With many underclassmen returning, the success of this year's squad should carry over into next season.








The 1984-85 Wentworth Red Dragons high school basketball team had a very disappointing season, finishing with a record of 4-18.






H.S. Wrestling

At the Tri-Mil meet, Howard and Willens won by superior decisions and Philips and Klemm by pins.

















Yearbook Staff






