To attain this high purpose, the Academy places greatest emphasis upon these four points:



SINCE EIGHTEEN EIGHTY

One of the chief reasons why Wentworth has been able to achieve its lofty purpose lies in the fact that the Academy has been under one continuous administration since its founding. For nearly three-score years, Colonel Sandford Sellers was president of Wentworth. He enjoyed one of the most enviable records in the history of American education.

The Academy was founded by Stephen G. Wentworth, scion of a distinguished English family and a prominent Lexington banker, in 1880, as a memorial to his deceased son, William Wentworth. Mr. Wentworth immediately vested control of the institution in the hands of a board of trustees composed of a duly elected representative of each of the Evangelical churches of Lexington, and a president. Colonel Sellers was called to the new school in its first year and remained as its active head until 1938. Mr. Wentworth served as president of the Board from 1880 until his death in 1897. It was the firm conviction of the founder, his board of trustees and President Sellers that a military boarding school provides the most effective possible means for giving young men the thorough mental, moral and physical training necessary to develop in them the highest traits of manhood. Thus, Wentworth became the first military school in the Missouri River Valley.

From the beginning the late President Sellers surrounded himself with the ablest faculty available — strong men of proved qualities and Christian character. Under his wise and forward-looking direction, Wentworth has grown steadily. Each year has shown marked improvement over the preceding year. Today Wentworth stands as one of the truly great educational institutions of our country — second to none in the opportunities it offers boys and young men for thorough preparation for professional studies, business and for life.

AN HISTORIC BACKGROUND

Throughout over half a century the Wentworth purpose has remained unchanged. The ideals which led to the Academy's founding and which have carried it steadily forward, shine just as brightly today as ever: the desire to give each youth every opportunity to develop fully his own individual personality; the aim that every cadet shall acquire a keen sense of duty and responsibility, both to himself and toward others; that he shall have the mental and moral power to make accurate judgment between right and wrong and the physical power to stand by his convictions.

These high standards have dominated Wentworth for generations. But to maintain them and assure their full and continuous application, it has been found necessary to limit the enrollment. Wentworth today is a relatively small school-many times larger than in 1880, to be sure, yet small enough that every individual student is given the private attention so essential to his all-'round development.

The surrounding country affords a wealth of historically important Civil War sites and the town of Lexington itself retains much of the tradition of the old south. Here enthusiasm for the reminders of our country's glorious past is combined with the enthusiasm for modern adventure to promote the rapid development of the boy's mental, moral and physical resources.

The Wentworth Military Academy of today is vastly different from the Wentworth of 1880. From year to year it has enlarged its facilities, increased its enrollment and changed its physical appearance until there is little to remind one of the early days. Numerous modern and attractive buildings have been erected as they were needed. Old buildings have been torn away when they were no longer useful. Spacious military and athletic fields have been added. One of the finest Field Houses in the country has been built. Every new method in teaching that has been found definitely superior to older methods has been adopted. Yet, some of the fundamental principles that guided the first company are adhered to just as strictly today.

M I L I T A R Y DEPARTMENT

MILITARY training at Wentworth has been a strong feature since 1895 when the first active army officer was detailed to the Academy but has never been permitted to interfere with scholastic work.

Today the Reserve Officer Training Corps program (ROTC) at Wentworth is administered by Regular Army personnel, consisting of three commissioned officers and six non-commissioned officers, who are in charge of instruction.

Cadets are taught the theoretical aspects of the basic military subjects through formal classroom type instruction. Each Wednesday afternoon during the regular drill period the cadets apply those fundamentals learned. During the fall and spring of each school year the cadet corps participates in a field training program during the drill period. Initially, stress is placed on proficiency of the individual in such subjects as first aid, physical fitness and individual combat training. Later through instruction in combat formation, battle drill, patrolling and bivouac training. During the spring this training is culminated when the cadet corps participates in a field exercise which includes a tactical march and overnight bivouac.

Through participation in the ROTC six year Military Schools program, a cadet receives all necessary ROTC training to qualify for a Reserve Army Commission once he has attained a baccalaureate degree.

Wentworth is proud to be one of the original Honor Schools of the United States, the highest rating given by the Department of the Army.


THE WENTWORTH COUNTRY CLUB



DEPARTMENT




The scholastic department is divided into two separate and distinct units: the high school, which offers four years of preparatory work, and the junior college, which offers two years of liberal arts and science. Each has its own

organization separate from the other. Both divisions are fully accredited by the North Central Association of Golleges and Secondary Schools, an organization composed of the leading colleges and preparatory schools in twenty states. This recognition means that graduates of either department are eligible to enter any institution in the United States that receives students by certification.

It is our aim to see that each cadet masters every lesson thoroughly. To accomplish this, every student is taught correct study methods and thoroughly schooled in correct uses of libraries and laboratories. Classes are small, which permits individual attention. Most of the faculty members live in the buildings with students. They are readily accessible for special help, From time to time a personal study is made of each cadet to determine his points of weakness and help him overcome them.




SR. HALL



AVIATION FLIGHT TRAINING GROUP

AVIATION

Wentwarth participated in the Federal Aeronautics Administration Civilian Pilot Training Program from its inception in 1939 through the change to C, A, A. War Training Service until June, 1943, when all but 80 out of 712 colleges and universities throughout the country were eliminated due to curtailment of this type of training. However, the academy administration, believing aviation training to be very important now and in the future to the youth of the nation secured permission from F, A, A, officials to continue flight training on a civilian basis and at the expense of the trainee. Wentworth operates in conjunction with the Earl Haines Flying Service at the Laxington Airport as a certified flying school fully approved by the F.A.A. The flight training program, including ground school, far surpasses the minimum requirements set forth by the Federal Aeronautics Administration gualifying cadets for Private and Commercial Pilot Certificates. It consists of instruction in both dual and solo flight time.

The records of the graduates of the Wentworth Flight Training are outstanding. During the war the graduates of this training program fought on every front where Americans were in combat.

A D A Y

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AT WENTWORTH

NOTWO days at Wentworth are quite the same, for a widely varied program of scholastic, military, athletic and other activities is used to keep the interest of the cadets at high pitch and their appetites for learning well whetted, Furthermore, no two students have quite the same duties to perform throughout any given day. There is, however, a definite routine that all cadets follow each day. It is used to instill perfect regularity and promptness in attendance upon all duties prescribed for one and all cadets alike.

While it requires some adjustments for new students to become accustomed to this routine, any slight hint of monotony is soon lost in the kaleidoscopic whirl of the school year.

To give parents and others a better insight, the following pages have been used to set forth, pictorially, the day's activities from Reveille to Taps, of a typical Wentworth boy whom we will designate as Cadet Harlan.

> The pictures in this section were taken several years ego. However, since they illustrate life at Wentworth of today, they are still timely. They are retained because so many of the codets shown served in the Armed Faces of their country and as well illustrate the value of military training as received while at Wentworth.

> Since the Importance of military preparedness is becoming increasingly avident by the changing world situation, the training illustrated in this picture section has a special significance.


There have been some uniform changes as may be seen by referring to the section on Wentworth uniforms.

HERE is Harlan, a typical Wentworth cadet—a fine young American—manly, scholarly and upright. His respect for duty and responsibility has won for him the rank of sergeant. He may have come from a large city or a very small town—that makes no difference to the democratic spirit that prevails at Wentworth. He may be from a wealthy family or a family in meager circumstances—most of his classmates would never know, nor even be curious, unless he chose to tell them. But he typifies all the fine qualities of a deserving and ambitious youth as he goes through the tried and age-proved Wentworth process of becoming a real man, a real asset to himself, his family and friends, and society as a whole.

Harlan, like all the others, participates in many activities besides those shown. But let's follow him through a typical day.

His brothers, Hugo and Arthur, also attended Wentworth. Hugo, a Major, served with distinction with the Rangers, Arthur served with the Navy Air Corps as an Ensign and presently teaches school in Missouri.

CAN'T GET 'EM UP," blows the bugler, but he does, and at 6:35 o'clock another day is under way. Cadet Harlan goes first to the sanitary lavatory on his floor. A good washup is part of the routine, for a cadet is expected to keep him self clean at all times. At 6:50 he goes to a well-prepared breakfast.

After breakfast, rooms must be cleaned. One of the basic aims of our system is to form personal habits of order. Each morning Harlan makes his own bed, puts his clothes in order and helps his roommate clean the room,

Strict inspection of quarters is a daily routine. Formal inspection of Harlan's person, room and equipment occurs on Sunday morning. At this time unusual care must be taken in cleaning the room. Our friend sees that hidden corners are carefully dusted, chairs polished, and everything put in order. Then he takes care of his person. There's brass to shine, leather to polish, hair to brush, and whiskers to be removed. A certain time is allotted for this preparation and all work must be done within that time. This young fellow knows that any deficiency in this work receives what is known in Academy language as a "skin"—which counts against one's company in color competition.

> A^{T 8 O'CLOCK in the morning, classes convene. Harlan makes his way to a small class on his schedule where personal attention is his at any time it is needed. Our cadet is carefully instructed in the handling of delicate scientific equipment. He is not forced to grope blindly for information. That which is true of the science laboratories is equally true in all other classrooms.}

> Time passes rapidly in the classroom or laboratory because the work is interesting. The scholastic day is divided into two equal parts, with four classes in the morning and two in the afternoon.

CALISTHENICS play an important role in the physical education of Cadet Harlan. No effort is made to indulge in this or any other exercise in the early morning hours when the body is at its lowest ebb. All such exercises are taken by our cadet after a hearty breakfast and morning classes. The exercises are intended to promote graceful movement as well as better health. The calisthenics used by the United States Army are followed. They are led by senior cadet officers.

So long as the weather permits, the calisthenics are held in the open, but they are taken in the large gymnasium, where an entire battalion may take part at the same time, when rain or cold is in the air.



D^{RILL} is a very formal affair. It is on the drill field that Harlan learns much of courtesy, discipline and alertness. He, with his entire battalion, is thoroughly schooled in good citizenship, taught the proper respect for superiors and trained in leadership.

Learning to drill a squad is the first training in leadership. Throughout the year squad drill and competition is a part of the regular military routine. The squad is the smallest military unit and consists of nine to twelve men, two of whom are sergeants. All instruction is conducted by cadets under the personal supervision of members of the military faculty.

Although military work takes but one hour each day, the training is intensive and much more thorough than that found in larger units. Personal attention is given the individual cadet on the military field as well as in the classroom, and each cadet has an equal chance to advance to important positions in Wentworth's military realm. In the army, the navy and the marine corps Wentworth is glorified by its alumni who have received their commissions and are distinguishing themselves in official capacities of these respective branches of service.



Like many other cadets, Harlan finds the extended order drill more interesting. This drill consists of combat methods. He is taught to make use of cover, to advance and to fire. No actual firing is done during this drill, however, for all the ammunition used is dummy material. Initiative and leadership are required in this work. Situations arising in the problems furnished by the Department of the Army call for quick thinking and immediate action.

Here our typical cadet finds extended order drill interesting and instructive.

COLLOWING the morning classes comes lunch time and our cadet is ready to eat. Academy menus are always varied and pleasing. Meals are carefully planned to suit the needs of all cadets. They are healthful and nutritious and just what active, hard-working boys require. Meal times are at 7:00 in the morning, 12:10 and 6:10. This schedule is varied only on Sunday, when dinner becomes a more elaborate meal served at 12:30.

After dinner there is a recreation period during which Harlan and other cadets may do pretty much as they choose. The recreation room is a popular place at this time.

C ADET HARLAN attends interesting, informative and inspirational meetings in the chapel, immediately before lunch on Wednesdays and Saturdays. These meetings are conducted by the Academy Chaplain, but are not strictly religious. Travel talks, health lectures, scientific demonstrations and short sermons, presented by outstanding speakers, are frequently on the program. The service is opened with a hymn, prayer and responsive readings, and closed with the singing of "Wentworth," the Academy song.

"Pep" meetings, preceding important athlatic contests, are held in the gymnasium. These are always occasions of great fun. Students and faculty make rousing speeches. The cadet band furnishes gay, martial music and everyone anticipates the big game on the morrow. Athletic contests are important recreational events. Every cadet attends them.



The faculty officer in charge is always ready and willing to help any s udent, no matter what his problem. Whatever the subject, the faculty officer is qualified to give the guidance needed.

Wentworth's library is one of the most important places on the campus, It contains more than 10.000 books on nearly every subject one could imagine. Reference books include the famous Oxford English Dictionary and many sets of encyclopedia.









SPECIAL EVENTS MARKED THE 75th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOUNDING OF WENTWORTH During 1954-1955

Several special events were held, some pictured here. The first of these was to recognize Founders Day and honor the memory of Stephen G. Wentworth, the founder, and Col. Sandford Sellers, the first superintendent, who served as head of the Academy for 58 years. The speaker and honored guest was ex-President Harry S. Truman, who addressed the Cadet Corps and the guests in attendance and later placed wreaths on the graves of the two men who were honored. Mr. Truman was made an Honorary Colonel of the Wentworth Cadet Corps during the visit he and his wife made to the Academy.

The second event, although an annual one, our Wentworth show in Kansas City had the distinctive 75th Anniversary color.

The third special occasion was one which received nationwide publicity, a re-enactment of the Battle of Lexington which occurred in September of 1861. Joining with the Cadet Corps in actually portraying the Battle were units from the regular Army, the National Guard, and BOTC units of Kansas City. The leading citizens of the City of Lexington, and in fact the whole community, joined in preparation for this very unusual event. As much realism as possible was achieved, even including the co-operation of the elements because it rained continuously during the day, May 12, 1955, on which this event was held, as it had during the actual Battle, according to authentic records. Attending the event were many high ranking Army officers and other distinguished citizens, which made it one of the most remarkable days in the entire history of Wentworth Military Academy and of the City of Lexington.

The Battle of Lexington rages! The re-enactment of the battle in 1955, drew many thousands of visitors here. It was also reenacted on its 100th anniversary here when approximately 25,000 were present. The Honor Guard, the snap drill team of Wentworth, is invited on suary special occasions to appear before the public. Pictured below is Secretary of the Army Robert Stevens, accompanied by Charles C. CADET MEMORIES 1967-68

September 4–I arrived back at the Academy for officer's camp just in time to go to the first meeting. Tonight, got all my gear together and managed to arrange a couple of items. The high school football has already been practicing for a week.

September 5-My roommate came by with his girl friend this afternoon. He doesn't have to be here till next Sunday. Some college football players and band tryouts came in today to start practice before school,

September 6-After lunch, I helped drill the new cadets who were here. More and more keep coming and the campus is beginning to look active again.

September 7-After a briefing by all the department heads, I found out classes will begin Monday after the old boys arrive. I spent the night working on a cabinet I made for my records.

September 8-I think most of the new boys arrived today. They have a meeting tonight and drill tomorrow. It's going to be tough getting them ready before the old boys return.

September 9–Drill, drill, drill, and the new boys still can't get it right. Time will tell though. Tim sure they'll come around. I know that the old boys will start pushing them starting tomorrow.

September 10-The old boys came in today. It was great to see old friends after the long summer. My roommate and I have our room pretty well fixed up.

September 11-Early morning! Today was taken up by orientation and of course, drill.

September 12-Classes started today. Usually all that the instructors do is get acquainted and tell about the requirements for the course during the first class, but my teachers started right in on the material. Looks like a rough year.

September 13-Drill today was productive. The old boys showed the new boys how, and everything went fast. All the companies are looking like military units now,

September 14-"Late BRC, as usual". Even though it is still early in the year, I made good use of that extra hour of sleep. I played a game of handball in the gym during C.Q.'s.

September 15-Today was the first Honor Guard practice. About 50 are trying out. Most of them are new boys who went to Ft. Benning for Summer Camp. Some are really outstanding.

September 16-Honor Guard practice again today after chapel. Some have gotten discouraged with the work and quit. Tonight, I studied during C.Q.'s figuring I wouldn't tomorrow.

September 17--Today was the first parade. The Corps didn't march in dress uniforms because all of them haven't got theirs yet, Considering the new boys, it was pretty good though.

September 18-Another week of classes that I just can't get used to. But Monday morning is always the earliest and darkest. More study at night. I figure if I get ahead, it won't be hard to stay there.

September 19—This afternoon there were no classes for most of us. The new boys had to take a special test so classes were suspended. I went downtown and bought some cards to send to my friends. This evening I started playing handball after a summer of doing nothing.

September 20-Today was processing day. All the cadets go to the gymnasium and get a mass physical.

September 21—"Late BRC as usual". This evening our college had a football game against Centerville J. C. They played hard, but Centerville was just out of our class. After the game I went down town for a "midnight" snack.

September 22-There were no classes this morning because the new boys were taking more tests. Tonight, the high school lost their football game to Slater. I spent the night trying to catch up on home work.

September 23-After chapel about ten of us played a game of football. Like fools, we played tackle without any equipment. My knees are all scratched and snore. More study during C.Q.'s.

September 24-Today was the first really professional looking parade of the year. The commanders knew what they were doing, and so did most of the cadets. It's amazing how the corps gets polished in only two weeks. Tonight, I went to the show and let my home work ride. I'll have to spend another week catching up. September 25-A very uneventful day that started too, too early. Monday's must be blue everywhere though.

September 26-The Christmas furlough travel agents were here today. Marking reservations to go home gave everybody's morale a boost. There are still 80 more days to go, but at least they are going.

September 27-Instead of having an hour wasted by announcements, Assembly today consisted of an extra study period. I was glad too, because it gave me a chance to get even across the board. The Honor Guard practiced during drill today. I hope we can keep doing that. It's three hours of practice that really help.

September 28-"Late BRC, as usual". The college team met Wm. Jewell tonight. They put on a good performance considering Jewell is a four-year school,

September 29–1 think I flunked my Spanish test today. Some thing about that language that bothers me. The high school played Richmond and lost. Spirit isn't too high in the team or the corps. I hope things go better next time.

September 30-Part of the morning I worked with the Color Guard. There's an awful lot that I've forgotten-especially about the band's snap drill. Tonight was a night of peace. I slept from dusk till dawn.

October 1-Parade was outside on the parade field today. Mr. C. R. Mooney, a friend of the Academy, received parade. His son graduated from Wentworth and was killed in action during. World War II. Tonight, I went to bed early because Monday morning always seems extra early.

October 2--We had another psychology test today. I'm certain I did well, but I wish we got the tests back so I could see what I did and didn't get right. Studied European History, we have our first test tomorrow.

October 3-The European test was just what I expected-easy but comprehensive. I called home tonight and made sure my mother was still coming up next week end.

October 4-Assembly was interesting today. Vic Hyde, a comedy musician, put on a show. He could do just about anything with almost any instrument.

October 5-"Late BRC, as usual." There were no afternoon classes because of a special faculty meeting about student counseling.

October 6—The day seemed to drag. All I could think about was the week end. The high school football team had a game tonight. It rained so hard that the corps didn't have to go. I had a permit so I went with my mother and another boy from Oklahoma City. We just went to the motel and talked.

October 7-The first school dance was tonight. I had a date with a girl I knew from Christian College in Columbia. It was a good band and we both had a great time.

October 8-Parade was outdoors again this week. The Color Guard is getting perfect; they're on their own from now on. My mother and my date left after parade to go home and back to school respectively.

October 9-Another early, early Monday morning. It was hard to get going with the school work again after the eventful week end. 1 went to the show tonight which just prolonged my week end.

October 10-Colin Jackson, a member of the British Parliament, was here today. Fourth hour didn't meet so that he could speak to the Corps. He gave a different point of view about China and the Middle East.

October 11-No assembly today. Instead, we made up the fourth hour we missed yesterday. I have it free so it didn't make much difference. The Honor Guard is beginning to get really polished.

October 12—"Late BRC, as usual". After lunch today, the corps got their first flu shots of the year. Tonight, the college football team played Haskell J. C., a tough game, but lost. I took Alpha company in to the stadium since the company commander is a member of the football team.

October 13-Captain Oliva gave my Spanish class a big test today. 1 think 1 am finally beginning to understand about half of what he says, Literature class didn't meet because so many were absent. Most of them were gone on a soccer trip to William Jewell.

October 14—Today, the Band and Indian dancers went to Kansas City for the American Royal Parade. The band even went back to do their "snap drill" in the arena that evening. October 15--1 left the Color Guard take care of itself today and marched in my first parade of the year. This evening I called Liz, my girlfriend, she might come visit over Thanksgiving. I hope so.

October 16-Another early, early Monday morning, and another dull Monday night spent trying to recover from the week end,

October 17-This afternoon I told the Honor Guard that they are going to perform next Sunday before parade. They're all looking forward to it. My roommate and I went to see the soccer team play Ottawa this evening. They last, but for their size, they raised a lot of bumps.

October 18-Today during Assembly the different awards that are presented at the end of the year were explained. The new officers took the oath and Honor Society awards were handed out.

October 19-"Late BRC, as usual". The Band went back to the American Royal again. For me, the day was very uneventful.

October 20-Today was the beginning of a big week end, Dad's Day. Today was Career Day when the dids make up panels of the different professions. It gives everyone a chance to learn something about their chosen field. Tonight, the high school team played Lexing ton for the first time in history. It was tough, but they finally won.

October 21-Day's Day was great, if your dad was here, except that the school kept us and the dads so busy that nobody had time with their dads to just talk and relax. Tonight, was the Dad's Day banquet after which a magician performed.

October 22-Today was a really great day. The Honor Guard performed and it went off without a hitch.

October 23-Early, Early Monday morning. I had three tests today. This day was as bad as yesterday was good. I really studied during C.Q.'s for a change.

October 24-We had C.Q.'s during the afternoon today because of a soccer game tonight. The corps attended in mass, and the team played Westminster down to the wire.

October 25-There was no assembly today. Honor Guard practiced during drill, We've put some more into the drill, 1 spent the night trying to study, but mostly day-dreaming.

October 26-"Late BRC, as usual". The college lost another football game to Highland J. C. I hope they can get with it; the season looks bad.

October 27-Spent all afternoon on a report for history. I got it done just in time to go to the high school football game. We lost to Carrollton. It was a few stupid mistakes that made the difference.

October 28-Today, I listened to the Oklahoma-Missouri foothall game on the radio. Luckily my team won 7-0. Tonight, I went out to eat and then took a walk.

October 29--Ribbons to the companies who ranked highest in military, discipline, and scholarship were given today. The band took two out of three. After SRC, I went to the show with my roomate.

October 30-Early, Early Monday morning-Most of the morning was spent writing a history report that is due tomorrow. It seems like all homework is always put off till the last minute.

October 31-Got my report in on time. Just in time to have a test in history Thursday. The Indian Dancers went to Independence to be in the Halloween Parade. Tonight, the dancing classes met, I should have signed up; some of the girls are really knock-outs.

November 1-No assembly today and instead we had an early lunch. The mothers of the Kansas City cadets were having a banquet in the field house. The Honor Guard couldn't practice 'cause so many were gone with their mothers.

November 2—"Late BRC, as usual". My European history test was a lot different from the last one. It looks as if I'm going to have to start hitting the books. And that's what I did all night.

November 3--The college football team won their second game today. They beat Haskell 15-0 at Lawrence, Kansas. Maybe they've gotten together now and can win a few.

November 4–I listened to Oklahoma beat Colorado, 23-0 on the radio this afternoon. I don't think anybody else can stop them this season. My roommate and I played handball in the evening.

November 5-The Honor Guard performed again before parade. After parade I went to see the "Wentworth Story", a movie that was being shown in the chapel.

November 6-Only 39 more days till Christmas furlough. Everybody seems to move faster, November 7-A had day for me. I couldn't seem to do anything right in or out of class. I spent the evening playing handball with Baker, a friend from Oklahoma City.

November 8-Today we had a special visitor, an alumnus of Wentworth. Lt. Gen, Lerov Lutes, (U. S. Army Ret.), who was in charge of logistics during World War II, visited and gave a brief speech during assembly. Instead of regular drill, the corps passed in review for the retired general. After drill, I went down town and bought a card for Liz. I played handball again during C.Q.'s. I should have studied.

November 9—"Late BRC, as usual". This afternoon the Honor Guard practiced for a short while. Then, I watched the soccer team lose to William Jewell. Tonight, Major Willoughby gave his annual pep talk before the Kemper game. There was a big bonfire on the drill field and plenty of noise and spirit.

November 10—This morning there was no breakfast. Instead we had brunch at 9:45 after which we loaded the busses and beaded for Kemper. When the corps got there, we marched through Boonville then in to the stadium. Our high school team lost 18:0, but the college has a crack at Kemper tomorrow at Wentworth.

November 11-Homecoming was today. In the afternoon, our college team slaughtered Kemper. Tonight, I had a blind date for the Homecoming dance. She turned out to be more than I ever expected. I really enjoyed myself and got in late.

November 12--The Honor Guard pulled off an impossible act today--we marched two places at the same time. Christian took one guard to Kansas City for a grand opening. I kept another here to perform for Homecoming guests.

November 13-Early, early, early Monday morning. The colder it gets, the earlier the morning seems. The band went to march in the Ararat Circus parade. I played handball during C.Q.'s.

November 14–1 called home to find that my mother, my girlfriend, and my dog are coming up for Thanksgiving. Baker's girl might come with them also. It will be good to have them here for four days.

November 15-There was no drill today. Instead, we had a high school football game with Missouri Military Academy. The team was really fired up, and they ran all over Missouri M.A. The fact that it was the seniors' last game had a lot to do with the victory.

November 16--"Late BRC, as usual. "Classes ended early today so that the cadets could meet with their counselors. My counselor is Capt. Butherus, but I hope not to have any problems to speak to him about. Played handball again tonight. It's becoming a habit.

November 17—Tests seem to be the thing today. I got the O.K. from the military department to use bayonets during the Honor Guard drill. The bayonets will add a lot of excitement to the drill, also make the guys more careful. I went to the show with a friend and got back after taps.

November 18--A normal Saturday except that I slept the whole day away. Sleep makes the time go faster. There are only five days till my mother, Liz, and my dog get here. The band went to perform at the half-time William Jewell football game.

November 19-Christian drilled the Guard before parade so 1 didn't do much today. I slept all day again. If I keep this up, I'll turn in to a lazy burn.

November 23--(Thanksgiving)--My mother, Liz, my dog, and Baker's girl got here just before noon. We all checked out, and then we went to the motel to watch the Oklahoma-Nebraska football game. Of course, Oklahoma clinched the Big Eight and an Orange Bowl berth by beating Nebraska, 21-14. We ate Thanksgiving dinner at Maib's. November 24-While Baker and I were in classes today, my mother and the girls went to Kansas City shopping. That night, my roommane went out to eat with us,

November 25-Today, the Honor Guard had the trip to the Mineral Bowl in Excelsion Springs. We left early for Excelsion Springs. When we got there, we followed the band through a parade. January 3–My plane was five hours late but it finally left, I met my roommate at the Kansas City Airport and we caught the bus back to Lexington. Spent most of the night talking about furlough.

January 4-Dragged through classes. It's hard to get back in the groove. We formed the Honor Guard to march Sunday. We won't be getting much practice.

January 5-I slept today away. I found out the Guard doesn't have to march Sunday. Went to the show in the evening with my roommate,

January 6-After chapel, I stayed in my room and painted. Called home that evening to let them know I made it back all right.

January 7-My church didn't meet today for some reason, but my afternoon wasn't free. I had to write my article for The Trumpeter,

January 8-Before classes this morning I added literature to my second semester schedule. That means eighteen hours but I think I can handle it. When to the show with Thompson; should have studied for Lit. test tomorrow.

January 9–1 got the highest grade on the Lit. test, I should go to the show more often. Went downtown in the afternoon and window shopped. My roommate and I watched the "B" basketball game before C.Q.s.

January 10-The corps got rifles back today during drill so the Honor Guard practiced. In the afternoon, I bought a model and by evening, it was no more.

January 11-History test was extremely difficult for a change. I hope it didn't catch me too off-guard.

January 12-Easy day! None of my morning classes met so I slept. Wide awake in the evening because of extra sleep so I went to the show.

January 14-Got up early (anyway, early for a Sunday) and went to BRC with Thompson, to church. Guard drilled for an empty fieldhouse. Then in the afternoon, I watched the Super Bowl.

January 15-Another early Monday morning. Went through classes in a daze. Studied a little at night, but went to bed early.

January 16-Had my Lit, final exam today and did well on it. I attended the college basketball game even though it wasn't mandatory.

January 17-This morning I had more examis. Got an E on my educational psychology test. During C.Q's, I painted a picture of San Francisco. It wasn't too bad considering the source.

January 19-Woke up this morning with a terrible sore throat and cough. Suffered through the second half of my psychology final. Slept all afternoon and evening in hopes of beating my cold.

January 20.—There was a basketball game this evening for the college. Some cadets started throwing pennies. I collected six cents for a night's work.

January 21–Honor Guard drilled again before parade. I slept all afternoon, but to make up for it I played handball in the evening. Semester break!

January 22-Second semester, school work started with a "stop night." I played handball again.

January 23-Botany is going to require some effort on my part. Everything else is just about like first semester. Spent the evening studying and trying to get off to a good start.

January 24–During drill today, the Honor Guard practiced for Military Ball next week end. I made up a Spanish class I had missed during C.Q's.

January 25-Today we got our microscopes in Botany. If I drop one, I-II be a pauper for the rest of my life. Final grades for first semester showed a 3.5 grade point.

January 26--With Military Ball tomorrow, today went awfully slow. Several Honor Guard members played football in the afternoon and I received a few humps.

January 27-Liz and my mother arrived about noon. The afternoon was taken up by the rehearsal for that night. Went to the dance that evening with Liz,

January 28-1 got up early and went out to the motel-then to church with Liz. The Guard's performance was poor but nobody seemed to notice. Liz and my mother left after parade.

January 29-Classes were useless today. Everyone's mind was still on the Military Ball.

January 30-Today's classes were again sort of useless because everyone was making reservations to go home for spring furlough.

January 31-Honor Guard got a lot accomplished during drill. We learned a new formation for the Wentworth Show.

February 1-"Late BRC, as usual.' My roommate and I went to the show. It was a mystery that left us shocked.

February 2-Today took the edges off last week end. I had a Spanish test, a Lit. test, and a Trumpeter article due all at once.

February 3-Found out one Guard member hurt his foot, so J spent the afternoon practicing to fill his spot. Studied all evening in hopes of making up for yesterday.

February 4--I marched in the Guard today and Christian drifled them. It was a new experience. The night was spent in a pseudo philosophic discussion with friends.

February 5–I gave my speech in ROTC class today. I was a little apprehensive at first of the subject matter. But my Army instructor agreed that the Marine Corps was best and gave me a good grade.

February 6-Spent the afternoon watching the college wrestling team demolish Kemper, 37.0. Took a dinner permit and cheered the B-team basketball, then back to study for Lit. test.

February 7--Colonel Wikoff timed the Honor Guard for the Wentworth Show. We had to cut off about a minute, but we did it by speeding things up so we didn't have to cut anything out.

February 8-1 went to Kansas City to be on a TV show to advertise for the Wentworth Show. That evening I went to the show.

February 9--1 had my first Botany test today. It was impossibly long, impossibly difficult, and wonderfully challenging for a change.

February 10-The Honor Guard went on a trip to Kansas City to advertise for the Wentworth Show. It was terribly cold and no one turned out to be as cold as we were.

February 11-Sunday. Relaxed after yesterday's ordeal. I painted a landscape but decided it was no good and erased it.

February 14-The Guard practiced all afternoon for the Wentworth Show. I went to the show in the evening and tried not to worry about the show. February 15-Captain Holt was the officer on duty tonight. He dropped by and talked with us for awhile. WMA Show tomorrow'

February 16-Handed in Trumpeter article, then off to Kansas-City with advanced party to the auditorium. I met my mother, Liz, and her parents at the Downtowner and got them in the Show.

February 17-For Honor Guard today was entirely anti-climax. In the auditorium last night we got an ovation so loud, the Guard couldn't hear my commands.

February 18-To church with Liz, then we all ate at the Slop-Shop. They left after parade.

February 19—Everyone thought we'd have a "stop night" tonight, but there was a college basketball game so they put the "stop night" offtill Tuesday.

February 20-Spent the stop-night doing just about nothing.

February 21-Late BRC because of the stop-night. We didn't have any assembly; instead, they moved up third hour. During drill, 1 worked with the Individual candidates for competition at the University of Missouri.

February 22-Washington's Birthday! Big deal! I had a quiz in European today. I think I did pretty well.

February 23-Today we got put on confinement cause our room was dirty. We spent the afternoon cleaning the room so that we could get off.

February 24–Got off confinement. I didn't have any morning classes so I slept late. I went downtown after chapel and bought a model and some paint.

February 25-Guard drilled. I worked on my model in the afternoon, and went to the show with my roommate in the evening.

February 26—Early Monday morning. Someone turned my roommate in for being out of uniform last night. They made me report him, It's pretty had when you have to report your own roommate.

February 27-Botany lab was usually impossible today. I had no idea what I was doing. I was just "shoveling snow" and getting it done somehow.

February 28-Honor Guard couldn't practice during drill, 1 went with the company and left early, Studied in the library that night.

February 29-Today is Leap Year Day. I didn't get any proposals, which is fine with me. Played football in the afternoon and ached all evening.

March 1-1 had both an English test and a botany test today. That was too much. I had to relax so I went to the show.

March 3-Another Sunday. The Guard marched as usual, then I spent most of the day in bed. After waking once in the early evening, it was a blank till.....

March 4-Monday morning. It was hard to keep my mind on class work, thinking too much about furlough. Managed to study some though cause I have a history test tomorrow.

March 5-Didn't do so well on my history. My ticket home for furlough arrived today by special delivery letter. It's going to be a rush to catch my plane on the eighth.

March 6-The Corps turned in rifles during drill today. The cadets were a bit restless at supper formation. I think spring fever is setting in early.

March 7-Several new boys from second floor tried to throw Thompson and I in the shower. We fought them off at the door and held our ground.

March 8--Rush and hurry! Classes seemed to last an eternity but finally I was gone on furbugh.

March 9-16-Spring Furlough.

March 17-Returned from furlough in good spirits. But soon after I unpacked and put the uniform back on, I realized classes and 77 more days are hard to face.

March 18-A dreary day full of rain and long classes. Played handball this evening.

March 19–I formed the Honor Guard to march at the University of Missouri, It was different marching with just four squads. More handball in the evening. March 20-Today Col, Symons (ret.) was here for lunch. He is the secretary of the A.U.S.A. The Guard practiced during drill. I went out to cat in the evening, but came back and studied some too.

March 21-"Late BRC, as usual". After classes, I made a trip down town to have my watch fixed. There was a triangular track meet on when I got back. I think we won.

March 22-1 retrieved my watch this afternoon. From six till nine 1 played handball. It was fun while it lasted, but I ended with a blister on each foot,

March 23-This evening I went to a movie in the chapel. It was put on by the Phi Theta Kappa.

March 24—This Sunday was the Sunday they give out awards. Alpha Company finally got a ribbon for being the highest scholastic company. I spent the evening in the gym playing handball.

March 25-Had a literature test this morning that made me wish I'd studied last night. In the afternoon I took some pictures around the campus,

March 26-Played handball after classes today. Went out to eat and to the show in the evening. Today was sort of a "vacation."

March 27-For assembly today we had Eddie Cole. He's a champion on the trampoline and several cadets from the audience assisted him. The Guard practiced during drill.

March 28-Late BRC, as usual. After classes today 1 went to the physics room and observed some demonstrations the students had built. It was interesting but a little beyond what I got in high school.

March 29—This evening I had a Spanish class to make up, but it didn't last long. Then I went to the W Club Show in the chapel. The athletes turned performers for the evening and did a good job.

March 30-Tonight was the W-Club Dance and 1 didn't have a date. Instead of going, I went to sleep early and tried to forget about the fun I was missing.

March 31-According to Wentworth desk calendars today doesn't exist. The manufactures only gave March thirty days so I guess I don't have to write anything for today.

April 1-April Fools' Day, To celebrate the day I called my girlfriend. 1 don't know whether that was appropriate or not,

April 2--We had our last botany lab today. From now on, it is going to be lecture five days a week. I studied before tape.

April 3-The Honor Guard practiced during drill. The silent drill is beginning to shape up, but we still need a lot of work.

April 4—Late BRC, as usual. I had a quiz in Spanish and 1 flunked it. I've got spring fever and I'm finding it difficult to work at anything.

April 5--1 made up my Spanish class tonight so that I wouldn't have to go Saturday morning.

April 6-Today marked the beginning of preparations for Government Inspection on Monday. Cadets washed floors and walls and shined equipment all night. It was a relief to finally hit the sack.

April 7--The final touches were put on the rooms today. The military department inspected the barracks to insure they were ready for G.I. We passed, so we had the evening free.

April 8-Government Inspection! About the only thing I had to do was be in the Honor Guard reception and a military class,

April 9-Tonight, I ate downtown and was ready to go to the show until I remembered I had another Spanish make up.

April 10-After drill today, several of us played football. It was fun but I ended up with sore muscles and a limp.

April 11-Late BRC, as usual. Another two hours of botany lecture today. One hour of botany is enough, but two hours? I played handball after supper.

April 12-Another test today in Spanish and I still haven't cured my spring fever. I sunbathed and played tennis which didn't help either.

April 13-My mother, brother, and girlfriend arrived today for the week end. We all went out to eat then spent the evening partying.

April 14-1 marched Color Guard today because one of the regulars was sick. After parade and some picture taking, my mother left for home again. April 15-Early Monday morning. Not much was accomplished today. I mostly just thought about last week end.

April 16-This evening, Wallace, Stott, Fechner, Davis, Richardson and myself wasted the evening discussing 'trivia'. We're great philosphers.

April 17-There was no assembly today. Instead, we had an extra study period. I admit I didn't take advantage of it.

April 18-Late BRC, as usual. The college rifle team went to the University of Missouri for a rifle match this afternoon. The Guard couldn't practice because of rain.

April 19-Another big sports event today. The track team went to the Highland Relays. I played handball with my roommates in the evening.

April 20-We had a film and lecture by a highway patrolman on automotive safety during chapel. This evening, I went to the movie.

April 21—Today Wallace and I had to arrange for three Honor Guard members to reserve some seats for parade. After parade, I went to the show,

April 22-A cadet down the hall from me had a birthday today. He shared his cake with us and we had a spontaneous party until taps crept up on us and ended it.

April 23-1 had a test in history today. It came as a surprise and my grade won't be too good. I played handball in the evening.

April 24-For assembly, we had film highlights of Big Eight football last fall. Being from Oklahoma, I couldn't help but enjoy it.

April 25-Late BRC, as usual. This afternoon the Honor Guard had a real good practice. They're beginning to approach perfection in the silent drill.

April 26-Felt determined to beat my spring fever today. I tried to study in the afternoon but failed. The evening, I did get some study in.

April 27–1 went downtown shopping for a card and ended up with a five dollar gift. These things always happen to me. I studied for next week.

April 28-Today, we went off daylight savings time. It caused quite a lot of confusion because several people didn't change their clocks,

April 29—That lost hour didn't make much difference until this morning. Why are Mondays so had? I studied for an European test during C.Q.'s,

April 30—The history test wasn't too hard, but botany was im possible. He put out so much information in two hours that my head was swimming.

May 1-Today was the Honor Guard's last full afternoon of practice before the drill meet. Only three days and so much yet to do. I worked on my English book report during C.Q.'s.

May 2-Late BRC, as usual. But it didn't help me much. I came down with the flu. I went to the hospital, had a fever, and was admitted. I spent the evening reading and playing cards.

May 6-After being in the hospital on Thursday and in Columbia on Friday and Saturday, Monday classes came as quite a shock. I'm far behind in botany and English. Studied in a vain attempt to get hack on top during C.Q.'s.

May 7-No botany lab again today. Instead, we had two hours of lecture. It looks like we'll never have another lab session,

May 8-After classes, I had a pleasant surprise. An exinstructor at Wentworth returned and visited with me. We went out to eat. It was good to get a big steak . . . for a change.

May 9-Late BRC, as usual. Today, I found out I was going on the MST-5 and 6 bivouac. The advanced military classes form rival elements and stage a war from Saturday afternoon until Sunday night. Um going with the MST-6 contract students.

May 10-1 made my appointment for Tuesday to give my English book report. After classes, I reported to the military department and helped assemble rifles for the problem tomorrow.

May 11-1 went to one class today, then I worked in the military department getting radios, ammo, and smoke grenades ready. We left after lunch and the "war" was on.

May 12—The "war" raged all vesterday afternoon, evening, and early this morning. No sleep for two days. Today was Mother's Day, There was a special hanquet at noon in the field house, but I didn't go. Sleep was too inviting.

May 13—Another early Monday morning that seemed out of place. 1 went to eat down town with a couple of friends. It rained on us as we returned.

May 14-Found out today that the Lt. Governor is coming to Wentworth this Saturday. The Honor Guard is going to give him an appropriate reception. More planning.

May 15-Today, the Guard practiced the reception for the Lt. Governor during drill. After that, I spent the afternoon in excess. It wasn't too bad though. I got my history report done,

May 16-Late BRC, as usual. I'm trying to get things organized for finals. It seems there is just too much to remember. The nights of study are going to start adding up from now until finals.

May 17-We had Honor Guard practice for the first time in a month during the afternoon. Otherwise, very uneventful.

May 18—The Lt, Governor, of the State of Missouri, The Honorable Thomas P, Eagleton, arrived today on schedule. The reception was short and then he addressed the corps during chapel. It was a special meeting for the Phi Theta Kappa initiations.

May 19-Today was "Rats" Day or as they want us to call them "new boys". The first year cadets took all the important positions for parade. What a mess!

May 20-Monday morning was spent making arrangements for the Honor Guard picnic on Wednesday. The evening was spent in preparation for finals.

May 21–1 checked, and the Honor Guard's gift for the Sergeant Major still isn't in vet. Supper tonight was the annual banquet for the spring athletes. We had steak and baked potatoes!

May 22-The Honor Guard picnic, as usual, was beyond words. The Guard got revenge for my years worth of yelling at them.

May 23-Late BRC, as usual. Tonight was the last night before finals and I think everybody was taking advantage of it. I'm lucky, 1 don't have any finals tomorrow.

May 24—My whole day was free. I spent most of it relaxing and preparing for my hotany test. My real hard schedule of exams doesn't come until Monday.

May 25-Two hours worth of botany finals. I'm ready to quit school. It's surprising how dumb a few simple questions can make you feel. I slept the rest of the day away.

May 26—Unusually quiet for a Sunday. Everybody is still buried in the books. I looked over the notes for history and literature, but I mostly tried to be calm-it's too late to start learning now.

May 27—My roughest day of finals. It was a relief to realize that the year was, at least, scholastically over when I handed in that last exam. Went out to eat and to the show down town in the evening.

May 28-No finals today. I hit the sack right after breakfast and didn't wake up till noon. Generally just a wasted day.

May 29—This evening, my mother and brother arrived. We had a party at the motel for my friends. My mother had gifts for all who were graduating.

May 30-The corps practiced for Commencement and final parade this afternoon. I spent the evening with my mother and brother again.

May 31-Tonight was the Band concert. It was excellent: Headquarters did a good job of changing from marching band to concert hand.

June 1-More practice for Commencement-two hours worth of "Awards Assembly", then Commencement Dance.

June 2--I was up early doing last minute packing. Went to Baccalaureate in the morning. Lunch was picnic style with the family at the battlefield . . . then Commencement, Flag ceremony, Final Parade-Brigade Dismissed!!!
