

Learning to drill a squad is the first training in leadership. Throughout the year squad drill and competition is a part of the regular military routine. The squad is the smallest military unit and consists of nine to twelve men, two of whom are sergeants. All instruction is conducted by cadets under the personal supervision of members of the military faculty.

Although military work takes but one hour each day, the training is intensive and much more thorough than that found in larger units. Personal attention is given the individual cadet on the military field as well as in the classroom, and each cadet has an equal chance to advance to important positions in Wentworth's military realm. In the army, the navy and the marine corps Wentworth is glorified by its alumni who have received their commissions and are distinguishing themselves in official capacities of these respective branches of service.



Like many other cadets, Harlan finds the extended order drill more interesting. This drill consists of combat methods. He is taught to make use of cover, to advance and to fire. No actual firing is done during this drill, however, for all the ammunition used is dummy material. Initiative and leadership are required in this work. Situations arising in the problems furnished by the Department of the Army call for quick

ADET HARLAN attends interesting, informative and inspirational meetings in the chapel, immediately before lunch on Wednesdays and Saturdays. These meetings are conducted by the Academy Chaplain, but are not strictly religious. Travel talks, health lectures, scientific demonstrations and short sermons, presented by outstanding speakers, are frequently on the program. The service is opened with a hymn, prayer and responsive readings, and closed with the singing of "Wentworth," the Academy song.

"Pep" meetings, preceding important athletic contests, are held in the gymnasium. These are always occasions of great fun. Students and faculty make rousing speeches. The cadet band furnishes gay, martial music and everyone anticipates the big game on the morrow. Athletic contests are important recreational events. Every cadet attends them.



The faculty officer in charge is always ready and willing to help any student, no matter what his problem. Whatever the subject, the faculty officer is qualified to give the guidance needed.

Wentworth's library is one of the most important places on the campus. It contains more than 10,000 books on nearly every subject one could imagine. Reference books include the famous Oxford English Dictionary and many sets of encyclopedia.


TRAINING for leadership is important on the football field as well as everywhere else at Wentworth. More than fifty cadets answer the varsity call each year and large squads turn out for company teams. All players receive intensive training, both in the art of the game and in clean sportsmanship.


Wentworth is a member of the Junior College Interstate conference, an athletic associtation numbering seven schools as members. The Wentworth High School teams are members of the Missouri River Valley conference at this time. Almost every major and minor sports are on the Wentworth program — all played under competent coaches and every cadet is required to participate.







SPECIAL EVENTS MARKED THE 75th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOUNDING OF WENTWORTH During 1954-1955

Several special events were held, some pictured here. The first of these was to recognize Founders Day and honor the memory of Stephen G. Wentworth, the founder, and Col. Sandford Sellers, the first superintendent, who served as head of the Academy for 58 years. The speaker and honored guest was ex-President Harry S. Truman, who addressed the Cadet Corps and the guests in attendance and later placed wreaths on the graves of the two men who were honored. Mr. Truman was made an Honorary Colonel of the Wentworth Cadet Corps during the visit he and his wife made to the Academy.

The second event, although an annual one; our Wentworth show in Kansas City had the distinctive 75th Anniversary color.

The third special occasion was one which received nationwide publicity, a re-enactment of the Battle of Lexington which occurred in September of 1861. Joining with the Cadet Corpsin actually portraying the Battle were units from the regular Army, the National Guard, and ROTC units of Karsas City. The leading citizens of the City of Lexington, and in fact the whole community, joined in preparation for this very unusual event. As much realism as possible was achieved, even including the co-operation of the elements because it rained continuously during the day, May 12, 1955, on which this event was held, as it had during the actual Battle, according to authentic records. Attending the event were many high ranking Army officers and other distinguished citizens, which made it one of the most remarkable days in the entire history of Wentworth Military Academy and of the City of Lexington.

The Battle of Lexington riged. The re-enactment of the battle in 1955, drew many thousands of visitors here. It was also re-enacted on its 100th unniversary here when approximately 25,000 were present.

October 25—Our soccer team lost its second game with William Jewell College last night. They played a good game but, unfortunately, not good enough. We had our first "stop day of the year, today. It sure was a zelief to know that we didn't have to do our homework because I know I'm bushed and I definitely am not the only one. This sure is a fine cure for post Dads Day fatigue".

October 26.—We had an assembly program called "The Marvels of Chemistry" today. Unfortunately, it was somewhat less than marvelous, due to the fact that it was especially designed for an audience with less than one year of education. I could be wrong but, if that was a marvel, I should be spectacular.

October 27—Late B.R.C. as usual. Accounting lab was really bad news today. It seems as though I got lost somewhere between the time of learning about debits and credits and where we took up the general ledger. I think I better start getting with the program.

October 28—We had our three-weeks test in economics today and I think I made a real good grade on it. I sure hope I did, I spent half the night dodging the night watchman in order to study for the thing.

October 29—My roommate decided to take his furlough this week end so all is quiet here in my room. I kind of miss not having someone to talk to and blare records, but he'll be back tomorrow night. Tonight the Juntor College team lost to Highland Junior College, 20-6. It doesn't sound as if it was such a close game, but both teams were pretty evenly matched. Unfortunately, we just came out on the short end of the stick.

October 30—The band got back from the Arkansas City, Kansas Arkalalah Festival this morning. They left last Friday after lunch and were guests of the City that night and most of Saturday. They must have had a good time because they were all tired when they got back.

October 31—The Indian Dancers went to Independence tonight to take part in the big Halloween Parade. They must have frozen-to-thebone because the temperature was really cold here ronight. While they were hopping at the parade, I was trying to get ready for a hig test in public speaking.

November 1—That test in public speaking was a real toughy. If I'm lucky, I might pass it. Some of the guys went to Kansas City tonight for the first Philharmonic Concert. They formed an "arch of sabers" at the entrance to the auditorium which was really impressive. There was a picture of it in the morning Kansas City Star the next day.

November 11—Tomorrow is the day of the big Homecoming game against Kemper and everybody is anxiously awaiting seeing their girls and having a good time at the dance. We had another quiz in zoology today and unfortunately I didn't know many of the answers (the right ones that is!!)

November 12—Yesterday, the Junior College team beat Kemper 27-20 in their homecoming game in Boonville and today the high school squads played to a 26-26 tie. It was really a great game! This was even better than the football game because the Band was really tremendous.

November 13—This was another typical Sunday. My company did pretty well in parade and I spent most of the afternoon playing football with some of my buddies. This evening my roommate and I decided to go to the movies and relax a little.

November 14—I called my girl friend tonight. It sure was great to spend some time talking to her. It's 31 more days until Christmas furlough hegins and I'm already looking forward to it.

November 15—Tonight I spent both study periods working on my practice set for accounting. I usually let things like this go until the last minute, but I'm determined to get this done with time to spare.

November 16—This really was a great Wednesday. Seiler and Scahold performed for us during assembly and they were really great. This afternoon we learned about battle drill out at the Country Club, but the best part of the whole day was the letter and twenty dollar check I got from my dad in today's mail.

November 17—We had another late B.R.C. this morning, and I spent most of my free time studying zoology. I'm pretty sure we will have another quiz tomorrow and I can not afford to flunk another one like I did last week.

November 18—We had another quiz in zoology today and unfortunately I didn't do too we'll on it. I spent most of the night playing pool and watching television in the recreation room. It really is relaxing just to go down there and spend an evening leisurely.

November 19—Today I moved from A Company back into Headquarters Company. I really missed not being in the band this year and most of the friends I made last year are back again, so I was glad to make the change.

November 20—After parade, my roommate and I spent most of the day trying to get our new room organized. We put up all sorts of weird signs and managed to find a place to cram all our stuff.

November 21-1 spent most of my study periods trying to put together a good outline for my next speech which is due tomorrow. We have a six weeks accounting exam covering three chapters tomorrow and I'm afraid I'm not too well prepared for it.

November 22–I made an E-on my Public Speaking assignment and I did a pretty good job on the accounting exam too. Our lab notebooks are due this Friday and we have our six weeks test in Zoology tomorrow, so I dedicated my entire evening to science.

November 23—Today's zoology test was not as hard as I thought it would be. We had a series of announcements during assembly today and both drill periods seemed to go a lot faster than usual.

November 24—I went to Kansas City with my roommate and his parents and ate a wonderful Thanksgiving dinner at his grandmother's house. During the afternoon we watched Nebraska lose a close football game to Oklahoma and visited some friends. The day was a real pleasant break in the normal routine of things here.

November 25—We handed in our zoo, lab books today and took a six-weeks test in Economics. The Trumpeter, our school newspaper, came out today. I was so tired from Thanksgiving Day and the work today that I just slept through both study periods tonight.

November 26—The Phi Theta Kappa scholastic Honor fraternity opened their campus theater tonight with a real good show about the Second World War. They had a good turn out and the admission is more than reasonable so there should be more shows to come. After the show I spent a couple of hours working on my practice set for accounting.

November 27—After parade today my roommate went to Kansas Ciry to spend the evening with some friends. I spent most of the afternoon putting the finishing touches on my accounting work and doing some maps for American History.

November 29—I finally handed in my practice set and then I spent most of the evening working an getting all my History notes typed up. This six-weeks grading period is almost over and I only have one more test left.

November 29-1 handed in all my work and took my six-weeks test in History today. I'm not sure about all my grades yet, but I think I made Special Distinction again this six-weeks. My roommate and I played cards and listened to some records tonight. It was nice just to take it easy after all the tests.

November 30—My company went on a road march out to the Country Club and back today for drill. After drill I went to watch the junior college wrestling team wrestle Westminster College in the field house. We won 39-6 and Westminster is a four-year school so we must have a pretty good team.

December 1—The pre-Christmas furlough fever is really getting pretty common now that we only have 17 more days to go. I had to spend most of my time tonight working on zoology again.

December 2—Today was a great day. This morning I did well on a zoo quiz and this afternoon I made my travel arrangements for Christmas Furlough. There are only 13 days left until our vacation and I'm looking forward to the break. Tonight, the high school baskerball team continued to look good while beating our neighbors at Lexington High, 73-70.

December 3—I went with the rest of Phi Theta Kappa's executive board to Columbia today. We attended a workshop at the University of Missouri held for many states. Compared to other groups represented there, we really had a well-organized and productive fraternity. We also met some nice girls from Stevens College while we were there and it was really a nice trip. We came back that evening and watched the junior college lose another ball game to Fairbury, 83-52.

December 4—After church and parade, I spent all this Sunday catching up on my letter writing. After I'd finished letters to my dad and my girl friend, I spent the rest of the day in the recreation room relaxing in front of the TV set. December 5—We started a block of instruction on leadership in military science and tactics this morning and much to my surprise we didn't have to go to zoology. Tonight, the junior college basketball team played well, but lost to Trenton by three points, 73-70.

December 6—This was a regular athletic day. The high school wrestlers wrestled well but lost to the Kansas City School for the Blind, 30-24. The junior college swim team beat Westminster, but fell just short; 49-46. The high school baskethall team went to Bichmond and beat the team there, 69-66.

December 7.—There was no assembly this morning and this afternoon's weekly military drill period was spent almost entirely on cleaning up our rifles and making sure they were in good shape for the Christmas turn-in. The college wrestlers took on opponents from Missouri Valley College this afternoon in the field house and tied the match with this four year institution, 25-25.

December 8—We had a late breakfast this morning and we had an interesting lecture in public speaking. I hate to seem a poor sport, but I believe the referees had a lot to do with our college baskethall team's loss to St. Paul tonight.

December 9.—We didn't have a quiz in zoology this morning, but I was caught by surprise with a quiz in military and a rough work problem in accounting. The high school wrestling and swim teams both lost contests against Missauri Military Academy this afternoon but their basketball team beat Higginsville by three points in an exciting game played in our beautiful field house this evening.

December 10—With Christmas furlough just one week away, we got our civil clothes out of the storage room and turned them in to the laundry for cleaning. Tonight we had our annual Christmas Dance, It was highlighted by the appearance of Santa Claus played by a battalion staff officer. It was really a lot of fun.

December 11—1 spent most of my free time after parade studying for the up-coming six weeks test. Tonight we had a Christmas party with cokes and doughnuts up in the band room. We gave our band director a nice gift and listened to some party records. Everybody is all full of Christmas spirit now that vacation is so near.

December 12—Major Etter's zoology class didn't meet today so I had two additional free hours to study in for the second Monday in a row. Eve got two tests to study for and the extra time is sure a big belp. The first three week grading period of the last six weeks in the semester ends this Friday so Eve still got some work to do before I can leave for home.

December 13—I spent most of my free time finishing up my newspaper articles today. I spent both study periods studying for my three week tests in zoology and economics. Tonight, the high school hasketball heat Missouri Military by two points, 70-68, in Mexico, Mo.

December 14—I practically flunked my test in economics and I didn't do too well on my zoology test either. It sure is hard to concentrate on studies with furlough right around the corner,

December 15—Tonight St. Joseph Junior College beat our team by 20 points here, but it really didn't bother anyone because tomorrow is the last day of classes before Christmas furlough,

December 16—Everybody was so excited about the furlough coming up tomorrow that we didn't get much done in any of my classes today. My roomate and I both took permits tonight and spent them listening to records and packing our bags for the big day.

December 17-Christmas Furlough,

January 3-Wonderful as it was, the furlough is now over. It sure was great to see my dad and my girl friend along with all my other old friends I sure was glad to see that everybody made it back to school safe and sound and had a nice vacation as I did.

January 4—We didn't have an assembly today. During drill this afternoon we drew rifles from the armory and cleaned up our rooms. It's amazing how much dust can build up in three weeks. The high school wrestlers only lost two matches while hearing the Kansas City School for the Blind, 41-8 this afternoon,

January 5—Major Etter assigned approximately 400 pages of zoology to read in the next three weeks, yesterday so I spent most of my free time reading about the different classes of animal life today. Semester final exams are only about two weeks away and I need to do lot of studying for them so I'd better get this done as soon as possible.

January 6-My military class did not meet this morning and I had two other free periods which I devoted to my zoology reading. Tonight the high school basketball team got beaten badly by Higginsville. The boys got a little "rusty" over the long furlough and didn't play as I think they can.

January 7—Our class gave speeches on our hometown police departments this morning in Public Speaking. During most of the afternoon I played basketball up in the field house. I was hoping that our college basketball squad could do well against our arch rival, Kemper tonight but we lost, 93-67. It really hurts to lose to Kemper by that many points!

January 8—I spent most of this afternoon writing my articles for the next edition of the Trumpeter and reading more of my zoology assignment. This evening my roomate played cards and listened to a new record album he bought yesterday.

January 9—Today was a great day, I was accepted at Michigan State University and got my letter of acceptance in today's mail. It looks like I'll be spending my last two years of college in East Lansing, Mich., for sure now. We also got some great new music in band this afternoon.

January 10—There was a lot of athletic activity here at the Academy today. The Junior College swim team beat. Westminster College, 68-35 in our pool while the college wrestlers were beating the same school's grapplers, 23-12. Later, on in the evening, our high school basketball team beat Marshall, 56-55 in a real exciting game.

January 11—Shirley Duncan, a young Australian traveler gave us an interesting account of a trip she made through almost every part of her island nation during today's assembly. I think we all learned a lot about the lives of the people in a country we don't hear much about. During drill we marched to the Country Club and saw a movie on Biot Control Tactics.

January 12—Another late B.R.C., as usual. I took a lot of notes in American History and I had rough time with another work problem in accounting today. The high school wrestlers beat their opponents from Carrollton by a score of 44-8 this afternoon.

January 13—The Trumpeter came out today with the pictures of Military Ball Queens. The Brigade Queen is a pretty girl from Guatemala City, Guatemala. The Queens for this year's Ball were chosen by Warren Beatty, the noted movie star and movie producer. This evening, the Phi Theta Kappa scholastic fraternity showed an interesting movie called "The Bridge."

January 14—After chapel 1 spent most of the afternoon getting ready for my final exams in zoology, public speaking and accounting coming up next week. The Lexington high school wrestlers beat our team, 27-28 but the high school basketball team beat Kemper tonight, 79-56.

January 15—This afternoon after parade everybody crammed into both of the recreation rooms to watch the super bowl football game on television. Later on in the evening I spent most of my time finishing all my reading for zoology and reviewed some chapters in accounting and economics.

January 16—1 had two six week tests today and I think did real well on them. The one in accounting was a lot easier than I thought it would be, but the economics test was pretty tough. I spent all tought's study periods preparing for tests in public speaking and zoology.

January 17—Both my roomate and I are happy about the results of our tests. Bruce got an E on his test in algebra and I'm pretty sure I made a good grade on the first half of my final exam in public speaking, which I took this morning. Kansas City Junior College mauled our team, 92-47 tonight, while the high school hasketball team was beating Richmond in the field house. Most of the boys must have been worried about final exams.

January 18—Even with all the studying I have done, I don't thirth I did too well on my six week test in zoology this morning. Today, during assembly we listened to an interesting talk about the culture of the American Indians given by Chief Seshunta from Oklahoma. This afternoon my company ran the inidividual training course during drill. We were all anxious to get through it as quickly as possible because it was really cold out today.

January 19—I took the first half of my final exam in accounting today and did real well. Tomorrow I have the second half of that exam and my final in zoology so I spent most of the afternoon and evening putting the final touches on my studying. The high School basketball team lost to Carrollton tonight, 83-69.

January 20—The second half of the accounting final didn't go too well for me, but I think I did pretty well on the zoology final. This afternoon the Kemper high school swimming team got beaten in our pool, 57.34. Tonight the high school basketball beat Richmond's team in the field house.

January 21—This morning I messed up the oral part of my public speaking final, but I did real well on the History final. I watched the

Highland Junior College team cream our team, 103-44. One week left until the big Military ball and I'm really looking forward to it. My girl friend is coming down from Michigan State University and it sure will be a lot of fun I'm sure.

January 22—This afternoon, we all packed the recreation rooms again, to watch the National Football League's All-Star game. I was so tired after finals last week that I slept most of the afternoon and evening.

January 23.—Today was the first day of second semester classes. I've got another seventeen semester hours of work ahead but it should be pretty interesting. I'm taking Geology, American Economic History, Accounting, Economics, and Journalism.

January 24—This afternoon I went up to the field house to watch the Junior College Wrestling Team's match against Hannibal LaGrange. It was really great! There were eleven matches and our team won ten by pins. The College swim team lost to Park College 69-39 and the J. C. Basketball club continued their losing ways by dropping another game to St. Joseph.

January 25-We were told about the rules and regulations concerning the Military Ball today during assembly, but I don't think they will ruin my plans. My company played a real weird game of seccer during drill today. Massed games are really a lot of fun in the cold.

January 26-It snowed all day today. I sure hope it doesn't pile up everywhere like it has here or it will ruin the Military Ball week end for a lot of guys, myself included,

January 27—The snow kept coming down all night and part of today, so, when my girl friend called me this afternoon and told me she was snowed in; I wasn't surprised. I decided to go downtown and get myself something with all the money I'd saved, but all I ended up with was a pipe and some tobacco.

January 28—Tonight was the night of the Military Ball. Despite the snow and ice, almost everybody's date made it down for the dance and the city was full of pretty girls from everywhere. Even though I didn't have a date, I had a pretty good time meeting everybody's dates. The field house, which the A.U.S.A, spent all week decorating really looked nice and the queens were cute, so it wasn't as had as I thought it would be without a date.

January 29—The Military Ball Queens received today's parade and most of the guys got to spend the day with their girl friends and parents. I spent most of the afternoon and evening listening to my roommate's new records and playing cards.

January 30—Everybody was dead fired after the long week end of excitement so Colonel Wikoff's announcement of a 'stop day' was a big relief. I went to bed early tonight,

January 31—The high school basketball team pulled a big upset tonight by beating Excelsior Springs, 66:59 in the field house. This ended a previous 14-game winning streak for the Tigers, one of the top teams in the State. This afternoon at Kemper, our college wrestlers tied the Yellowjackets 18:18 in what I've heard was a great match.

February 1—Temorrow right after DRC, the whole band is going to New Orleans, La., to participate in the Mardi Gras Festival. We are going to march in three parades down there and it should really be a lot of fun. We didn't have an assembly today and during drill we cleaned rifles. Most of the night my roommate and I packed our bag for the trip, and made plans for the big trip.

February 2–I had a big geology test second hour this morning and I could barely concentrate on it. I didn't think noon would ever come, but it finally did and we all boarded two Greyhound scenic cruisers for the trip to New Orleans.

February 3—We spent all yesterday afternoon and evening traveling and finally teached the Coast Guard Station where we are staying at about 9 a.m., this morning. This evening we marched in the Hermes Parade. It seemed like we marched by a million people and all of them were cheering and clapping to the music. It really made me proud to be a member of the band when I saw how impressed the crowds were with our performance.

February 4—This morning we got up at about 8 o'clock, hurriedly shined our brass and shoes, and boarded the buses for the Iris Parade, which began at 1 p.m. The crowds were larger for this parade than they had been for the one the night before and everyone was pre-occupied with trying to eatch trinkets thrown off of the many floats in front of us. After the parade was over, we all took the GrayLine Tour of the City. Some of the older mansions near the French Quarter were really beautiful. When we had finished the tour we ate in a nice cafeteria and had some free time to enjoy the sights. I took this time to visit my mother.

through this parade, it started pouring rain. It came down as hard
for a while that we were the only band in the parade. Although we
were all wet, the crowds stayed and actually grew in the French Quarter
where they went wild as we played Dixie, so it was well worth it. When
the parade finally came to an end, we had a little free time and then
boarded the buses for the return trip to Lexington.

February 6—Everybody in the band was exhausted from the three days of excitement in New Orleans so we all slept like babies through most of the trip back. When we got back to the Academy at about 3 p.m., this afternoon most of us unpacked a little and went straight to bed. Although I was totally unaware of it until the next morning, our high school basketball team upset Excelsior Springs again beating them, 74-73 in an overtime game.

February 7—I was still pretty tired when I woke up this morning and I almost fell asleep in my journalism class, 4th period. I had to spend most of this afternoon writing my newspaper articles which were overdue for the next issue of The Trumpeter which is scheduled to come out this Friday afternoon. Tonight I watched the high school team lose a basketball to Slater in the last two seconds. It was really a close game.

February 8—This afternoon during drill my company did the Army's daily dozen and then went on a short road march. After drill my roommate went down town and bought a yo-yo of all things. Now all he does is play with it and it's beginning to drive me crazy.

February 9—Late B.R.C. again as usual. This is the third day in a row that my geology class has been cancelled and I think Colonel Stagner must be pretty sick. During my free period, third hour, I made up a standardized test that I had missed while I was at the Mardi Gras. It was really rough but I think I did all right on it.

February 10—Today was really a miserable day. I had four threeweek exams and I had to stay up pretty late last night studying for them all. The exams in Economics and Journalism were pretty tough, but even through the ones in American Economic History and accounting weren't as hard, they weren't easy either. In today's mail I got a real nice letter from an old friend so that made the day a little nicer.

February 11—The weather was kind of dark and overcast most of the morning and afternoon so I spent most of the day answering letters and listening to records. I was finally able to get my roommate and his yo-yo out of the room long enough so that I could write in my diary too. This evening our Phi Theta Kappa fraternity showed another real fine movie in the school chapel.

February 12-My company won two out of the three ribbons awarded in the parade today. This afternoon my roommate and I plus some of our buddies from A Company went swimming in the pool in the field house. We had a wild game of rag tag going for almost two hours. We all went to the movies in town after supper.

February 13—This afternoon we had our company basketball pictures taken. Unfortunately that is about the most successful thing we've done since the season began because our team has lost all five of its games so far. Most of the guys are getting ready for the Wentworth Show this Friday night.

February 14—This was not a good day for teams; both lost games tonight. The high schoolers were beaten by three points by Lexineton and our winless junior college team lost, 93-72 to Kemper. The college wrestling and swimming teams also went to Kemper this afternoon. The wrestling lost a real close match, 18-17, but the swimming team won by a large margin.

February 15—Since the Wentworth Show in Kansas City is only two days away, we were treated to previews of three of the acts during today's assembly. Both drill periods this afternoon were completely devoted to practice for the Wentworth Show, so I had most of this Wednesday free for studying. Tonight the high school beat Kemper, 54-49 in a baskethall contest played in Boonville.

February 16—Late BRC as usual. My geology class did not meet again today. I got a late valentine from an old friend in today's mail which was really kind of cute. I didn't feel much like studying during C.Q.s this evening so I decided to go see the double feature at the movies.

February 17—This afternoon the band went in to Kansas City ahead of the rest of the corps in order to practice the snap drill in the municipal auditorium where the Wentworth Show is going to be to night. After we went through the drill, a couple of times, we were free until 7 p.m. I went with a couple of my friends down to the Italian Gardens Bestaurant and are a great spaghetti dinner. The show itself was really great with their musical acts and short comedy skits, but the most impressive parts of the show were the Red Berets Bayonet

drill and the People-to-People parade of flags carried by the members of the corps from many different countries.

February 18—The Corps didn't get back to Lexington until almost 2 a.m., last night so we had a late BRC this morning. When I awoke this morning there was snow on the ground so right after breakfast I went back to sleep. This afternoon, high schools from all over the State participated in a swim meet in our pool. Out of all the schools present, our team finished second, which is pretty good considering how much larger most of these schools are.

February 19—This afternoon after Sunday panale, I went up to the field bouse and played basketball for a few hours. Later on in the day, I listened to two new records that a friend of mine had just bought and then my roommate and I went to the show. I don't know why but I seem to be spending a lot of time at the movies now.

February 20—During today's noon meal, Colonel Wikoff announced that we had a Stop Day, so everybody on campus was free for the evening. I called my dad after supper and since it was so quiet in the barracks. I decided to study for six week tests coming up at the end of next week.

February 21—This morning's economics class was really interesting. We spent most of the period discussing the work of the Federal Reserve and the different types of money in circulation here in the United States. My roommate and I wanted to go to the local Catholic Church's chile supper tonight, but it was so crowded that we couldn't stay. Unfortunately our college basketball team continued its losing streak tonight when Kansus City Junior College buried us, 101-53.

February 22—My company spent it's Wednesday drill periods going through bayonet training in the football stadium. The instructor, Captain McGondel, is new here in the military department and he really knows his work well. Tonight at our bi-weekly Phi Theta Kappa meeting, we held a slave market in which all the new incoming members were auctioned off to the boys already in the fraternity. After everyone had been sold, we had a swim party and a card party. It was really a lot of fun for everyone:

February 23—We had a study period during the hour normally allotted for assembly yesterday, in order to make room for the assembly today. The program was a combination talk and movie about the life of Abraham Lincoln. The man who gave the talk was extremely interesting because he pointed out many of the humorous sides of this past president by imitating his voice.

February 24—Colonel Barnett gave me quizzes in two different classes today. I made a perfect score on the journalism quiz, but I missed two questions out of the ten be gave in economics. My company basketball team lost another game this afternoon during athletics. It looked like we were going to win until the game started, then everything changed right away.

February 25—During Chapel today our Phi Theta Kappa fraternity inducted its new members. The ceremony was highlighted by the speech given by Mr. Horace Kimbrell who is the chairman of the Board of Directors for the Goodwill Industries of America. He spoke about his experiences in the Navy during the war in a humorous way and rointed out the necessity of improving ones self as much as possible. Tonight I went to a dance at Cottey College in Nevada, Mo., with some of the other junior college cadets, after watching the junior college basketball team lose it fifteenth straight and last game of the season to Haskell, 75-54.

February 26—We didn't get back from the dance at Cottey College until almost 3 a.m., so I was really exhausted after today's parade. I slept most of the afternoon and I spent most of the evening reading "Where the Girls Are". This book, written by Princeton University students tells about the girls at a great number of U.S. colleges. Some of the comments and descriptions are really funny.

February 27—My geology class finally met for the first time in nearly two weeks. Poor Colonel Stagner still didn't look like he was feeling too well, but it sure was good to have him back in class again. I got three letters in today's mail so I spent most of my study periods answering them and studying for my journalism test tomorrow.

February 28—The Journalism test wasn't as hard as I though it would be and I think I did pretty well on it. Tonight our company went out to the Country Club to eat a steak dinner that we won for making the best scholastic record first semester. After the meal, a local newspaperman told us about his experiences covering the U.S. space shots for a big newspaper syndicate.

March 1—I had a six week test in economics this morning and I think I did real well on it even though I didn't study as much as I should have. During drill this afternoon we had a uniform and rifle inspection in our rooms. Although Government Inspection is over a month away, we are already in the process of getting ready for it. We all got our military fact sheets today and I'm in the process of learning the eleven general orders.

- March 2-1 guess my luck finally ran dry as far as tests are concerned. The accounting test I took this afternoon was a pretty tough one and I'm a little worried about it. Tonight I took over college recreation room duty for my roommate so he could take his girl friend to the show, I think this is the first time that I've watched any T.V, during the week since the school year started in September. I had never seen some of the science fiction shows before.
- March 3—My accounting professor was up at the field house helping with the baskerball tournament so I handed back yesterday's for him and went over the test with the rest of the class. The State small and middle division championships are being played in our field house and people have to watch them from all over Missouri.
- March 4—The State Championships were decided in our field house tonight. From what I've heard, both games were really exciting and there were almost 4,000 people in the stands watching every minute of the action. This afternoon I helped type up this year's edition of the student directory, which is published by Phi Theta Kappa. I was really tired after supper so I was glad to be able to sit in the chapel and watch another good Phi Theta Kappa movie.
- March 5—The bleachers were still surrounding the baskethall court in the field house, so it was impossible to have our regular Sunday parade. Instead, the Honor Guard did its drill and the band put on its snap drill. I worked some more on the student directory this afternoon and spent the evening studying for a geology test I have tomorrow morning.
- March 6—Today's geology test was not too rough and I am pretty sure I did real well on it. I got my economics test back today and I had the highest grade in the class. This evening I decided to spend my time answering letters and taking it easy.
- March 7—Everybody is all excited now that spring furlough is only three days away. I must admit I spent most of the day dreaming about all the plans I've made for the vacation. We had an interesting lecture on the development of roads and canals in our country in my American economic history class today.
- March 8—During today's assembly, Colonel Wikoff gave us a very informative talk on how the draft system now affects us. This afternoon during drill we turned our rifles in to the Armory. That is another sure sign that spring furlough is just around the corner and I'm getting more and more anxious for the time to pass.
- March 9-Another late B.R.C. as usual. With the furlough so close and only two classes today, I decided to spend most of the day in the recreation room taking it easy. This evening my roommate and I went to the show and packed our bags for the vacation which starts tomorrow.
- March 10-We had shortened classes today and at 12:30 SPRING FURLOUGH started.
- March 19-1 got back from furlough at about 4:30 this afternoon, It was sure great to spend some time at home with my family and visit all my old friends again. Unfortunately this vacation did not last long for two boys for they were killed in automobile accidents. One of them was a real close friend of mine and it upset me when I heard the news.
- March 20—I spent most of the day trying to get back in to the swing of things. We turned our civilian clothes in to the trunk noom this morning and I spent most of the afternoon trying to get ten days of dirt and dust out of my room.
- March 21—Things have gotten back to normal for the most part. I took a permit and a supple tonight, but I spent most of the evening working on Practice Set Number 3 for accounting—It's going to take me a while to get back in the swing of things for a while . . . I can't seem to concentrate on my studying.
- March 22—We didn't have an assembly today so I had an extra hour to get my shoes and brass ready for inspection and put in a little more work on my Practice Set. My company drew rifles for the ceremony this afternoon and did a little dismounted drill and physical training during drill. My geology class started work on subsurface water today and it's really interesting.
- March 23—Late B.R.C. as usual. This afternoon after classes, everybody signed up for spring sports. I had thought about taking gymnastics, but at the last minute. I decided to go out for company softball. This evening I sent a letter to my family to make sure that they knew I'd made it back to school safe and sound.
- March 24—I turned in my Practice Set today in accounting and spent most of the afternoon trying to figure out the work problem we got in class. After classes, some of my friends and I played much football on the outdoor parade ground. I hadn't played with a football since early December and it sure was fun.

- March 25-Since I didn't have any morning classes today, right after I picked up my laundry I started reading Truman Capote's novel, "In Cold Blood." I became so engrossed in it that I spent most of the afternoon reading it too. Tonight Phi Theta Kappa showed an old Jack Lemmon movie in the chapel and it was really hilarious.
- March 26—Today being Easter Sunday, most of the boys' parents and girl friends came down to spend the day. Since my folks live two far away to come for the day, I decided to call them long distance. After I talked with everybody back home for a while, I spent the rest of the afternoon and evening reading and listening to soft music. It was really relaxing.
- March 27—My military class moved to the rifle range for the beginning of our marksmanship course this morning. I nearly flunked a small test in accounting this afternoon, but I did have a pretty good time playing softball during athletics. I spent most of the evening finishing up my newspaper articles for the next issue of The Trumpeter and studying for a test in Journalism.
- March 28—The MST-5 contract students that are going to ROTC Summer Camp at Fort Sill this June, started wearing fatigues to class today because of some special training program. I did real well on this morning's journalism test and I spent most of the evening studying for a test I have in economics tomorrow.
- March 29—The test in economics this morning wasn't too hard. This afternoon during drill my company ran the physical combat proficiency training course. I made a passing score of about 310 points, but I didn't do as well as I had earlier in the year. This evening I was the floor chief on the first floor and I had a little trouble getting ready for two tests because of it.
- March 30-1 didn't make a very good score on this morning's geology test, but I made a perfect paper on this afternoon's accounting exam. That gives me three Es and an S for three week grades so far so it looks like I'll make the Special Distinction list again.
- March 31—Five other cadets and I spent all day today at the Muehlbach Hotel in Kansas City attending a business symposium for college students. There were about twenty-five other schools for the Kansas City area represented and we all listened to three excellent speakers give brief, but extremely interesting speeches on current economic problems. This was one of the most educational experiences I have ever had and I am really thankful that I was lucky enough to go.
- April 1—The weather was pretty miserable this April Fools Day. It rained most of the day so I spent my time listening to some real good record albums I had borrowed and taking life easy for a while. Tonight we had our annual "W" club dance and although I didn't get to go, I heard it was a lot of fun.
- April 2—My company didn't look too good in the weekly paracle up in the field house and the weather was still bad all day. This afternoon I went swimming for a little while and then I played basketball. After supper my roommate listened to some records and I worked on my diary.
- April 3—My military class practiced rifle fire on the firing range and 1 gave a brief on the business symposium in Kansas City during Economics this morning. This afternoon I made up a test in American Economic History that I missed last Friday. It wasn't too hard and I think I did pretty well on it. I certainly wish the weather would clear up. I'm getting pretty tired of wearing my raincoat all the time.
- April 4—Things really were nice today. This was the first nice sunshiny day we've had since last Thursday. I usually only have two free hours on Tuesday, but today three of my regularly scheduled classes weren't held so I only had to go to one class. I used most of this free time to read my economics and accounting assignments.
- April 5—Unlike most Wednesdays, we had an hour of military C.Q.s instead of Assembly today. This afternoon during drill we did the Army's daily dozen and received instruction on how to conduct an administrative road march. My roommate was across the hall talking to a buddy after taps this evening and the night watchman caught him. That got him five hours in excess real quick.
- April 6—Late BRC as usual. I had another five straight hours free today and I was pretty well caught up and well ahead on all my studies so I decided to read all morning. This afternoon I took post duty sixth hour and activity period for a friend of mine. Both our College and High School tennis teams played St. Paul's this afternoon. The college lost 5-4 hut the high school won its match, 5-4.
- April 7—I was really mad this morning when I messed up my marksmanship test in military. I don't think I even had time to answer five of the questions on it so I guess I'll be lucky if I pass it. Geology didn't meet again today. I'm sure glad this was Friday because I didn't feel like studying tonight and I don't have any classes until Monday.

April 8—Today was a beautiful day. The sun was shining and the temperature was in the 70s during both the afternoon and evening. During Chapel this afternoon, the National Honox Society held its initiation of new members. After Chapel, I proof-read most of the Phi Theta Kappa Student Directory. This evening Phi Theta Kappa showed a real good movie in the chapel.

April 9—During parade this afternoon my company won another scholastic ribbon award. I spent most of the afternoon working on an outline for geology so that I could go to the spring dance held at the Episcopalian church tonight. It really was a lot of fun.

April 10—My military class didn't meet and I made an S on a quiz in economics this morning. This afternoon we had a test in accounting and I have a feeling I didn't do as well as I would have liked to. As usual I was late with my articles for The Trumpeter so I spent all evening working on them.

April 11—Today our high school track team finished second in a triangular meet. Although we were better than Higginsville we just weren't quite able to beat Lexington. The college track team hear St. Pauls in a dual meet at Concordia while the college golf team was beating Kansas Gity Junior College at our Country Club. The high school tennis team also beat Cameron high school this afternoon. All our spring sports teams are really great again this season. The college golf and high school tennis teams have yet to lose a match and the other squads have won a lot of contests too. This evening, my roommate and I both took permits and listened to the Kansas City Athletics beat Cleveland's Indians, 43 in their opening game of the baseball season.

April 12—Colonel Wikoff gave an excellent talk on morals during this morning's assembly. With our annual Government Inspection coming up next Monday, everybody spent most of today's drill periods gerting initial preparations taken care of. This evening my roommate and I took supper permits and went out to cat pizza. I had floor chief duty tonight so I didn't get much studying done.

April 13—Late BRC as usual. It started raining again today and I certainly hope this storm only lasts one day and not give like the last one. I had to spend most of the evening studying for tomorrow's sixweeks test in journalism. This afternoon both the college golf and tennis team beat Haskell in matches played here.

April 14—During military we fired rifles for grades and I did real well on my journalism test this morning. I had a real interesting talk with my American economic history professor concerning Abraham Lincoln's reconstruction plans during class after lanch. This afternoon the high school tennis team continued its winning ways by beating Marshall on our courts, but the college track team lost a real close meet with Highland J. C.

April 15—After chapel this afternoon everyone on the campus spent the afternoon cleaning up for Monday's Government Inspection. No matter what barracks you went into there were beds, chairs, shoes and all sorts of other things piled up out in the halls. I was amazed to see how much junk we were able to get rid of and how dirty our room really was. My roommate and I washed the windows, walls, and floors and then put a few coats of wax on the floor. When we were all through, the room was nice and clean but we were filthy.

April 16—Sergeant Hanna of our military department, inspected our barnacks today to make sure that everything was ready for tomorrow's big inspection. He was unable to find anything wrong with our room so my roommate and I took the afternoon casy. Later in the evening, we went out and had a steak dinner and enjoyed a good movie in town.

April 17—Everybody in my company was really tired at breakfast this morning because most of us stayed up late washing and waxing the floors in the hall. The three Army inspectors, one a Colonel, one a Major, and one a Sergeant Major, sent from Fifth Army Headquarters in Chicago, arrived on campus at about 8 A.M. For two hours they attended briefings by the cadet command echelon and inspected the military department's records. From 10 A.M., until noon he inspected our rooms and our uniforms and rifles in ranks. (We were all kind of let down because none of the inspectors even looked at our rooms.) After lunch the inspection team watched the Band's Snap Drill and the Red Beret Rifle Drill in the field house before receiving a parade of the whole corps, brought the inspection to a close. At supper tonight, Colonel Wikoff told us that the inspectors were all very favorably impressed with our work and gave us the evening free for doing a fine jub.

April 18—Today was our annual picture day so there were no classes this morning. All the companies, athletic and academic, societies and club went up to the field house to have pictures made for the new view book. This was really nice because everybody was exhausted from the work and excitement centered around the Government inspection and this gave us all some time to relax and take it easy. This afternoon

we had a real interesting lecture on income taxes in accounting and 1 spent most of the evening preparing for a six-weeks test in economics temerrow. All our athletic teams with the exception of the high school golf team, had contests this afternoon. We won all but one of the five competitions by wide margins and just barely lost the meet we didn't win.

April 19.—This morning's economics test went fairly well and during today's assembly, Colonel Wikoff and Major McDonnell of the military department, both praised the entire corps for a fine Covernment Inspection. We had a drill boliday this afternoon so I spent most of the afternoon and evening getting ready for an accounting test.

April 20—Late BRC as usual. My accounting class didn't meet today so I've got another night to get ready for that test and one coming up in geology. The high school golf team went to Excelsior Springs this afternoon where they won a good match against a tough competior. My roommate was O.D. in the barracks this evening and a lot of guys were caught skipping study periods by the O.C.

April 21—My military class did not meet today. The test in accounting wasn't too hard and 1 did well on it, but 1 made a lot of mistakes on this morning's test in geology. The college track team finished second in the Highland Relays, the high school and college tennis teams both beat teams; they both beat St. Paul's in matchesheld here, and the high school golfers beat Carrollton at the Country Club in sports action this afternoon.

April 22—This morning all the junior college new bows took the Strong Vocational Interest Test in the chapel. This afternoon the high school track team participated in the Fort Osage Invitational Track Meet and the Indian Dancing group went to Kansas City for the Y.M.C.A. "Indian Guides" show in the Municipal Auditorium. This evening, an 'all girl band' called the Kansas City Kittens, played for the A.U.S.A.'s yearly dance.

April 23—Although it was a pretty rainy day, a group from Chicago's Civil War Roundtable Group visited Lexington's battlefield, where the battle of the hemp bales was fought, and were our guests for lunch. The group's leader received our weekly parade and approximately 60 other members watched the ceremony in the field house. This afternoon and evening I helped a friend of mine with a term paper he is working on for an economics class.

April 24—I turned in my notebook and had my six week exam in American economic history this afternoon. Now that I have all my work for the second six weeks of this semester completed I can take a little break. This evening I went with a friend of mine over to a faculty officer's home to watch a T.V. special on the "Tijuana Brass". It was a great show and even better in color.

April 25—This morning we started studying igneous rocks and the different ways in which they form in geology. It is real interesting and I'm glad because I would like to do better in that class. This afternoon we got our practice set and test back in accounting and I did real well on them both. It looks like I'll make scholastic Special Distinction again even though my geology grade dropped.

April 26—We had military C.Q.'s instead of assembly this beautiful Wednesday morning. During drill my company went on a road march to the Country Club where we set up our tents and companies the way we will during bivouac training on May 6th. During the first two study periods this evening I got ready for a standardized test in accounting tomorrow. Third C.Q. my roommate and I decided to listen to a bagpipe record he has.

April 27—Late BRC as usual. Today, during my free hours I filled out some forms for "Who's Who Among Students in American Junior Colleges" and I sent them in. About twenty-five members of this year's Junior College sophomores received letters from the organization that publishes this book, asking for biographical information for their first volume. I thought this was really an honor and a privilege. This afternoon's accounting test went real well. Tonight I got a long distance phone call from my dad. I didn't realize that I hadn't been writing as often as I should, but we had a real nice talk and it sure was nice to hear his voice.

April 28—This morning I heard some real interesting lectures in economics and journalism. In economics we had a very good discussion on the size of the National Debt and what it means. Our journalism lecture was based on the principles of court reporting. This afternoon we won the State Junior College track meet and the golf and tennis both ended their seasons with victories in big meets.

April 29—This morning I was really tired so I went straight to bed after breakfast because I had all morning free. After chapel I went down town and bought some glue and stickers to use on my scraphook. I spent most of the afternoon going through all the things that I had saved this year and trying to put them in neatly. This evening the Cavaliers, our dance band, played for Lexington High School's Junior-Senior Prom, which was attended by a lot of other cadets.

April 30—The boys that are planning to come to Wentworth's Summer Camp this year ate lunch with the Corps in the mess hall and watched parade. This was the ribbon parade for the second six weeks and my company won the Deportment and Scholastic ribbons. I couldn't do much this evening because I had floor chief duty, but I had an interesting talk with the O.C., about his military career.

May 1—We started a block of instructions on the 81 M.M. mortar in military today. Our instructor is S/Sgt. Padilla, a new member of our military department and an excellent NCO. My geology class didn't meet this morning, but I almost got caught with a pop-quiz in journalism. After classes this afternoon, I helped the Director of Development, Capt. R. H. Miller return some things he had borrowed.

May 2—This afternoon during athletic period, my company softball team won its first game, 10-9. I received a real nice birthday card from my mother with twenty dollars in it, during mail call, after lunch, This evening my company went to the Country Club to eat a steak dinner we won for having the best scholastic record this semester. After the banquet I went to visit a faculty officer at his home. While I was there we took the National science test that was on television. I scored a 72 which was in the excellent bracket,

May 3—During this morning's assembly, we enjoyed an excellent program on ventriloquism. The ventriloquist explained how dummies are made and showed us two that belonged to him and how they worked. During this afternoon's drill periods we had company physical training competition for a drill holiday. Each company was represented by two men who run the P.T. course while the rest of their company cheered them on. Alpha Company won and was presented a blue ribbon for their company colors; the first one they've won since I've been here.

May 4-Late BRC as usual. With bivouac coming up this weekend and three week tests starting next Monday, I thought I would spend as much time as I could studying during my four free periods this morning and afternoon. This evening during third C.Q.s, Captain McGondel, the O.C., gave us an interesting talk on his recent experiences in Vietnam and in the Army.

May 5—Today I went with six other members of The Trumpeter Staff to the University of Missouri in Columbia for the awards banquet of the Missouri College Newspaper Association. Our paper was entered in the Class D competition and we finished third out of nineteen schools in that division—several members of our newspaper staff also received individual awards for articles they had written and pictures they had taken. After the banquet was over we were given some time free so two other future journalists and myself visited Christian College and the City of Columbia. On the way back to the Academy, we stopped in Boonville for supper. While we were there we talked to a few guys from Kemper. It was really an interesting day.

May 6—Today was supposed to be the day of hivoure but since it has rained for three straight days, the ground was too moist to set up tents at the Country Club, so we only had a road march—7.2 miles in the rain sounds pretty dreary but I had a ball. After we had gone about a mile I was so wet that it didn't bother me any more. We marched along railroad tracks and country roads for three hours telling jokes and jumping in mud puddles. When I got back I hung my wet clothes and took a short map.

May 7—During today's parade, Colonel Ingalls, our professor of military science, presented the parents of a soldier who had given up his life in Vietnam, the Purple Heart and Bronze Star Medal. I spent most of this afternoon and evening studying for a standardized test in accounting and another test in geology. Just before taps, my dad and morn called me long distance to wish me a happy day after my birth-day. They are already making plans to come out for Commencement exercises this June.

May 8—I think I did real well on both the geology and accounting tests today even though I didn't have a chance to complete all of the test in accounting. This evening I are a real nice steak dinner at the Trumpeter staff banquer. After everyone had finished the meal, Mr. Fred Sellers, a former cadet here and son of Colonel Sellers, president of our school, gave an interesting speech on progress that is being made and has been made in the newspaper world. Mr. Sellers is a copy-reader with the Kansas City Star and I learned a great deal from his speech,

May 9.—This morning I had another three weeks test but this one was in journalism. Although it covered the last five chapters of our book, it wasn't as hard as I had expected it to be. I decided to take an evening off from the books and went out to eat pizza and play cards with a member of the faculty. It was the first time I had ever played canasta and I really did enjoy it.

May 10—During today's assembly a State Highway patrolman from Lee's Summit came and talked to us about safe driving. He showed us a movie put out by the Department of Traffic Safety in the State of Ohio called Signal 30' which dramatized the adverse affects of careless driving habits very effectively. We have had two boys from the Corps killed in auto accidents so this movie really hit home. We spent all of this afternoon's drill periods getting our rifles all cleaned because the weather was too bad to allow the regular massed games program we were supposed to have had. This evening, I was able to visit the campus of Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Mo., to see if it was the kind of school that I might like to attend next fall. It was too small and limited in its social and educational offerings for me.

May 11—Late Breakfast this morning as usual. This morning and afternoon the students in the advanced military training courses (MST 5 and 6) made preparations for their own special bivouac coming up this week end. From what my roommate tells me the MST 6 students will be aggressors and the MST 5 students will be "friendly forces" in an all night problem. Everyone will have rifles that fire blank ammunition and a few of the members of each side will have machine guns. I made a perfect paper on my accounting test afternoon and spent all night studying for tests in economics and American economic history.

May 12—This morning I were fatigues to military and we went out on the parade field in order to get some practical work on the 81 m.m. mortar. I didn't do too well on either of the two tests I had later on in the day and frankly, I was a little disappointed with myself because they weren't that difficult. This evening I went down town for the Phi Theta Kappa banquet and had a real nice steak dinner. Colonel Thomas, our dean, gave us a very meaningful talk on Americanism before we closed our meeting,

May 13—This morning I finally took the time to sit down and answer all the letters that I have let go for so long, I owed some of my friends letters from almost two weeks ago and I figured I better do something about it, Captain McGondel gave a tremendous talk about the development of our youthful generation here in America during chapel and I really enjoyed it. This afternoon I played softhall and caught up on some reading while my rosmunate took off for the MST 5 and 6 bivourse.

May 14—My roommate came back at about 8 a.m., this morning after spending all night on the field problem. He was really tired and dirty, but he told me about some of the more interesting things that happened before he dozed off. (Apparently it was rough but they really had a ball!) Today being Mothers Day we had three ladies review the weekly parade and the mother that had come the longest distance, trooped the line. I played softball again in the afternoon and went to bed right after supper because I was really tired.

May 15.—This morning I was caught off guard by a quiz in Military and I don't think I did very well on it at all. In most of my other classes we seem to be moving through material a lot faster now that the second semester is almost over. This evening the college sophomores had a hot dog roast in the hollow behind the tennis courts. It was a lot of fun to just sit around leisurely and ear hot dogs and marshmallows and tell jokes. After the hot dog roast was over, I played "moon light" softball with some of my buddies. It was really hilarious because no one could see the ball until it was right next to them because it was so dark. May 16—This morning we had a special memorial service for the four boys (three cadets and an airport employee) who had died in accidents during the current school year. It was a very solemn ceremony for me because two of them were personal friends of mine who I miss a great deal. This evening my company went to the Country club for a steak dinner for having had the best deportment record this semester. During C.Q.s. I worked on my newspaper articles because I wanted to have them all done before final exams start.

May 17—Due to the fact that we had a chapel service yesterday, there was no assembly today and we all went to our regular fourth hour classes instead. We cleaned our rifles for about an hour and then turned them in along with our packs and equipment during drill. During C.Q.s. I started analying for my final examination in Goology. This seems to be my weakest course and I really want to do well in it because it is a five semester hour course.

May 18—Late B.R.C. as usual. Today I had two free hours before and after lunch so I got a little physical conditioning done with an isometric bar done in the morning and worked on two Accounting problems during the afternoon. A lot of the guys were out getting sun tanned this afternoon, but I can't afford to do that until finals are over because I seem to be getting a little behind on my studies.

May 19—This morning we took mortars outside for practical work in military class. I don't know why but I don't seem to be able to do much with a mortar and it's a little embarrassing because it is not that complicated. This afternoon our company softball team beat an A Company team, 17-4. (It sure was great to slaughter another team because we really got beaten badly in our last game.) I spent C.Q.s getting my uniform and shoes all ready for a band trip tomorrow. We are going to Whiteman Air Force Base to take part in Armed Forces Day festivities there.

May 20.—This morning at 9 a.m., we boarded Air Force buses for the band trip to Whiteman Air Force Base. It was drizzling when we left the Academy and it rained most of the day so a lot of the events scheduled had to be cancelled. We took part in the dedication of a memorial and a base review and gave a small concert in the post theater before returning to Lexington late in the afternoon. This evening the Phi Theta Kappa fraternity showed Alfred Hitchcock's movie "The Birds" in the school chapel.

May 21—Today was "Rats" day, the day on which first year boys become "Old Boys" for a day and the "Old Boys" are treated like "Rats" (or first year cadets). During parade our "Rats" company commander and guidon bearer forgot we were marching outdoors for the first time this year and made a few mistakes. It was really unbelievable to see how some of the poor "Rats" reacted to being leaders for a day. During most of the afternoon, I tried to finish my newspaper articles and get some studying for finals done.

May 22—Aside from more practical work with mortaes in military, most of my classes were devoted to covering the last little bit of material before the end of the semester. My six weeks tests start Wednesday and finals start Friday so I started my last minute cramming tonight.

May 23—This morning we finished studying earthquakes and crustal movements of the earth in geology and I listened to an interesting lecture on advertising methods in Journalism. I spent most of my study bours this evening studying for geology and economics six week tests coming up tomorrow morning.

May 24—I did pretty good on try six week test in economics, but I don't know what to think about the test in geology. It wasn't really that hard, but I'm not too sare I did very well on some of the more specific questions. During today's assembly period, I went to the fieldhouse where Colonel Sellers gave us a brief talk on what college elsewhere would be like. Both drill periods this afternoon were devoted to practicing for an indoor commencement parade in case it should happen to rain on June 4th. May 25—This afternoon I did real well on my six week exam in accounting and started studying for my final examinations. Tomorrow, I have finals in geology, economics, and American economic history plus a notebook to turn in. Unfortunately I haven't done enough studying for economics or economic so I hope the tests aren't too hard.

May 26—Today was exammed full of tests. I turned in my M.S.T. manuals and took a test on mortars and finished the morning with finals in geology and economics and the last lecture on advertising in Journalism. After lunch I took my final in American Economic History and reviewed for my upcoming final in accounting. I was really shocked to see how easy the geology and economic history exams seemed, but I didn't do too well on the economics final.

May 27—This morning we got our civilian clothes out of the trunk rooms and turned them in for cleaning. The end of the year is only about a week away and everyone is getting all excited about the closeness of summer vacation. This evening the Phi Theta Kappa theater ended its first season with another Alfred Hitchcock thriller entitled "Marnie". It was really great to relax for a while after spending all afternoon getting ready for the rest of my final exams.

May 28—Sergeant Major Poinsett of our military department retired after thirty-five years in the Army during today's parade. My company was also awarded the ribbons for scholastic and deportment excellence during the parade. Lspent most of the remaining afternoon and evening studying journalism, accounting, and economics for tomorrow's finals.

May 29—I really think I did great on the finals I took today. I had a little trouble with some of the Journalism questions, but I didn't have any trouble at all with economics or accounting. Now all I have to do is get through my last three finals tomorrow and I'll be through.

May 30—The last three finals went real nice for me and now all I have to do it wait for the semester grades to be posted. This evening I went over to the recreation room and watched television for a while before I went to bed. Finals really wore me out and I'm really looking forward to a good night of rest.

May 31—Today's assembly was dedicated to making commencement announcements and during drill this afternoon the graduating college sophomores and high school seniors practiced for commencement in the field house. It's really kind of hard to believe that there are only four days left in this school year and with finals over all 1 have to do is pack my stuff and take it may. This evening we had our spring athletic banquet in the dining room.

June 1-Since I only had two classes today I spent the morning packing and the afternoon reading and relaxing. My parents will be here for the Commencement week end tomorrow some time and I'm really looking forward to seeing them again.

June 2—My folks got here late this afternoon and I showed them all around the campus and introduced them to some of my buddies. Bruce, Doug, Jim, and I took pictures of the campus this morning and I hope they come out well because I'm graduating from Junior College this Sunday and I won't be coming back to the Academy next year. This evening, the band played the Commencement Concert in the field house.

June 3—This noon my folks went out to the Country Club for the visitor's lunchoon. Later on we had our annual awards assembly and I got a medal for being Feature Editor of The Trumpeter. I spent the afternoon with my folks showing them the school and the town. There are some real pretty old homes in this town that date back to pre-Civil War Days. This evening we had our annual Commencement Dance in the field house. Everybody is really anxious to leave now that Commencement is tomorrow.

June 4—The big day is finally here. This morning we had baccalaureate exercises in the field bouse and boy it went slow. Commencement exercises started at 3:00 and was followed by the last parade of the year in which the Brigade Commander yelled "Brigade Dismissed!!!!"
